**March Rationing Reminders—**

Important dates on the ration calendar, are:  
MARCH 1—Rationing of canned and frozen fruits and vegetables, dried fruit, canned soups, canned baby foods begins.  
MARCH 1-10—Period for registration by industrial and institutional users of sugar, coffee and commercially processed fruits and vegetables.  
MARCH 15—Deadline for use of sugar stamp No. 11, which became effective February 1.  
MARCH 21—No. 4 coupons in gasoline rationing books expire.  
MARCH 31—Tire inspection deadline for holders of A gas coupon books.  
APRIL 1-10—Wholesalers and retailers register as distributors under food point rationing.

**March Proclaimed WAAC Month**

Gov. Coke Stevenson of Texas, has joined four other chief executives of states comprising the Eighth Service Command in proclaiming March as Women's Army Auxiliary Corps Recruiting Month.

The action followed an appeal for complete civilian co-operation in the WAAC recruiting drive issued by Major General Richard Donovan, Commanding General of the Eighth Service Command.

"Whereas Major General Donovan... has requested all patriotic citizens... to observe March as WAAC Recruiting Month, and to bend every effort toward the stimulation of enrollments in the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps," Governor Stevenson wrote.

"Whereas, Texas is an integral part of the Eighth Service Command, and charged with a large share of the responsibility of furnishing womanpower for the WAAC, and,

"Whereas, Texas has already fulfilled its obligations to the nation, and its people recognize the need of utilizing their skills and aptitudes of women as well as men in the service of our country during this greatest of all emergencies;

"Now, therefore, I do hereby proclaim March as WAAC Recruiting Month in Texas, and call upon all citizens for sincere participation in, and wholehearted support of this vitally important effort."

Similar proclamations were signed simultaneously by the governors of Arkansas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, and Louisiana.

Army officers said the proclamation would touch off continued and intensive recruiting campaign to fill the Eighth Service Command's quota of 8,000 WAAC enrollees during the first quarter of 1943.

General Donovan's appeal came in the form of a statement addressed to all citizens in the Southwest.

"Units of the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps, as posts within the continental United States and overseas, have proved of inestimable value to the Army of the United States," he said in apt.

"The President of the United States has ordered immediate expansion of this Corps to its full authorized strength of 150,000 as a vital part of this nation's war effort.

"Texas, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Louisiana and New Mexico... have an enviable record of furnishing volunteers for all of the uniformed forces of the United States, and should not be less diligent in the task of supplying woman-power for the WAAC.

"I appeal to all civilian WAAC recruiting chairmen and their committees, other organized civilian agencies, and all patriotic citizens in general to observe... March... as WAAC Recruiting Month. I have ordered all military personnel under my jurisdiction to participate in this campaign and to extend full co-operation and I urge that there be continued and constructive effort on the part of everyone, military and civilian alike, toward the ultimate success of this procurement drive."

**News From County Agents' Office**

More than 75 Callahan County farmers will have hybrid corn demonstrations on their farm in 1943. These demonstrators are located in almost all communities where corn is grown. All demonstrators will plant high producing native varieties as a check against the hybrid varieties. Thereby giving the entire county a chance to observe the results. Farmers who have previously planted hybrid corn have increased their corn yields by 25 to 35 percent.

**CHARLES SARGENT TO HAVE 1943 CLUB PROJECT**

Charles Sargent, a member of the Bayou 4-H Club will have one-fourth acre of tomatoes and one-fourth acre of okra for his 1943 club project. Sufficient tomato seeds have been planted in a hot-bed prepared by Charles to furnish plants. The Marglobe variety of tomato plants will be planted in four-foot rows, with three foot spacing between plants. White Velvet okra seeds will be planted in three-foot rows, with three foot spacing between plants. Charles plans to market the truck crops at local grocery stores.

**FEEDING THE DAIRY HERD**

A well balanced feeding program for a dairy herd should comprise about one-third hay or silage, one-third pasture and one-third concentrates.  
A Jersey cow weighing about 1,000 pounds will eat about 20 pounds of dry matter in roughages daily. If this is obtained from tender green grass containing 85 percent of water, the cow would have to eat 134 pounds of grass. If gotten from silage she would have to eat 60 pounds daily. The sum of this is that one pound of hay is equivalent to three pounds of silage, and about six pounds of green grass based on the dry matter

contained. Hay should be fed the year-round, even when cows are on good pasture. In that case they will not eat much hay, but the moment the pasture begins to fail their start eating more, if the hay is before them. Production of milk was maintained more evenly where cows had access to hay at all times.

Good green grass is the best and cheapest feed for a dairy cow. But, catch in that is that a high producing cow cannot hold enough grass to entirely meet her requirements. Accordingly, it is necessary to feed some dry roughage and concentrate feeds additionally.

Since a pound of digestible nutrients from roughages is as valuable as a corresponding amount of concentrates, and usually much cheaper, as much as possible of the feed requirements should be sought from roughages.

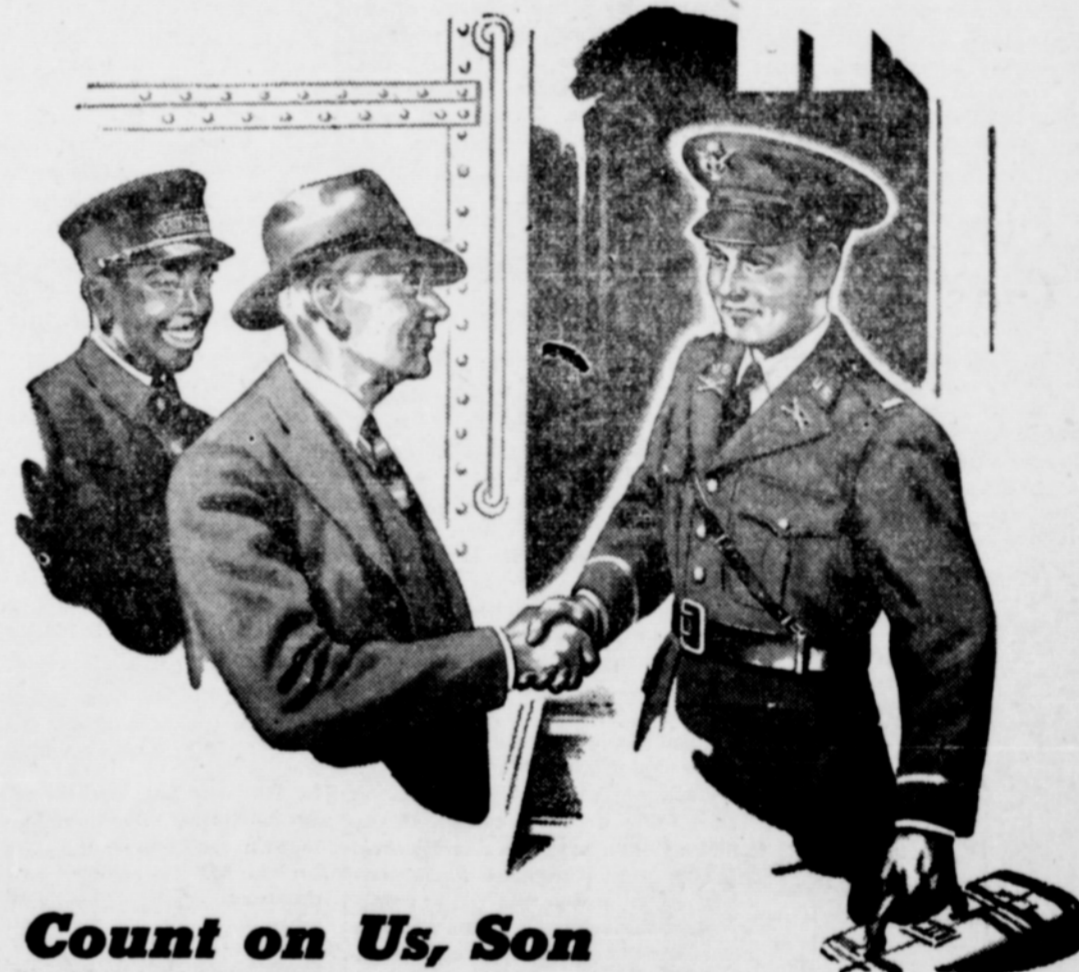
Dairymen agree that more of them fall down on the roughage requirement than on any other party of the heard feeding program. Pasture management designed to control brush and weeds to permit grass to grow, plus one ton of hay and three tons of silage per cow will correct this. If silage isn't available, provide two tons of hay.

**Relief For Retail Grocers**  
 Hope of relief for retail grocers who find themselves caught short on their supply of processed foods since point rationing began on March 1 was held out today, by the Callahan County War Price and Rationing Board.  
 "Some of these retailers are complaining that they were unable to restock their shelves during the last week of February, when they might have bought processed foods without restriction, because their wholesale suppliers were out of certain lines of canned foods, or through misunderstanding refused to sell to the retailers."  
 "We'll like to make it plain that during the month of March, these retailers—and wholesalers as well—may obtain emergency supplies, where their present stocks of processed foods are not adequate."  
 The emergency adjustments are, in effect, emergency grants of points designed to allow the grocers requesting relief sufficient points with which to acquire more stocks.  
 A retailer grocer may apply to the local War Price and Rationing Board while wholesalers and those who operate stores at both the wholesale and retail levels should apply either to the state OPA office in FortWorth or to the nearest OPA District office which in Texas are located in Lubbock, San Antonio, Dallas and Houston.  
 The retailer's application to the local board should estimate the grocer's total estimated dollar sales of processed foods during January 1, 1943.  
 The board multiplies this dollar value total of his January sales by 100, then subtracts from the total of that his net inventory of processed food value points at the time his application is filed. The board may issue a point certificate to him for the difference.  
 For example, if retailer's January dollar sales of processed foods totaled \$1,000, the board would multiply 1,000 by 100, which would equal 100,000 points. If the grocer's physical inventory of processed foods at the time of his application for emergency relief totaled 25,000 points, he had 3,000 points in his ration bank account and 2,000 points undeposited, plus 8,000 points sent to a supplier, these would total 38,000 points. This would be subtracted from 100,000 points, thus leaving 62,000 points—the amount he could be granted on an emergency certificate during March to replenish his inventory.  
 A wholesaler might obtain an emergency certificate by a similar formula, except that his application for relief would be filed with the state or district OPA office, instead of with the local county War Price and Rationing Board.  
 "This emergency adjustment can be granted only where the aggregate in inventory points is lower than the amount the OPA feels an applicant should have, and a shortage of only one or two items will not necessarily warrant this sort of an emergency adjustment. However, we do not intend to see the rationing regulation work an unnecessary hardship on a merchant where relief is justified by the circumstances."  
 Inventories should "level off" after the registration of retail and wholesale food sellers during the first 10 days of April, he said.

**Ration Board Gives Information On Tires**  
 The following information has been released from the Callahan County War Price and Rationing Board:  
 The Callahan County War Price and Rationing Board are having numerous requests for certificates to be changed to a different size tire or a different grade of tire from which was originally issued.  
 This is being caused due to the fact there are hardly any Grade Three Tires on the market now in sizes from seventeen through twenty-one.  
 The Board has now made a ruling that all applications for tires in sizes from seventeen through twenty-one show that the applicant knows where he can find the particular tire being applied for before the application is placed with the board.  
 There are being quite a number of tire certificates being returned to the board by those who could not find the tire called for on the certificate; thus, causing the county to lose that much of the original quota allotted the county.

GOOD GAS RANGES are built to last a long time, anyway... come war, come peace. So make yours flourish, with smart care. It's the nation's economy, as well as your own.

1. Do not put wet dishes directly on the enamel. (This enamel is glass.) Protect top with asbestos mats.
2. Wipe off spilled foods at once, with dry cloth. Later when range is cold, clean with damp cloth.
3. To clean top burners of aluminum or enamel, use mild soapsuds; rinse and dry. (Do not boil in soda solution.)
4. To clean broiler grill, let cool before washing with soapsuds; use fine steel wool. (Remove grill and pan from the range, as soon as food is taken off.) Whenever possible, use only a moderate heat for broiling, and you will find the broiler easier to clean. (Many foods broil well with a moderate heat.)
5. The oven-lining will last longer, if you roast meats at low temperatures (250° to 325°). It makes better-tasting meat besides, and also cuts down grease-spatter on oven-walls.
6. To clean up spill-overs on oven-floor, let cool, and then use a fine steel wool.
7. Don't load the oven-door with heavy roasts, as you put them in or take them out. It might warp the door.
