## SCHOOL BELLS RING HERE SEPT. 2

SAYS the Insurance Information Institute (a group dedicated to halting losses because they're sick and tired of paying for them), "If you have a stereo tape recorder and a stack of tapes in your car and don't take some basic theft precautions, there's a good chance they won't be there in the morning."

The stealing of stereo tape recorders and tapes from automobiles is becoming a major headache to law enforcement officials in the Southwest, as well as insurance companies.

Some tips on protecting your tapes were offered:

1. Don't leave cars unattended on dark streets or parking lots any more than necessary.

2. Don't advertise the fact that you have a stereo player in the car by leaving tapes in plain sight in the seats or in a box in the middle of the floor.

3. Mark both stereo players and tapes permanently and record these serial numbers and markings, in order to have any real chance at recovery.

Well, now all those words of caution and worry are okay, I guess, but I just don't have a stereo player in my car. And the cars I've ridden in which did have them—well, I just can't imagine anyone going to the trouble to steal tapes like most of them had.

I've never checked, so I really don't know if they make stereo tapes with music on them or not. But the only tapes I ever heard were by guys like Gary Buckett and the Union Suit Gap, the 1913 Stumblebum Co., and the like. If I did not have any of those, I'd lay them on top of the car in plain sight, and hopefully, someone might come along and carry them away.

## Sen. Doc Blanchard Governor For Day

Sen. H. J. Doc Blanchard, who was educated in Sudan public schools, has been elected President Pro Tempore of the Texas Senate.

As President Pro Tempore of the Senate, this former Sudan resident will preside over the Senate when the Lieutenant Governor, the permanent President of the Senate, is not presiding.

Being elected to this office is a special tribute and is the highest honor the Senate can bestow.

Blanchard will be Governor for a day on August 15. The Lieutenant Governor and the Governor will both go out of State so that Blanchard, as President Pro Tempore of the Senate and next in line as Governor, may be sworn in as top executive officer of the State.

"I am extending an invitation to the people of Sudan and Lamb county to come to Austin and share with me the activities that go on with our Governor for a Day program," Blanchard said.

"We are planning receptions in the Capitol in Austin in the morning and in the afternoon on August 15. We want our friends to be with us. Especially want everybody from Sudan and Lamb county to join us," the Senator said.

Blanchard's wife, Mary, and his five children will greet Texans from all over the State. His children are Jeff, sixteen; John

Ben, thirteen; Robert Henry, nine; William Clifton, six; and a daughter, Mrs. Adrienne Robertson, twenty.

After attending public school in Sudan, Blanchard graduated from Texas Tech University and received a law degree from Southern Methodist University. He has a law practice in Lubbock.

He served in the Army in the Pacific during World War II. He entered the Army as a private and was a captain in the Army Engineers when he was discharged in 1946. A sports enthusiast, he played football and basketball in college and while he was in the service.

Blanchard served in the Texas House of Representatives during the 55th and 56th sessions of the Texas Legislature. He was elected to the Senate to serve during the 58th session and has been a member of the Senate since that time.

He was born in Denison in 1923. He is a member of the Methodist church. Other affiliations include Masonic Lodge, Lions, Shrine, Scottish Rite Orders and legal and civic organizations.

**LITTER IS BITTER**

"Litter is almost as bitter an enemy of conservation farmers and ranchmen as erosion," according to Joe Blevins, district conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service.

He said that was why his office and Lamb County Soil and Water Conservation District are glad to join with the Beautify Texas Council in helping focus public attention on the statewide litter problem.

The Council recently asked all Texans to renew anti-litter efforts this summer.

"Too many people still litter our countryside with bottles, cans, and other trash," Blevins stressed. "This not only mars the beauty of our rural lands, by when it collects on farm or grassland, it can also become a conservation problem."

Blevins listed several ways litter is a conservation menace.

First, it is a fire hazard. He pointed out that under certain conditions, bottles had been blamed with magnifying the sun's rays enough to start costly grass and forest fires.

Every year, countless wildlife and livestock are poisoned by litter thrown in pastures and fields.

Others are starved or injured when they get their heads or feet caught in bottles, cans and other trash.

The conservationist said litter hinders farming and ranching operations; some trash catches water, increasing mosquitos, thus becoming a health problem, it can be a safety hazard; and it costs millions just to pick up every year. Besides that, he said, "It's ugly."

"Conservation farmer and ranchmen do as much to help beautify Texas as anyone," Blevins added.

"Neatly contoured fields, well-managed grasslands and woodlands, sediment-free ponds, lakes, and streams, sloped and seeded gullies areas; all this and other work done by conservation farmers adds to the beauty of the landscape. The least the rest of us can do is put our litter in a trash can instead of throwing it on the land to mar this beauty," he said.



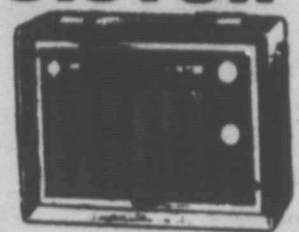

**Herbicides**

"Herbicides can be useful tools for controlling weeds when properly applied," says Lamb County Agent Buddy Logsdon "but improper application can cause problems particularly on susceptible crops," he continued. To get satisfactory results from herbicides, Logsdon says to follow the directions on the label as approved by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. "These directions should be followed exactly," he said. Of the hormone-type herbicides, the salt or low-volatile ester formulations are safest, Logsdon said. They are less likely to vaporize than the high-volatile ester formulations. The county agent gave these five rules for applying herbicides: 1. Use chemicals only on crops for which they are recommended. 2. Use only the quantity and only at the time
