The Sudan Hornets chalked up their second victory of the season Friday night as they shut out the Amherst Bulldogs, 39-0. The Hornet defense did a great job, allowing the Bulldogs only 5 first downs and 43 yards rushing.

In the opening minutes of the game, the two teams played a game of "exchange" as the football changed hands about four times before the Hornets finally started moving the ball. FB Larry Hanna broke the ice for the Hornets with a 15 yard run for the touchdown. Halfback Jerry Bellar kicked the extra point, and the Hornets led 7-0.

As the ball was kicked, the Hornets rushed downfield and Bellar covered a Bulldog fumble on the Amherst 12 yard line. The Hornets were pushed back to the 17, when Bellar broke through on 4th down and ran 17 yards for another TD. The try for point was no good, and at the end of the first quarter, the Hornets led 13-0.

When the Hornets got the ball, three plays later Hanna ran 30 yards for 6 more points. Bellar kicked the point, and the score was 20-0. The Hornet defense held the Bulldogs, forcing them to punt, and Bellar made a 15 yard punt return to the Bulldog 40 yard line. The Hornets moved on down to the 19, where they fumbled the ball and Jimmy Humphries was there to cover for the Bulldogs after the ball exchanged hands, and several plays later, Sudan QB Rex Boyles ran 33 yards for the TD. Hanna kicked the extra point, and the Hornets led 27-0. Several new Hornet players took over in the backfield for Sudan including a new quarterback, Bo Lance. He handed off to fullback David Weaver, who high-

stepped his way through the Bulldogs for a gain of 21 yards to the Amherst 15. With only 5 seconds remaining in the first half, Weaver plunged over from two yards out for another score. The try for point failed, and the Hornets led Amherst 33-0 at the

Starting off the second half with a bang, Rex Boyles intercepted an Amherst pass and ran the ball to the Hornet 40, only to lose the ball on the downs on the Bulldog 30 yard line. But the Bulldogs only had the ball for two plays when HB Roger Boyles intercepted an Amherst pass on the 48. Then it was the Hornet's time to fumble, and Kim Harmon covered the ball for the Bulldogs. Late in the quarter, guard Eugene Lopez recovered a Bulldog fumble for the Hornets on the Amherst 37. Moving on down to the 18, the Hornets failed to make a first down, and this quarter ended

with neither team able to score. The Hornets tried to score again early in the final quarter with Bellar sunning 40 yards into the end zone only to have the play called back on an offside penalty. The Hornets made their final TD when QB Boyles tossed a pass to end Shawn Potter for 30 yards with the play totaling 44 yards as Potter ran over the line into the end zone. The try for EP failed. OB Boyles then intercepted a pass on the 30 yard line and the Hornets ran the clock out to end the game Sudan over Amherst, 39-0.

Hanna was top ball carrier in the game with 90 yards. Weaver, who was playing for the first time this season, was in second place with 87 yards.

Outstanding on defense were guard Steve Edwards, Rex Boyles and tackle Harvey Willeby.

The Hornets travel to Morton Friday night to meet the Morton Indians. Game time is 8 p. m.




