A BIG ITEM in the news in recent times has been smog control, a problem which is greatest in California and some of the big industrial cities of the north and east where nobody in his right mind would want to live anyway.

The biggest smog problem most of us have around here, though, comes from worn-out lawnmowers. Smog control at our house in the past always has been limited to ultimatums by my wife and kids that any smoking of cigars in the home or in the family car when all are present is strictly verboten. The kids put on an exaggerated show of coughing and gasping whenever I light a cigar around them. Long ago I decided to show them in no uncertain terms who is boss, and started confining my cigar smoking to the office, where it is tolerated in ill humor by most of the female help.

Smog, though, is a big deal (and admittedly a major threat) in those afore-mentioned centers of industry, traffic congestion and labor troubles. But it kind of rankles me personally to see mandatory smog control devices on autos sold for use out here where they aren't needed. I really wouldn't care, except that these things add to the price of the car and, more important detract from the efficiency of the motor's operation.

Without doubt, many owners of new vehicles equipped with the erratic way they cause the engine to run at times. For one thing, the motor often will keep on firing for sometimes as long as 30 seconds after you cut off the ignition. This means you have to sit there with your foot on the clutch or brake, depending on what kind of transmission your vehicle has. In addition, the device has been blamed for rough idling of new engines.

The obvious answer to the disgruntled car owner around here would be to disconnect the blamed smog control device. But inspection laws require they be working.

We realize the devices are important, but it seems the smog control device should be required only if you are driving in one of those places where they are needed. Admittedly, though, this would be hard to enforce. Why not just make it illegal to drive any kind of car in the big city?

It may come to that some day.

The Sudan Hornets battled the Seagraves Eagles Friday night and came up on the short end of the score, as the Eagles won 12-6. It was a hard hitting battle, and the Hornets kept up the fight all the way.

The Eagles made their first score when they were faced with a 4th down and 11 to go on the 37 yard line, went into punt formation, and Eagle QB Eddie Knight took a short snap from center and ran straight for the goal line for 6 points. The two-point conversion try failed.

Hornet QB Rex Boyles returned the favor by making a 28 yard run out to the Eagle 30. Moving the ball on down field, HB Jerry Bellar took the hand-off on the 13 yard line and was fighting to get over the g. line, fumbled on the 1 and the ball rolled into the end zone where Sudan's tackle Gerald Chisholm covered it for 6 points for the Hornets. But their try for a two-point conversion also failed, and at the end of the quarter the score was tied 6-6.

The Eagles scored again early in the second quarter as 210 lb. fullback Donnie Hoover powered his way over from 2 yards out. Their pass-try for two points was intercepted in the endzone by Rex Boyles. But the Eagles led 12-6.

As the game continued, with no one expecting the scoring to stop there, both Hornets and Eagles earned every yard they made. End Shawn Potter intercepted one pass in the end zone to stop another Eagle try for a

score, and just before the half Chisholm covered an Eagle fumble on their 49 yard line.

The last half continued the offensive and defensive battle, with the ball changing hands many times, as each team was forced to punt on 4th down plays. The game ended with Seagraves Eagles over Sudan 12-6.

This gives Sudan a 2-2 season record. The Hornets are making preparation to meet the Plains Cowboys here Friday night in Hornet Stadium. Game time is 8 p. m.

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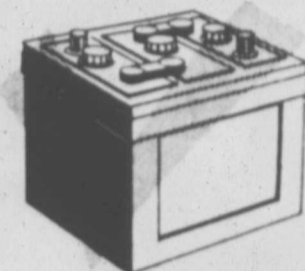

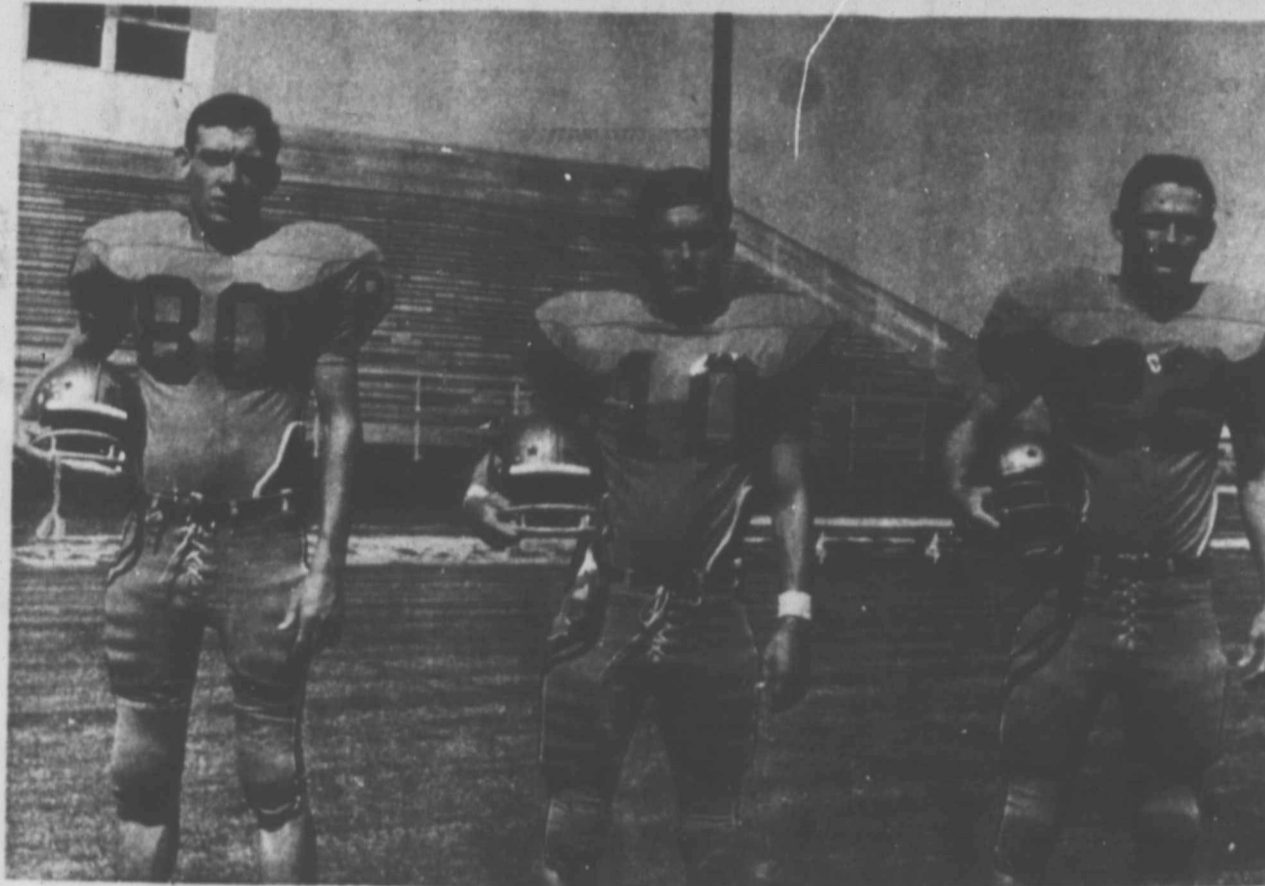
