ABOUT the time you are reading this, big things may be happening of about to happen in these not-so-United States. Hundreds of thousands of people who apparently don't have anything better to do will be marching all over the place in various parts of the nation, showing their displeasure with the Vietnam War and urging that we give up immediately, or showing their support of President Nixon's plan to end the war.

Hopefully, though, even that won't be needed. But when you have large groups organized to march in favor of one thing and other large groups organizing to march in favor of the opposite viewpoint, violence could easily result wherever there is a confrontation.

Meanwhile, the vast majority of Americans, including, I imagine, many silent Nixon supporters, will be plugging away in the fields, in the office, at the store, or in the kitchen, trying to meet the responsibilities of day-to-day existence.

Some people just don't have time to march.

ALSO, of course, we're going to the moon again about now, providing everything works out okay. This time, in spite of all the publicity, not too many people can get excited about the trip. It's sort of ironic that already a trip to the moon is mundane. But after all, we already know what is up there (nothing), so the suspense of finding out is gone again (and present plans are to go again, and again, and again...).

At least those guys on their way to the moon will get away from the mess of all these demonstrations.

SUDAN CHILLS KRESS, 21-14

The visiting Kress Kangaroos got the undivided attention of District 3-A's defending champion Sudan Hornets Friday night, when Sudan edged out the Kangaroos and won a 21-14 cliff-hanger.

This win for the Hornets sets up the 1969 district championship game with Farwell, who is undefeated in conference play, and the game will be in the Farwell Steer's home stadium Friday starting at 7:30 p. m.

Led by the running of stocky blockbuster Johnny Jackson, the "Roos jumped out ahead of Sudan in the first period, fell behind 21-7 at the half, then came back to worry the Hornets mightily in the last half before losing for the third time in district play.

Jackson ran 69 yards for the "Roos first TD, and Mike Terrell booted the extra point. Late in the first quarter, the Hornets started a drive from their own 37 yard line and F. B. Larry Hanna scored Sudan's first touchdown, with H. B. Jerry Bellar kicking the point.

The second quarter was Sudan's big one. Starting from their 27, Hanna scored again running 23 yards for the TD, capping a 73 yard journey. Bellar booted the extra point. Then

Sudan's HB Billy Gore raced 40 yards to score, and again Bellar kicked the PAT. The "Roos were fighting hard for another TD, with two minutes left on the clock, when HB Gregory McNabb intercepted a Kangaroo pass on the Hornet 30 and ran to the 45 before he was brought down. The half ended with the score 21-7.

In the second half the Hornets started play on their 36 yard line, but in only a couple of plays, Kress defensive HB Weaver McClure intercepted a Sudan pass by QB Bo Lance, to start Kress on another scoring drive from the Kangaroo 37. Jackson scored from 2 yards away and Terrell's point kick closed the gap to 21-14.

Early in the final quarter, the Hornets fumbled on their own 25 yard line and Mike Motheral was there to cover for Kress. The "Roos marched down to the Sudan 2, when FB Gary Morgan went on into the endzone but a penalty moved the ball back to the 7. A fourth down run by Jackson was stopped by the Hornets' Steve Edwards and a large group of friends.

Late in the quarter, as the Hornets moved out to their 18 yard line, Kress line backer Motheral smashed into the Hornet ballcarrier causing a fumble which was promptly claimed by Kress End Terry Harris. Two plays later Kress fumbled and Steve Edwards covered the ball for the Hornets with only three minutes left to play. But the determined visitors got the ball one more time, and drove to the Hornet 34 with 0:37 left, when Sudan's McNabb intercepted a Kangaroo pass. With only 20 seconds left, the Hornets held on to the ball, and when the gun sounded, it was Sudan over Kress, 21-14.

Hanna was top ball carrier with 119 yards. The defensive team was great, especially on their goal-line stands, and also special commendation goes to Sophomore Quarterback Bo Lance, as he guided the Hornet team to this victory over Kress Friday night.
