TWO TOPICS head the agenda for this week, one good and mythical, the other not so good and only too real. They are Santa Claus and the Internal Revenue Service.

First, about this hippie-type character with the long hair, beard and boots. Dr. Wayne Brandstadt, who's supposed to be some kind of an authority, says in his NEA syndicated column, "The Well Child" that it's best to tell a child Santa's true meaning.

As Christmas nears, says Dr. Brandstadt, a child of 5 or 6 is likely to ask whether or not there is a Santa Claus. The doctor's view is that whenever a child asks point-blank, "Is there really a Santa Claus?" it is best to explain that this is a delightful bit of make-believe, but that Santa Claus "is truly the personification of the spirit of giving."

Right here, I'd like to say that if your child understands the meaning of the word "personification" he doesn't need to ask you about Santa Claus.

The doctor makes a good point, though, asserting that telling the truth is important, for if your child discovers later that you have lied to him, no matter how well meaning your intentions, he will come to trust you just a little less.

THE INTERNAL Revenue Service has little resemblance to Santa Claus, unless you happen to be one of the minority which gets a refund, in which case it might seem like Christmas no matter what time of year it is.

More and more taxpayers are being audited, and one of the lurking terrors of life for most of us is the notice that our number has come up on the IRS torture wheel.

Unless you're downright crooked, though, you need not be too fearful, although admittedly one rarely benefits by having a return audited.

One thing about it, if you are audited, you have certain rights of appeal before the IRS people, and even to the courts, if you want to take it that far. So the first thing to do when you get the notice of audit is to notify your tax man, if you had someone prepare your return, or maybe your lawyer, if the amount involved is enough to warrant the expense.

If you have no tax man or lawyer either, just notify your doctor that you're going to be sick. Even that has to be done by appointment these days.

Sudan Hornettes again took a first quarter lead in the game Tuesday night and maintained this throughout the game. Connie Lance put 28 points in to lead the scoring. Angela Pickett came in the fourth quarter to sink 11 free shots and 4 field goals for 19 points. Minnie Williams scored 9 points and Joan Harper 2. Guards were Kathy Rice, Venita Whiteaker, Karen Doty, Judy Williams, Sharon Morgan and Deborah Marlow.

The B-team girls won both their games against Anton making their season record 2-2. In the first game Nov. 25, Val Newell piled-up 24 points with Betty Legg scoring 18. Sudan was never threatened and led 27-8 at the half. All team members on both sides saw action during the game. However, Sudan had more fouls in the last half which gave Anton all their scores except one basket at the beginning of the game. Final score was Sudan 46, Anton 17.

The Junior High girls played Vega here Monday night and won their first game of the season 20-15. The game was tied 12-12 at the half. Debra Edwards was high point with 10 points, followed by Mary Ann Bellar with 7 points and Angela Tre-

Sudan had a three point lead in the first quarter and led by 25-20 at the half. The scoring at the end of the third quarter was tied 35-35 with Anton sinking the deciding shot in the final minute.

In Tuesday's game the Hornets started off good and led 17-11 at the end of the first quarter. Anton led 31-28 at the half and the Hornets just couldn't catch up with the final score being Anton 55, Sudan 50.

The boys B-team lost to Anton 45-36 Tuesday night although Ken Ingram scored 15 points. Sudan led 15-13 at the half and was behind one point at the end of the third quarter. The fourth quarter told the tale with Anton scoring 17 points to Sudan's 11.

Scripture: Ecclesiastes 11:13; I Corinthians 3:15.

"Take time to be holy, Speak oft with thy Lord; Abide in Him always, And feed on His word. . . Take time to be Holy, The world rushes on; Spend much time in secret, With Jesus alone. . ."

As you probably recognize, these are words of a hymn. But this is advice and instruction for on how to be "fitted for service above".

Who will listen, and who will use and apply these instructions to their daily ways of living? As I write I am conscious of the rush and hurry and busy-ness of this world around me. To be still and know that God is always in control, that He is My Father who always loves and cares about you and me—this keeps my mind from panic and confusion and restores my soul every day—every moment, day by day.

In my estimation, one of the dangers of our day, which is so easy for us to overlook, is: "Too Busy." If we are not very careful, some of us are going to "too busy" ourselves right into hell. Plain talk? It is time for plain

perhaps, but rest your soul and mind in the Sureness of God's love for you.

Take time to know that when we trust and obey Him, even without understanding the "why" of our pain. He always uses the bad things to work together for good to those of us who love Him. Then take time to be with Him with your family.

Take time, students, young people, to recognize Jesus in your life as the living Christ! A Savior who knows all about you, all about your problems today in this Nuclear age, and He cares enough to die that you might have eternal life. Do you know anything better than

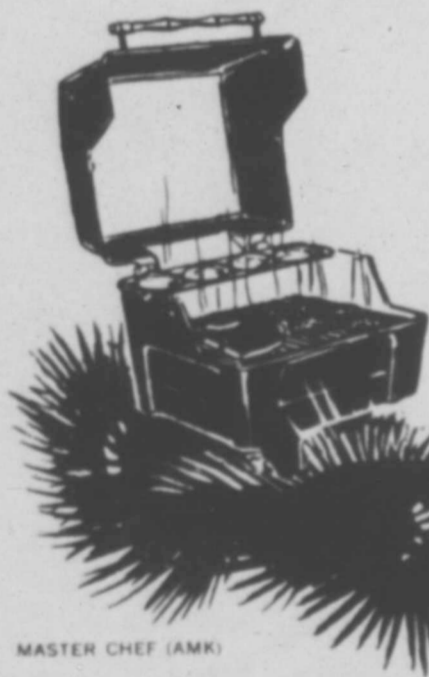
The organizational leaders for next year are Mr. and Mrs. Marvin in Bowling and Mr. and Mrs. Louis Fields.

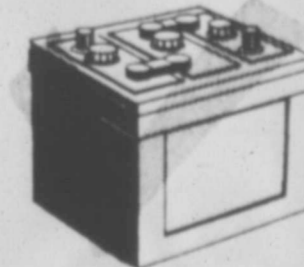
