Humphreys received his basic training at Fort Bliss and the Advanced Infantry Training at Fort Ord, California. On completion of AIT he was attached

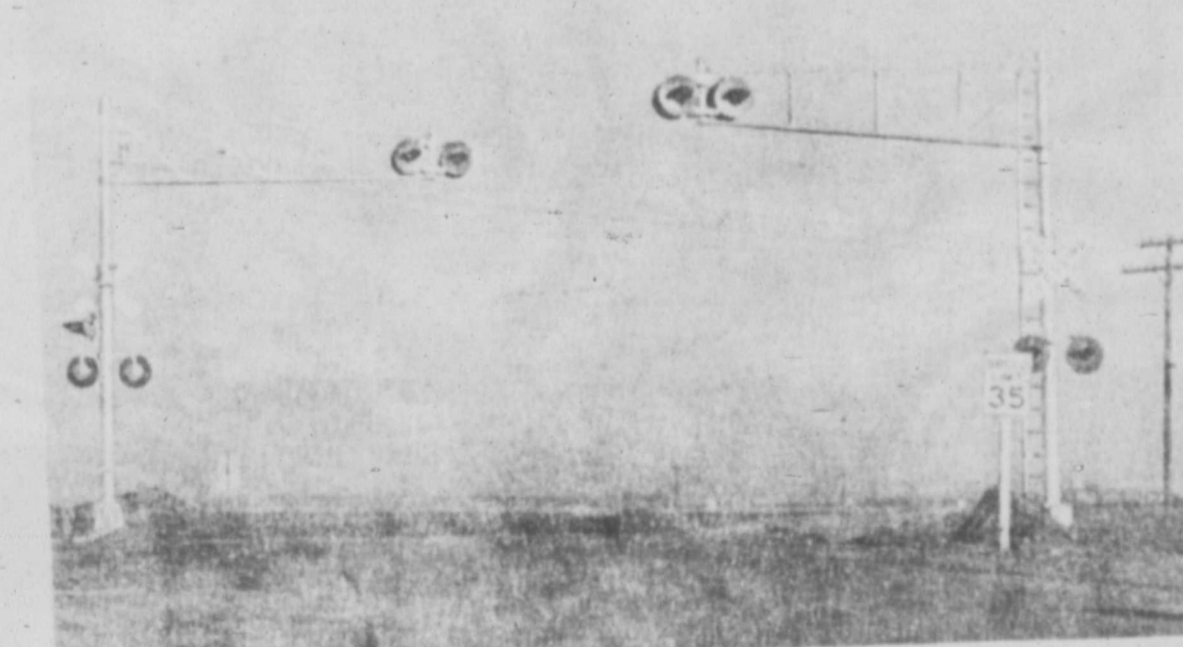
## CITY IN NEED OF CHRISTMAS DECORATIONS

The Junior High teams lost all three of their games Monday night against Springlake. The seventh grade boys lost by one point 24-23 after leading by one point at the half. Carol Legg led the scoring for Sudan with 8 points, followed by Mitch Chester with 6 and Alex Cabrera with 7.

The eighth grade boys were downed 31-16 with Donnie Noles leading the Sudan scoring with six points. Two Springlake boys scored in the double figures.
