Anyway, most of these feelings will pass in a few days, and we all will be launched on a new year, and look at it like this:



Holiday Roast With Different Meat



are, rarely make it to the dinner table in many households. One of these lesser lights which seldom stars at a holiday dinner but deserves a real chance, is Canadian bacon, a delightful flavor change for the company table. Pre-cooked and boned Canadian bacon is available rolled and canned, keeps its shape when roasted and is easy to slice and serve. Imagine a complete entree that can be done in just one hour; a clove-studded, succulent bacon roast "planked" with color-selected vegetables and hearty baked potatoes! The secret to cooking these different foods together and getting them all finished at once is in the use of a nonstick aluminum roast-bake pan. Aluminum heats up fast and very evenly throughout, so that there are no hot spots or cold spots. Everything roasts at the same temperature and at the timing the recipe calls for. The pan is handsome enough to go right to the table, or if you wish you can use a colorful aluminum electric casserole for the vegetables. A heaping fruit salad in a

big bowl, beverage and desert round out an easy but memorable menu that guest of all ages will love.

NUTMEG BUTTERED CARROTS AND BRUSSELS SPROUTS

Scrape and wash thoroughly fresh carrots. Keep them whole and plan 1-lb. for each 6 to 8 persons. Place in 2-quart aluminum saucepan with a lid. Add $\frac{1}{2}$ cup water and 1 teaspoon salt. Bring water to a boil. Reduce the heat and simmer until carrots are tender. Drain well and toss with 2 tablespoons butter and $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon nutmeg.

Cook brussels sprouts according to directions on package. Flavor with sait, butter and nutmeg. 15 minutes before serving, arrange vegetables in the roaster with rolled bacon and baked potatoes.

BEST POTATOES IN THE HOUSE - BAKED

Select Idaho potatoes, one for each guest, and approximately all of the same size. Grease the potatoes well with cooking oil. Wrap each in a square of aluminum foil. Place on the rack of the oven set at 325° F. or in an aluminum pan and bake for 1 hour. Potatoes are done when they yield to pressure. Keep warm until serving time and then cut through the foil and into the potato making a cross. Gently press the potato to open. Top with-butter.
