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## COMMITTEE NAMED

# Chamber Votes To Hire A Full-Time Manager

The Friona Chamber of Commerce voted unanimously to seek out and hire a full-time manager at a director's meeting Monday morning in the home of George Taylor, newly-elected president.

A committee, consisting of Flake Barber, Lloyd Shackelford and Wesley Foster was appointed to seek a manager.

"I believe this should be our number one project for 1966. And I think we've talked about it long enough and need to do something about it as soon as possible," Taylor told the board in assuming the office of Chamber president.

Taylor pointed out that too many people were "going around" Friona to neighboring towns, and that Friona was per-

haps not as progressive as some of its larger neighbors. "But we can do something about this," he said.

Secretary-treasurer Flake Barber gave a financial report which showed that the chamber has about half enough funds to pay a manager's salary and related expenses for a year. A minimum of \$10,000 was the estimated cost of a manager, an office, part-time help and incidental expenses.

It is thought that dues collections will undoubtedly be on the upswing when the chamber hires a manager. Taylor pointed out that some people had personally pledged extra support if and when a chamber manager was hired.

The group noted that office

accommodations will be needed when the manager is selected, and discussed possible solutions to that problem.

In other business, the chamber appointed its members to a guidance committee for the summer baseball program; authorized the secretary to secure part-time help in getting the annual dues statements out, and approved expenditure of \$30 in prize money for best-dressed merchants in Friday's April Fool Sell-A-Braton in the city.

Attending the session were Taylor, Barber, Dab Ingram, A.L. Black, Wesley Foster, Ranza Boggess and Friona Star editor, Bill Ellis.

A regular meeting time was established as 6:30 a.m. on the

second Thursday of each month. Next meeting will be at the Friona Lanes Cafe.

## One Hurt In Bovina Wreck

One man was injured Wednesday when their automobile was involved in a collision near Bovina.

Billy James Hambrick of Ft. Sumner sustained minor facial lacerations, and the driver of the car, James Hamon, 18, also of Ft. Sumner, was uninjured. Hamon was attempting to make a U-turn on U.S. Highway 60 when the car was hit by a 1964 Chevrolet driven by Travis Dyer of Bovina. Dyer was also uninjured.

Hambrick was rushed to Parmer County Community Hospital by Claborn ambulance.

## Residents Face Two Dates For Voting

Friona and area voters will have two chances to go to the polls during the next week -- and in both cases, they will have more than "token" reasons for going out to vote.

Six names adorn the school board ballot which comes up on Saturday. Two seats on the board of trustees are expiring and voters will have to choose from among the six candidates.

Then on Tuesday, there will be two more contested races for City of Friona voters. The mayor's race pits W.L. (Preach) Edelman against Ben McDonald, and the city council race again has six men running for one of two positions which are to be vacated.

Voting in the school board election will be at the Junior High School building, where school elections have been held the past several years. Absentee voting ended Tuesday. Fourteen absentee ballots were cast.

Running for the school board positions are W.M. Massie, Charles Howell, Bill Woolley, E.C. Phipps, H.H. Horton, Jr. and Doris Buske. Massie is running for re-election. D.C. Herring, the other incumbent did not run.

Those running for city council include Dr. Lee Cranfill, Stanley Benge, Rene Snead, Dale Williams, Steve Struve and Gerald Shavor.

City aldermen whose terms are expiring are Glenn Reeve, Sr. and O.D. Bingham.

Voting in the municipal election will be at the City Hall, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday. Deadline for absentee voting in the city election is Friday. As of Tuesday afternoon, only four persons had voted absentee.

## Capacity Of Lots Approaches 26,000

One of the most amazing growth stories which has ever come out of Parmer County is one which is going on five miles east of Friona at Friona Feed Yards, Inc.

The reason we say that the growth story is still "going on," is because like a rolling snowball, the local cattle-feeding industry has grown, and grown and grown -- and it's still growing.

Construction on the multi-million dollar complex began in October of 1962, and work has never stopped -- just to give an idea of the ceaseless growth.

At the present, Friona Feed Yards has a cattle population of some 25,000 and will top the 26,000 mark early in April. It now ranks as one of the top two or three cattle feeding operations in the state. The neighboring Hereford Feed Yard quotes a current 30,000 head count, and is one of the few still larger than the young giant.

In a year's time, at the present schedule, more than 65,000 head of cattle will have been fed at the local feed yard.

The cattle-feeding industry was conceived to make good use of the county's number one crop--maize-- and that's exactly what it is doing. With the current "population," the feed yard is using over 350,000 pounds of maize per day -- or a year's production on approximately 50 acres -- each day. The company contracted for 100 million pounds of milo during a nine month period.

In addition, Friona Feed Yards has contracted 1100 acres of corn for ensilage, which has averaged over 25 tons per acre. Growers have been well-pleased with this new crop market.

Although Friona Feed Yards has been in business less than three years, it is bidding to become one of the area's largest industries.

Currently the Yards employs 30 people, with an annual payroll in excess of \$200,000.

Business volume exceeds a million dollars each month. Capital investments in the company's physical plant is around \$2,000,000.

Packers who buy cattle from Friona Feed Yards have been well-pleased with the quality and finish they have found on the Friona beef. The yard sees over 300 trucks per day.

The local feeders have a ready market with such companies as Swift (Clovis), Armour (Lubbock), Pinkney (Amarillo), Wilson's (Oklahoma City), Texas Meat (Fort Worth) and others.

Ninety per cent of the cattle are consumed within a radius which reaches to Oklahoma City on the east, so that feeders have a ready market for their product. Practically all of the cattle are sold before they leave the yard.

Besides the stockholders and the company itself, which feeds about two-thirds of the cattle in the yard, there is a nucleus of some 24 customers feeding at the local yard, with a good waiting list, which the company has maintained much of the time.

"We certainly appreciate our customer's faith which they have exhibited in us. We have tried to deal fairly with them and assure them a good profit for their investment," states A.L. Black, chairman of the company's board of directors.

Butz of California built the company's feed mill. It currently is mixing over 300 tons of feed per day, and can handle 30,000 head of cattle daily.

One of the latest innovations at the company is a teletype, which brings into the office the latest market reports from Southwest Markets of Fort Worth, as well as information from other feed yards in the state.

Jack Carrothers, a Colorado native, is manager of Friona Feed Yards. Carrothers has been on the scene ever since the first "peg" was driven.

The nation, it seems, is getting pretty sick and tired of bearded people running around with signs. The problem is who are these people and where do they come from?

The sad part is they come from all walks of life including our own area, the main line of Philadelphia and similar meccas of fine living.

We are breeding these monsters by preaching one way of life or value and living another. The kids are confused. But they're intelligent. They are interested in answers, not platitudes.

They are interested in guidance by example, not what an ancient book says. They are negative and rebellious. They mistake peace of the world with peace of mind.

How do you raise children who are building space ships instead of carrying signs?

You give them something of yourself. You give them values and standards which you are able to live with.

Most of all, you realize you're a parent who has in your possession, modeling clay.

The form and image this clay takes is not an accident. Seldom will it take form by outside factors.

It will be a thing of beauty only if you roll up your sleeves and work on it yourself.

## Billy Lytal Shoots For 11,000-Lb. Yield In '66

Billy Lytal of Summerfield, Texas, was shooting for a 10,000-lb. sorghum yield at planting time in 1965. This spring he is setting his goal another 1000 lbs. higher.

Lytal produced an average of 10,521.4 lbs. of sorghum on five and one-half acres last year. He was joined by 143 other top sorghum farmers from six states in shooting for top yields. All were members of DeKalb's Sorghum Master's Club.

Lytal started with a well-prepared seedbed and planted his sorghum on May 10 at a rate of 20 lbs. per acre in ten-inch rows. Prior to planting, he applied 223 lbs. of actual nitrogen, 203 lbs. of P205 and 76 lbs. of sulphur.

During the year, the field was irrigated seven times. On

October 14 the five and one-half acres produced 56,720 lbs. of grain at 12.12 per cent moisture at a test weight of 56 lbs. Lytal used a new short stalked hybrid, DeKalb F-65.

It was a banner year for sorghum producers. The over-all U.S. yield average was 2800 lbs. per acre, which was a 35 per cent increase over the 1964 yields.

Top producers more than doubled this national average. Another area farmer, Keith Brock, produced a yield of 7891.1 pounds per acre in the program using DeKalb F-65.

The Sorghum Master's Club has attracted many leading producers during the past three years. Members have as their goal the production of top economic grain yields under practical farm conditions. All the yields reported are from more than one acre and are determined by field measurements and actual scale weights. Twelve club members topped 9000 lbs. and the 141 members averaged 6333.2 lbs.

### Court Accepts Equipment Bids

## Farmers Need To File For Water Exemption

Congressman Walter Rogers said this week farmers entitled to water depletion tax allowance for 1962 may protect their rights to tax refunds even though preparation of technical data has not been completed by the April 15 deadline.

The Congressman said he had consulted with officials of the Internal Revenue Service because many Panhandle - South Plains farmers had indicated they would not be able to obtain the information to support their claims by April 15.

"Taxpayers who believe they are entitled to depletion of wa-

ter for 1962 should file protective claims for refund with the District Director of the Internal Revenue Service before April 15, 1966, estimating the amounts of depletion and tax refunds to which they are entitled," Congressman Rogers said.

Congressman Rogers said he had been assured by Internal Revenue Commissioner Sheldon S. Cohen that "protective claims covering water depletion for 1962 filed on or before April 15, 1966, will be considered, pending the furnishing of the more exact information required."

## Post Office Announces Increase For Fees

Increases in money orders, insurance, registry, certified mail and C.O.D. rates became effective March 26, 1966. Postmaster Wright Williams announced.

The cost of operating these five special services now exceeds revenues by \$60 million annually. The fee increases will narrow the cost-revenue gap by \$36 million, based on business handled in Fiscal Year 1965.

Fees for money orders, registry and C.O.D. were last changed in 1961; insurance and certified mail in 1957.

The fee changes, announced in the January 11th Federal Register and confirmed in the register on February 25th, are

put into effect under the existing administrative authority of the Postmaster General.

The increases include: Money Order Fees; Domestic and international money order fees will be increased by 5 cents.

Insurance Fees: The minimum fee bracket will be increased from \$10 to \$15 and the minimum fee will be 20 cents instead of 10 cents. The revised insurance fees will be as follows:

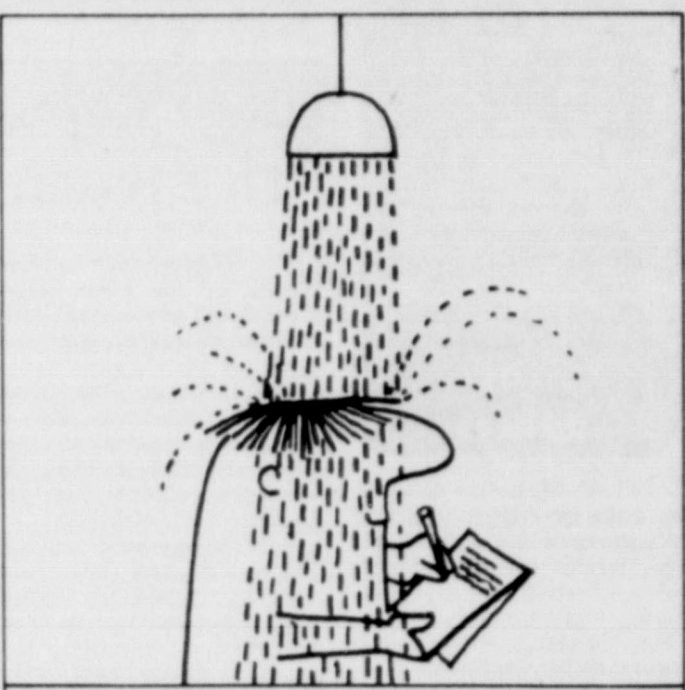
\$ 0.01 - \$ 15 ..... 20 cents  
\$ 15.01 - \$ 50 ..... 30 cents  
\$ 50.01 - \$100 ..... 40 cents  
\$100.01 - \$150 ..... 50 cents  
\$150.01 - \$200 ..... 60 cents

Registry Fees: The present 60 cents and 75 cents fees will be combined into a single fee at 75 cents for values up to \$100. Registry fees for articles valued in excess of \$100 will remain unchanged.

C.O.D. Fees: The present 40 cents and 50 cents fee brackets will be combined into one fee bracket at 60 cents for amounts up to \$10. There will be no change in the fees covering items valued above \$10.

Certified Mail: The fee will be increased 10 cents from the present 20 cents per item to 30 cents.

Losses incurred in the operation of special services are paid from funds drawn from the Federal Treasury. The fee increases will shift a substantial portion of the special service cost borne by the public to the users of these services.
