THERE WAS something of a hassle recently when the National Commission on Product Safety reported 122 models of color television sets have been catching fire at an above-average rate. The makers of these sets protested the identification of their products, claiming (with some justification) that the likelihood of one's catching fire still was so slight as to be negligible.

I notice my own set was one of those in the "high-risk" category (30 in every 100,000 catch fire).

I'm not sure what I'd do if my set caught fire; it likely would depend on what program happened to be on. There are times when I'd probably fan the blaze.

PRESIDENT Nixon is to be applauded for trying to hold the line of the budget for the Health, Education and Welfare agency, but the powerful National Education Assn., nation's largest teacher group, immediately threatened reprisals against those congressmen who upheld the President's veto.

Like a big bully who's been denied some free candy, the NEA's president, George Fischer of Des Moines, Iowa, said "We want to beat five or 10 congressmen who switched their vote on the veto."

"We will use them as an example. We will put the fear of God in politicians all over the country."

The NEA is screaming that voting against HEW is a vote against kids and education. But much of the money listed in that budget has been spent in the past in wealthy areas for programs of no special need in education.

HEW is the villain in the all-out drive to integrate all schools without regard to wishes of parents, black or white. It is an organization most of us could do without altogether.

For a look at the grateful attitude of some of the nation's welfare recipients, one might consider what happened in Milwaukee recently:

Welfare recipients swarmed through the city's main business district, smashing display cases in protest against rejection of their demands for extra winter clothing allowances.

About 270 persons, most of them women, swept through a store, overturning racks and chanting: "We want charge accounts."

With all that energy, you'd think they could go to work somewhere.

510 COUNTED IN SCHOOL CENSUS

The 1970 school census has been completed and the final head count for school age children living in the Sudan Independent School district at the present time is 510. This includes the children who will attend the first grade the coming school year.

This does not show a great change, as 480 are presently enrolled in the Sudan schools. State and federal funds are based on the number counted in the yearly census.

Black Manifesto Called a Flop



Do you remember when James Forman startled the people of this country by interrupting the Sunday morning service at Riverside Church in New York City to read the "Black Manifesto"?

This astounding document declared, "We are dedicated to building a socialist society inside the United States, where the total means of production and distribution are in the hands of the state."

What has happened since that Sunday morning, May 4, 1969? Forman demanded, you recall, that the white churches and synagogues pay to his organization \$500 million, under the threat of "total disruption of selected church-sponsored agencies operating anywhere in the U. S. and the world."

Mixed Reactions
In the face of this threat, the Episcopal Church voted to provide \$200,000 to the National Committee of Black Churchmen, with the understanding that Forman's organization — the National Black Economic Development Conference — would "be the ultimate recipient."

The National Council of Churches voted to provide \$500,000 to the same group for the same purpose.

Some sought to justify these decisions. The Christian Herald, in November of last year, published an article which said that Forman and his supporters were asking "nothing more than any parent wants for his or her children."

"They are asking," the Christian Herald article continued, "to participate fully in the American Dream."

Many church leaders, on the other hand, stood up against

this un-American and un-Christian position.

A black minister, Rev. C. L. Conner, pastor of the Pilgrim Baptist Church in Cincinnati, declared, "We have preachers who are so cowardly as to allow godless people to come into their services, disrupt their service and read the Black Manifesto. . . . I want them to know personally that I neither have respect for them nor their parishioners who tolerate this 'black-mail attempt.'"

How does the matter stand now?

Dramatic Change
David Poling, head of the Christian Herald organization, said recently, in his nationally syndicated newspaper column, "The most dramatic mind change in religious circles has whirled around the churches involved with the reparation demands of James Forman."

The Forman affair has not only failed but injured a lot of people in the process. One student radical, an active supporter of Forman's reparations movement, admitted to this writer that it was a poor tactic and a major flop.

Poling noted that money has been withheld and "court contests have already been filed."

Many months ago, when the issue was still not settled, I wrote in this column, "I suggest that you pray that this program will be defeated."

Now I suggest that you pray again, thanking God for His intervention in this serious situation and asking Him to turn the attention of churchmen again to the real business of the church — fulfilling the command of the Master to "make disciples of all the nations, teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you."

The 61 man crew of Southwestern Public Service Company's Plant X, located between Earth and Amherst in Lamb County, will receive recognition for completing one-million man-hours without a lost-time injury at a dinner Friday night (Feb. 6) at the Corral Restaurant in Muleshoe.

There has not been a lost-time injury at Plant X since October of 1960. Since that time, the crew has worked nearly 1,150,000 man-hours, passing the 1-million mark in 1969.

Bob Drake, plant manager, will receive the million man-hour award from Roy Thomas of Amarillo, production superintendent for the electric company. Presidential citations for safety leadership will go to the plant supervisors, with the presentation being made by Cliff Morrow of Amarillo, plant safety supervisor.

Medicare Deadline Set

John G. Hutton, Social Security Manager, reminds everyone that there is a very important deadline rapidly approaching for those persons born October, 1901 - September, 1902 and who have never enrolled for

supplementary medical insurance part of Medicare. To be eligible for this coverage, a person must enroll during a General Enrollment Period. The General Enrollment period this year ends on March 31, 1970. If those born between Oct. 1, 1901, and the end of September, 1902, don't enroll in this one, they cannot enroll at all because this is the last opportunity which can be offered under the law.

The supplementary medical insurance, also referred to as the doctor bill part of Medicare, is
