SEN. GORE of Tennessee, Sen. Percy of Illinois and some of the others who voted against the nomination of G. Harold Carswell to the Supreme Court were quite incensed when President Nixon stated that no southerner who believed in strict interpretation of the constitution could be approved for the tribunal by the present senate.

Whoever Texas can elect in his place can't be any worse, in my opinion.

But just to show you how magnanimous I am, I want you to vote, even if you are a Yarborough supporter (and there are many, I understand, right in this area.)

## BAND PARENTS MEET TONIGHT

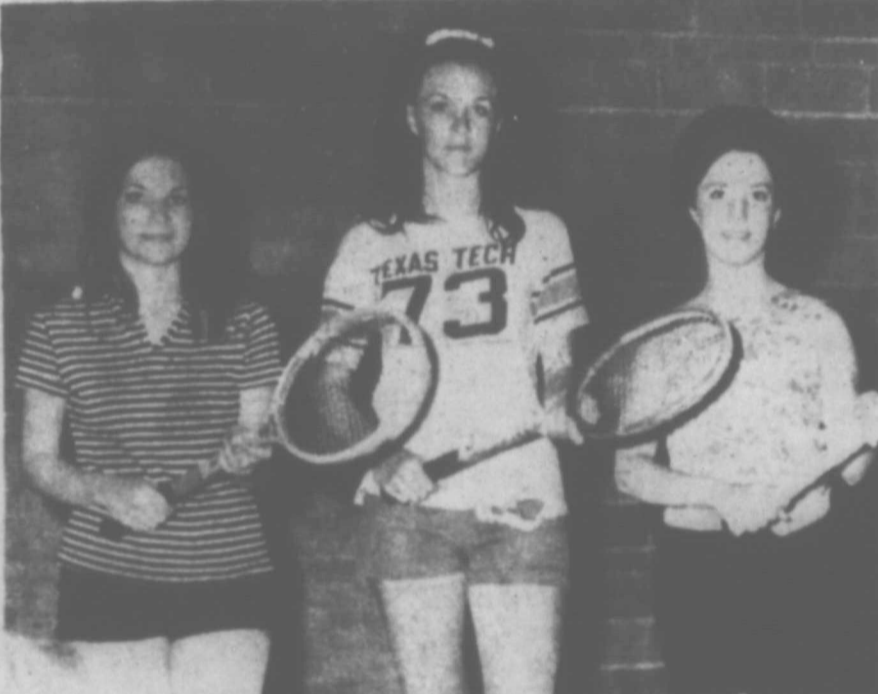
The Band Parents will meet tonight, Thursday, at 7:30 p. m. in the school band hall.

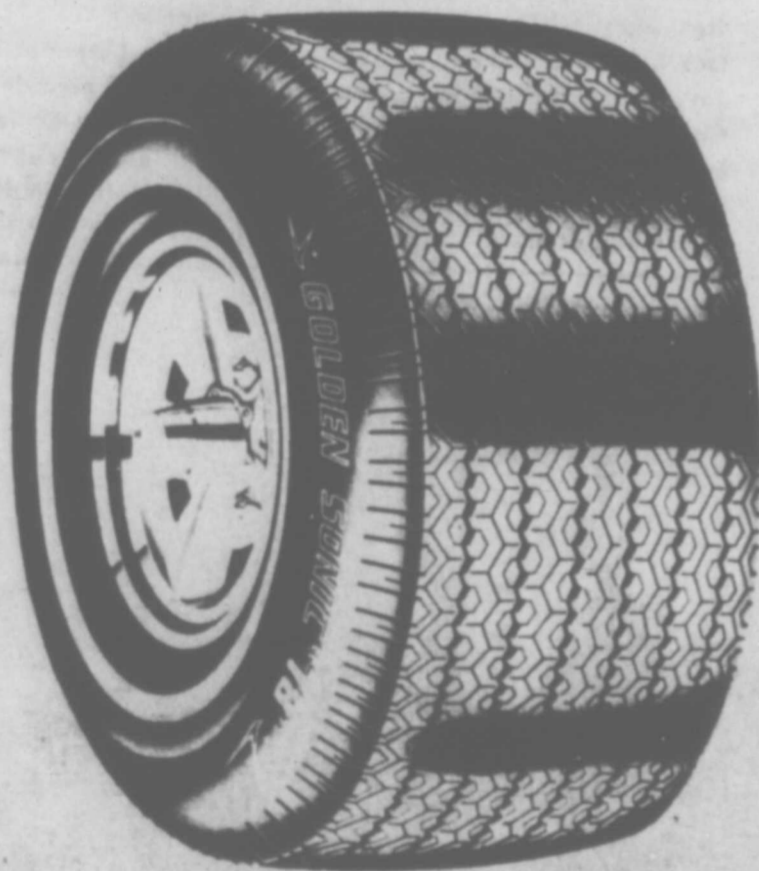
