Contract Let For Church Addition

A contract was let this week to Virgil Murry of Lubbock by the First Baptist Church of Sudan for construction of an education-fellowship hall unit.

The contract price was

\$36,000.00 plus furnishings and will include the construction of a brick building containing approximately 3400 square feet of floor space and will be adjoined to the present auditorium on the

west side. The unit will provide education space for three departments, including ten classes, and kitchen facilities. Murry is current president of Lubbock Home Builders Association.

A. B. Culbertson and Company of Fort Worth will handle the bond program of \$30,000.00 through their representative, Eugene Brand of Lubbock. The program will begin next week. Construction on the new unit is planned to begin by May 15. The old parsonage building is being moved to make room for the new building. Estimated completion time for the new building is 60 to 90 days.
