The exercise had been built up extensively by press and radio for almost a month ahead of time. One guy surveying the fantastic damage in Plainview Saturday morning (estimated to total \$4.7 million) said, "Boy, when they simulate a tornado around here, they really do it up in style!"

## SCHOOL PRINCIPAL HIRED

Leo A. Fields was hired Monday night at a meeting of the Sudan School Board Trustees as high school principal to succeed Kenneth Noles, who will be serving as school superintendent.

Fields, who has been teaching since 1947, has been engaged as athletic director and head coach of Kress High School for the past 12 years. Prior to that he was coach at Dimmitt and Seagraves.

He is married and has two sons, one of which is serving with the armed forces in Vietnam and the other will be attending college.

He and his wife plan to move to Sudan this summer.

## ELECTION SLATED SATURDAY

The state-wide primary election is slated to be held Saturday. Most candidates will be unopposed on the Lamb County Democratic Party primary ballot. Locally, Hubert Dykes is seeking re-election for commissioner, precinct No. 4; W. T. (Tobe) Vereen is unopposed for re-election as Justice of Peace as is Guy Walden for precinct chairman.

However, on the state level Lloyd Bentsen is opposing incumbent Ralph Yarborough for

United States Senator; David Brown is opposing Crawford Martin for Attorney General; and Ben Ramsey and Connie Lawson are vying for Railroad Commissioner. screen means there is lightning in the thunderstorm. If the streaks fade slowly, there is a dangerous storm whether there is a tornado in it or not.

If bands become wide and linger, there is a storm in the offing that can cause severe damage or spawn a tornado. The wider the bands, the more serious the storm is becoming.

The maximum number of miles away a tornado can be sighted by this method appears to be about 20, but the average number of miles off when detection is made is about five miles—the reason for late in finding shelter.

Colored or black and white sets can be used, and an antenna is not necessary. An outside antenna expands the range of detection, however. Lightning can be seen in color on colored sets, but authorities say it is best to turn to black and white for tornado detection.

The reason a tornado can be detected with no antenna or with rabbit ears is that a tornado is in the line of sight, up high, where there is nothing to keep the television set from picking up the electrical frequency of the tornado.

This frequency can be picked up on channel 2 because it is on a 55 megacycle band, the nearest television has to the electrical pulse generator of a tornado.

This method of tornado detection has been cleared by the weather bureau after finding that it is really more effective than radar in pinpointing a tornado locally.

## May Designated Clean-Up Month

The month of May has been designated a "clean-up" month for the city of Sudan, according to Mayor Arnold Reed. All residents are asked to clean their own property and added that if

citizens will place any type of trash or rubbish (cut weeds, rocks, trees) or any objects to be discarded where they may be easily reached, that the city maintenance men will pick

these up and haul them to the city dump.

Reed also announced a rate for summer weed mowing. The cost will be based on 50 foot lots. Cost to mow one lot, \$5.00; two adjoining lots, \$8.00; three adjoining lots, \$10.00; four adjoining lots, \$12.00; five adjoining lots, \$14.00; six adjoining lots, \$15.00; each adjoining lot will be \$1.00 per lot.

All mowing work for property which is not subdivided or platted will be charged \$4.00 per hour.

He said that with the cooperation of all residents the city can maintain a more orderly appearance throughout the summer with a minimum of labor after the initial clean-up.

## Do We Need God's Help?



When the Apollo 13 spacecraft was crippled by an explosion in mid-space and Astronauts Lovell, Haise, and Swigert were in mortal peril, the people of the nation joined in prayer for their safe return.

After they splashed down in the Pacific, the president proclaimed Sunday, April 19, a day of prayer and thanksgiving — a time to express our gratitude to God for His help in this emergency.

This was in keeping with our finest national tradition of expectantly turning to God when in need and then remembering to thank Him.

This tradition, however, has been somewhat neglected in recent years.

**Firm Trust in God**  
The picture of George Washington, kneeling in the snow at Valley Forge, is well known.

Whether or not this picture is historically accurate in every particular I do not know. But that Washington had a firm and unflinching trust in God and that he relied on divine assistance in difficult times is crystal clear.

In a letter written on January 22, 1777, he said, "Providence has heretofore saved us in a remarkable manner, and on this we must principally rely."

Later, when the army which he commanded was beginning to achieve the longed-for victory, he wrote, "The hand of Providence has been so conspicuous in all this that he must be worse than an infidel that lacks faith, and more than wicked that has not gratitude enough to acknowledge his obligations."

It is certainly evident that, in the time of our first president, there was a ready disposition to seek the help and guidance way from the evidence of a love like that. Jesus died for you and me, to pay for our sins that God's eternal word said cost "death", — so, in the fullness of time, God so loved us that He sent His only begotten Son, Jesus, to pay off our death sentence that we could come back into His family, redeemed from the devil, and live forever, like Him!

In Jesus, we not only are given the gift of eternal life, but He changes us and saves us from our sinfulness, our cruel selfishness, our evil imaginings and deeds. However, we must choose Jesus,

of God in finding solutions to problems of great difficulty.

Would God help us, if we asked Him?  
The Bible says, "Ye have not, because ye ask not."

Psalms 50 contains this counsel, "Call upon Me in the day of trouble. I will deliver thee and thou shalt glorify Me."

What better help could we get?

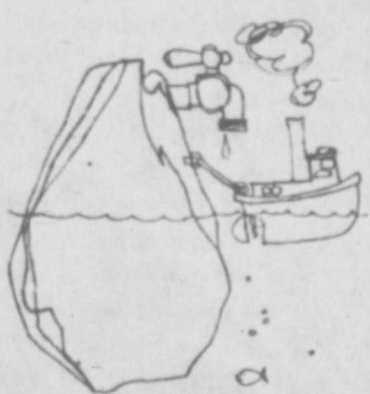

# 30 Seconds That Can Change Life?

"Thirty Seconds That Can Change Your Life!"

Everyone, from weight-reducing clubs to investment salesmen, have used that advertisement catch-line!

And, no doubt, it has caught a lot of attention, too — because almost everyone is alert to the call of instant success.

Can anyone seriously entertain the idea that such success could actually come in 30 seconds? Even those flamboyant "rags-to-riches" schemes are not as fast as that!

Thirty seconds can be the introduction to an idea that can eventually have life-changing effects — but the changes themselves come more slowly.

Everyone knows that, in the area of business, yet its significance is often overlooked in the area of spiritual truths.

Instant Metamorphosis? Countless Christians proclaim that an instantaneous transformation will occur, the moment a believer accepts Jesus Christ as his personal Savior. And they are usually right in what they say — that Jesus will give eternal life and the Holy Spirit will lead to abundant life — but often what they imply is misleading.

The implication is that the new convert will be immediately noticeably different. And he may be. The classic example is Paul, who saw Jesus briefly, on the way to Damascus, and was suddenly transformed from a persecutor of Christians to the chief of Christ's apostles.

This account, however, is not quite accurate — or, at least, not quite complete. Paul did not become a mature believer overnight.

As Paul wrote, 20 years after his conversion, "Brethren, I do not regard myself as having laid hold on it yet, . . . but I press on toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus."

If you have been a Christian long, yet you still feel imperfect, pray about it. You may be right on schedule.

It required at least a three-year (Gal. 1:18) and possibly a four-year (Acts 11:26) change period before he began any extensive individual public ministry.

Yes, there can be immediate differences; but, no, it must not be expected that there will be an instant metamorphosis.

The actual post-conversion experience of Paul is more likely to be typical of most believers. When Paul accepted the truth of Christ, he declared his new understanding in the synagogue immediately.

But Paul's witness was brief, and then he retired from view for several years. It was during this second phase of his Christian development that he learned to live in constant contact with Christ.

Maturing Takes Time  
Today, this step of maturing in the Lord is often neglected, or misunderstood, or even repudiated. Almost universally, too little attention and time are given to a "babe in Christ."

Developing mature dependence on Christ, regardless of circumstances, is necessarily a time-consuming process.

Does Christ change lives in 30 seconds?  
Yes, He does. But, after 30 years, He will still be working out those changes in believers' lives.

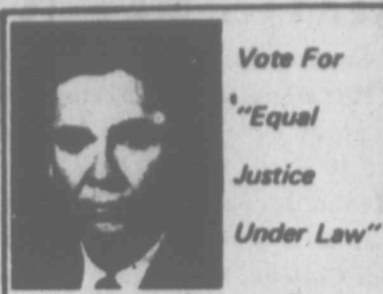

## May Is American Bike Month!

4. Slow down at all intersections, look both ways, then proceed with caution.
5. Always give pedestrians the right of way.
6. Watch out for parked cars pulling into traffic, or for car doors opening.
7. Don't carry packages or passengers that interfere with your vision or control.
8. Always use proper hand signals to let motorists know you intend to turn or stop.

**Farm Bill Proposed**

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce supports the adoption of a farm bill that would support prices at a level that would give farmers an opportunity to operate at a profit. This could be a program similar to what we have had since 1965.

The Federal Government, commodity groups, and our own organization should be encouraged to work on programs that would remove the need for acreage controls, price supports and direct payments. Some of the

programs that would help remove these needs are:

1. The State Department should take more aggressive action to counter Common Market Tariffs on U. S. agriculture products with tariffs on industrial imports from Common Market countries and other countries that bar our agricultural products from their market place.

2. Our government and commodity groups should be more aggressive in promoting U. S. agricultural products at home and abroad.

Parity should be based on the purchasing power farmers had during a base period rather than the average price of a commodity during the past three years. The program should not be extended to other products not now included in the program.

We are opposed to any type of long-term land retirement or whole farm retirement program. We are also opposed to proposed legislation calling for a low level of price support and participating farmers agreeing to "set-aside" a percentage of their tilled land. Many segments of our economy are subsidized for the benefit of the consumer.

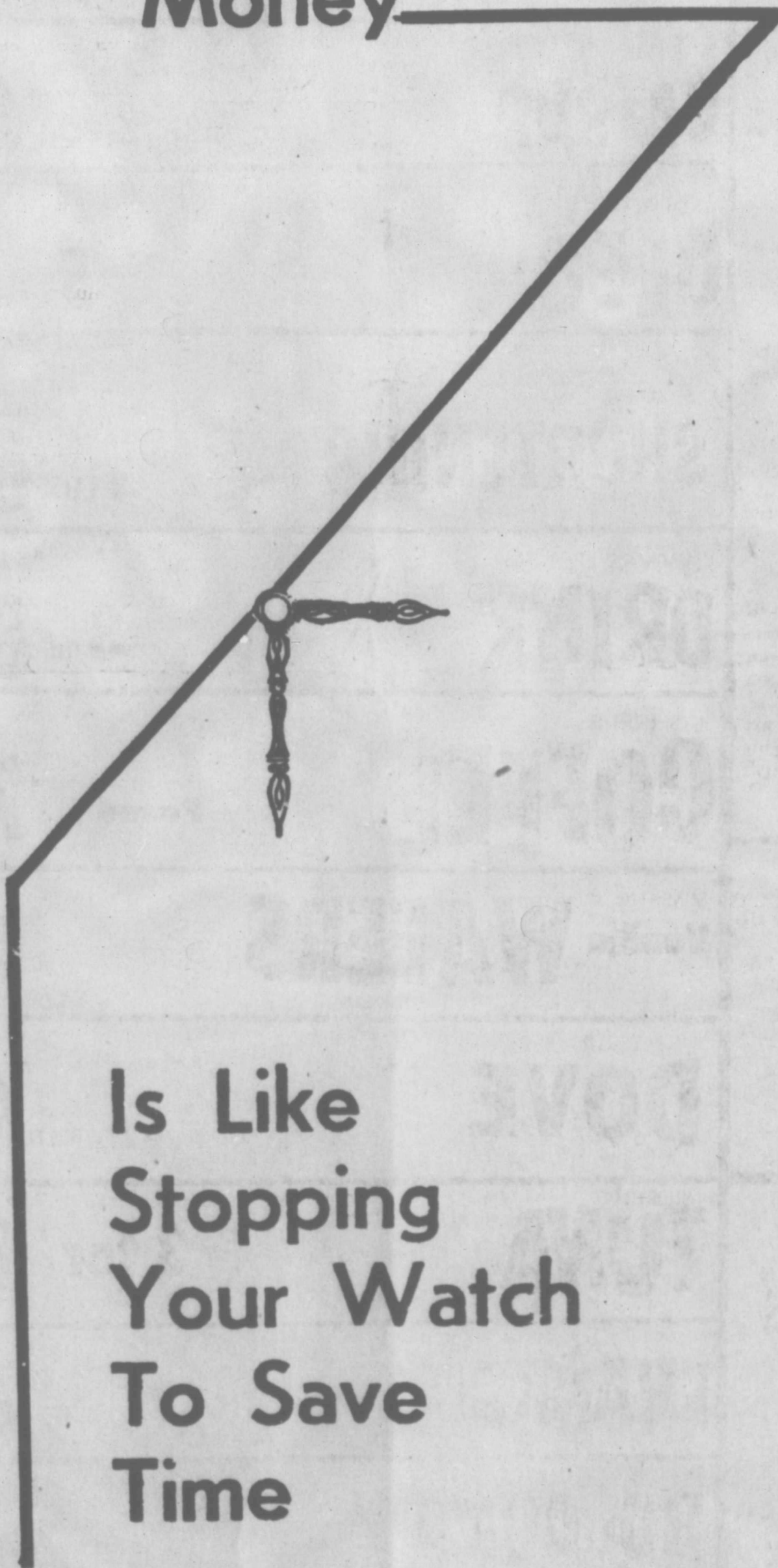
