## WOODWORK TORNADO HITS CITY OF LUBBOCK

LAST WEEK, when students were rioting, clenching fists, demonstrating and tearing down flags instead of studying for finals as they should have been, an Amarillo reporter called Danny Andrews, student editor at Wayland Baptist College in Plainview.

"Have you had any protest demonstrations on the campus?" she asked.

Wayland, which has become more liberal through the years, still proudly retains its reputation as a religious institution where students are a bit more mature. Andrews, with tongue in cheek, told the caller,

"No, we don't go in for stuff like that here—we just sit around under the trees, look at birds and read our Bibles." The Amarillo reporter was broken up in laughter.

As a matter of fact, to their credit, Wayland students do all these things, but Andrews obviously was making fun of the extreme image some have of church institutions.

THE DEMONSTRATIONS, which always have been out of hand, now are getting to the crisis stage. Student rebellion always has been the first step toward outright armed revolution in the Latin nations and others at which we have always sort of looked down our noses.

Now the campus revolution is on our own doorstep. By the time you read this, or soon thereafter, there could be violence involving demonstrations at Texas Tech, or perhaps even some of the smaller colleges nearby. What do you do when your own kid is attending a college where the students spit on the American flag, shout Viet Cong support, throw rocks at policemen? What if your own child is involved?

Well, this is a decision which each parent must make, and without doubt, some right here will have to make that decision soon. It won't be an easy one.

It must be remembered that on even the most violent of campuses, there always are many students who want to go on attending classes, trying to learn something valuable, instead of trying to bring social change. But these more responsible ones will be affected, because classes may be suspended, or they could be caught in violence just by walking across the campus. So what do you do?

I don't know the answers. I do feel, however, that I would rather my own youngsters get no college training at all if the price is to put them into a campus rebellion or into a climate of widespread drug use.

If the fist-clenching, rock-throwing, sign-carrying youths had to go to work for their education, perhaps they'd have less time for protest. So far there has been no protest that I know of at James Connally Technical Institute, where students are learning trades.

As the tornado season continues, residents of the Sudan and Amherst area are more alert when threatening clouds appear. Increasing the anxiety perhaps was the knowledge that a city the size of Lubbock was damaged so severely by a devastating storm Monday night.

At press time, there are 20 confirmed deaths related to the storm and millions of dollars of damage. Some reports go as high as \$250,000,000. Some 750 dwellings were reported destroyed, leaving some 4800 people homeless. Relief centers have been set-up to accommodate the homeless.

Hardest hit was the downtown section from Avenue T to Texas Avenue then north to the Municipal airport.

Sight-seers are asked not to plant to tour the damaged area.

## Is Sex Always Sinful?



"The ultimate virtue in Christian theology — at least in its literal, fundamentalist form — has been celibacy," according to Dr. William Masters and Virginia Johnson, whose claim to fame is that they have conducted extensive sexual research and have written two books — "Human Sexual Response" and "Human Sexual Inadequacy."

Perhaps their statements on sexual response and/or inadequacy are more dependable than their dictum on Christian theology. Or, perhaps not.

People who make unfounded statements in one area may, quite likely, make unfounded statements in other areas, also.

Here's another quotation from the same authors: "Orthodox Christianity, whether Catholic or Protestant, drew from the context of 'sex is sin' to put a negative connotation on the sexual side of marriage."

Who Invented Sex? It is possible that some religious leaders have equated sex with sin, but the Bible does not.

In fact, the Bible tells us that God invented sex and blessed the man and woman whom He made. Genesis declares, "God created man in His own image. . . . Male and female created He them. And God blessed them and God said unto them, 'Be fruitful and multiply and replenish the earth and subdue it.'"

Since the method of man's multiplying was sexual union — the man with his wife — this was, in effect, a command by God to Adam and Eve to have sexual relations with each other. Can obeying a command given by God be sin? Obviously, the answer is "No."

Then where did the idea come from that "sex is sin"? Could it have come from those who believe in advocating illicit sex?

The sexual conduct which these people say they favor is, indeed, evil.

Speaking in a seminar on "Toward Authentic Morality for Modern Man," in Atlanta recently, Anson Mount, public affairs director of "Playboy," said, "We feel there has been quite an emphasis in our culture over the past 2000 years on the dark, terrifying possibilities of sex. We've heard quite enough about its terrors and its tyranny, about the disease and wrecked lives and tortured souls."

He poked fun at the "horrible implications that can result from going to bed with somebody without a marriage license."

Why Abuse It? But there are no "dark, terrifying possibilities of sex" within the marriage relationship. There are no "disease and wrecked lives and tortured souls" as a consequence of sex when used as God intended it to be.

Sex is not sinful. It is intended to be an intimate relationship reserved for a husband and wife.

The Bible says, "Marriage is honorable in all, and the bed undefiled." But it adds the warning that "fornicators and adulterers God will judge."

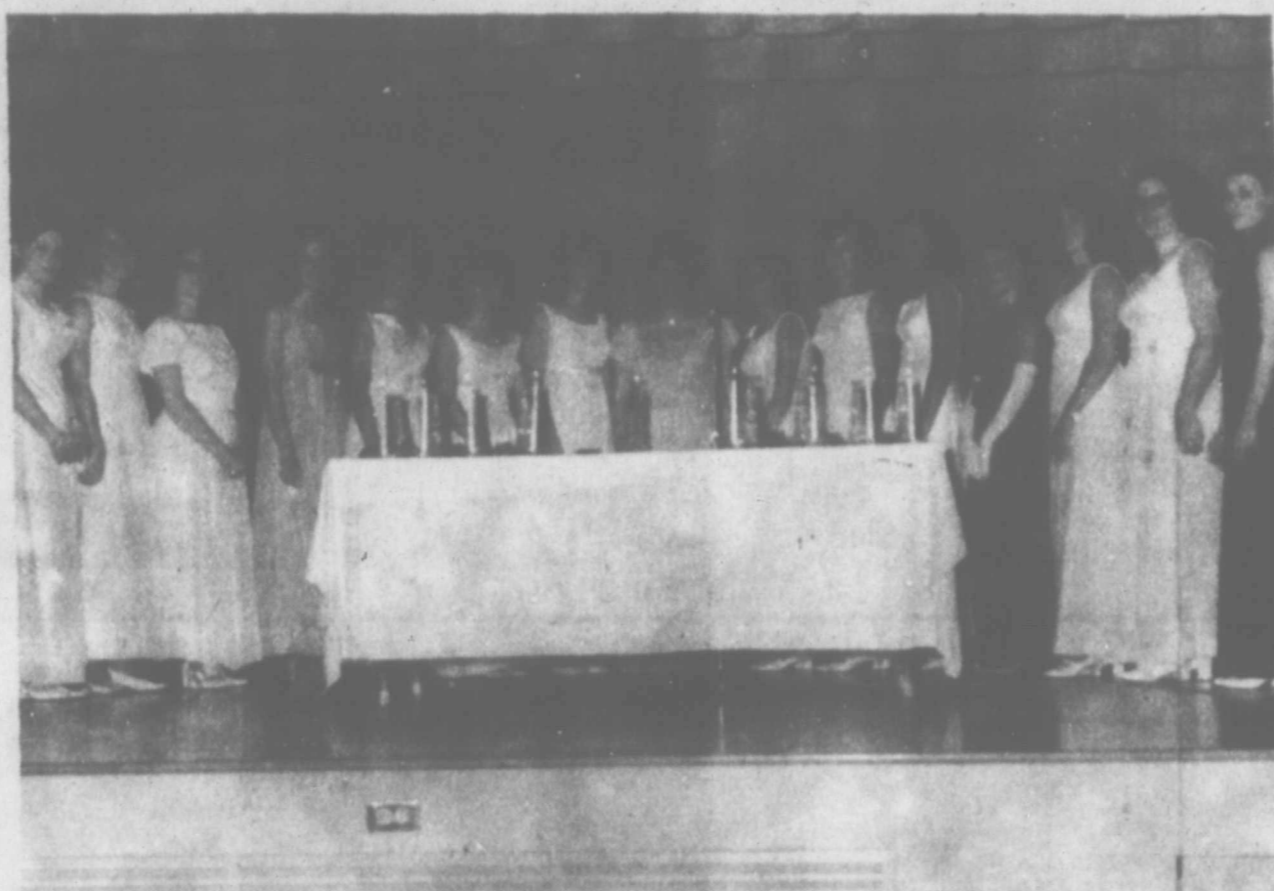
