OKAY, so I own a motorcycle. And I like to ride it. Yeah, I know. It's dangerous; it's dumb; and a grown man looks ridiculous because he loses his dignity.

I can stand all this because lots of other things people do every day are even more dangerous, and because I do lots of dumb things, so one more won't matter. And who needs dignity when he can enjoy riding his motorcycle?

But there are a couple of things I don't like about riding motorcycles. One is that most motorcycles, including mine, are too noisy. In most cases, this is compounded by deliberately making them noisier by removing the baffle, or inside part of the muffler.

Still, the single most irksome thing about riding a motorcycle is the comment one hears at least once for every hour he rides, as he alights from his machine: "Well, well, here's one of Hell's Angels!"

Sometimes this tired greeting is brilliantly altered to "Well, you must be one of Hell's Angels" or maybe even to "I see you've joined Hell's Angels."

Frankly I have learned to detest Hell's Angels, although I never even met one, and have seen only a few motorcycle riders who remotely act as if they belong in this category. Most of the adult cycle riders I know are responsible persons who just like to ride. (Of course, I consider myself one of those responsible persons. . . I was responsible for three accidents last week.)

Admittedly, there are all kinds of motorcycle riders, including those who gun their motors up and down the streets until you're ready to shoot them off on the next lap, and those who cut in front of cars and have hair down to here and a sneer on their mugs.

But there are people like that who drive cars, too. So don't lump all cyclists in one category. Among my acquaintances who ride motorcycles are college teachers, a tax accountant, a district judge and the owner of photography studio.

So please don't ask the next motorcycle rider you see if he's one of Hell's Angels. He may be tempted to live up to the label just once, and do a wheelie up your back. (If you don't know what a wheelie is, ask your teen-age son.)

THUNDER STORMS ROAM AREA

"Some good comes from every rain. . .", as the saying goes. This was proven true in the Sudan and Amherst area by the recent thunderstorms.

The moisture has been very

beneficial to dryland farmers who desperately needed it for planting. However, some farmers report that they will have to replant some cotton due to heavy rains.

The area was covered with thunderstorms Sunday and Monday evenings. Most showers have been accompanied by high winds with little or no hail being reported in the area.

Rainfall varied within the area with up to 1 1/2 inches reported

in Sudan. Amherst received 1/2 inch Sunday night with only sprinkles Monday. One inch was reported some 3 miles south of Sudan Monday evening. However, the southwest part of the area, which needed the moisture most, has received only a scant .25 of an inch this week. The northern part of the county has reported adequate moisture for the time being.

Local Civil Defense workers emphasized this week that all storm clouds are being watched and the severe weather alerts will be sounded if the need arises.

More scattered showers are forecast for this area for the remainder of the week.
