WHAT IS MORE American than Coca-Cola?  
Well, would you believe cheating?

Unfortunately, cheating seems to be pretty much a way of life in these United States, and now comes the Federal Trade Commission accusing the Coca Cola Co. and a producer of promotional games of deceiving the public in claims that nearly everyone who correctly played "Big Name Bingo" would be a \$100 winner.

Instead, said the FTC, the companies invoked an undisclosed rule of the game which prevented "many, if not all" contestants from getting the promised prizes.

The FTC claimed that the ads led people to believe that if they worked out one correct answer to the contest question involved, they would get \$100, but that the company required more than one correct answer on an entry in at least some cases.

Idon't know exactly what they meant, since I never did play that game. I gave up some time ago on such stuff, since it is quite rare for any winners to be announced on any promotion of this sort.

POSSIBLY another commentary on the state of the nation today is in an action proposed by Conoco at some of its stations in Dallas. At these locations, customers buying gas must have the exact change or use a credit card.

The idea is to thwart holdups, which occur frequently in large cities, often with violence involved. At 10 Conoco stations in the Dallas area, the money a customer pays for his purchase will be dropped in a locked safe (presumably one so large two or three persons couldn't move it, although the story I read didn't say so). The operator of the station will have no cash at all.

This may get more operators killed by frustrated holdup men, but at least it will save the company money. And, of course, it may not work that way; it might just keep the holdups from occurring, once the word gets out. Let's hope so.

Delion was the leading hitter for Amherst, with Stanley Miller, Kem Harmon, Danny Carter, Martin Tucker and Thompson each getting a single.

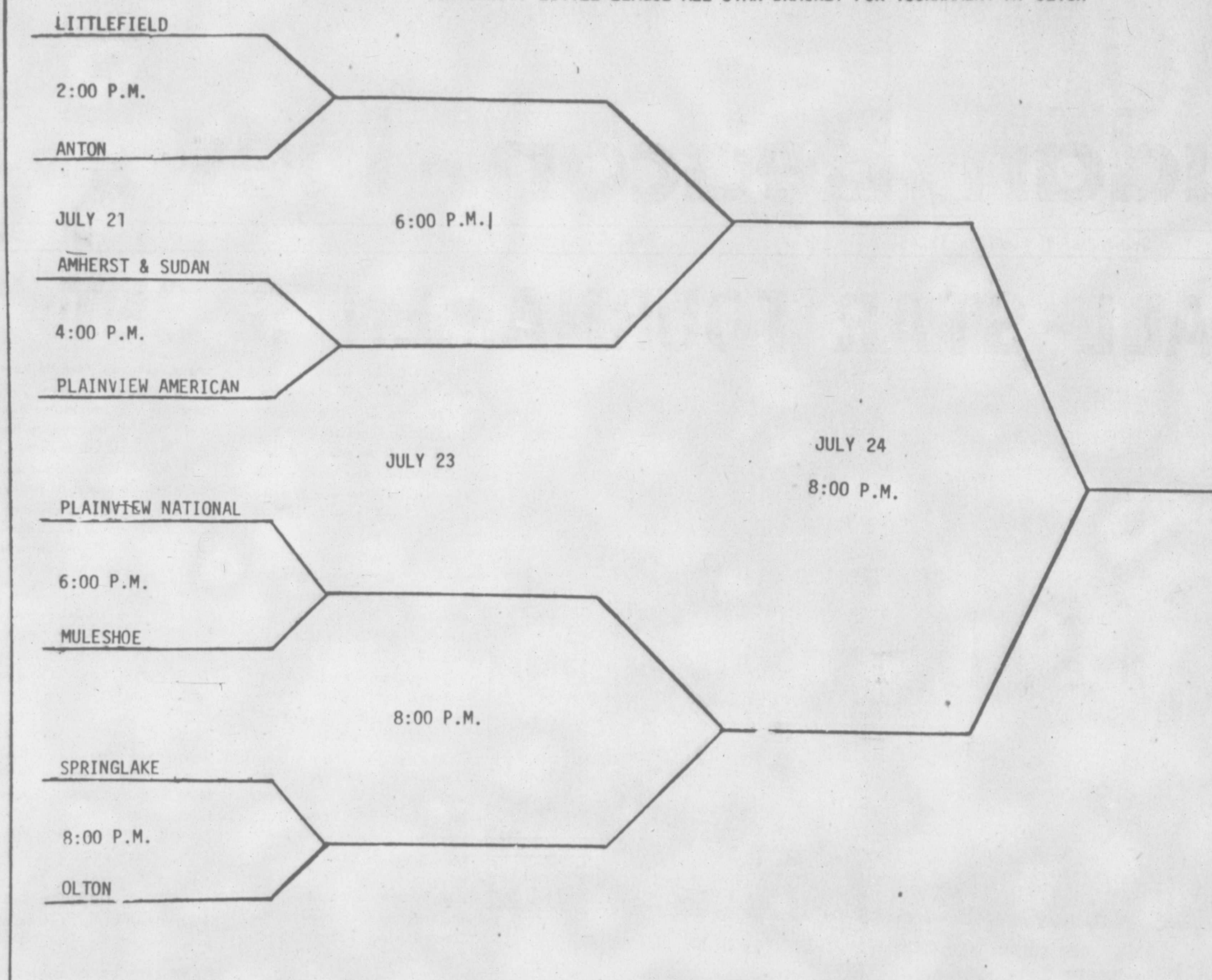
Sudan will play two make-up games with Ware-Richey of Littlefield with dates to be set later.

**Is Abortion Justifiable?**

The rapid growth of the world's population has been cited as a reason for liberalizing laws against abortion. Ten states have already taken action to make it easier for a woman to have an abortion if she is about to become the mother of an unwanted child.

Until just a few years ago, the laws of all 50 states prohibited abortion in all cases except to save the life of the mother.

Some churches have recently taken action to pave the way for legalizing abortion. One major denomination, in its general conference, urged removing abortion from the criminal code and placing it under medical regulations.

The American Medical Association has voted to make abortion the "decision of the patient's doctor as he determines what is best for the welfare of the patient." This action seems to disregard entirely the welfare of the child who has not yet been born.

"Never Necessary"

Doctors are not agreed on the desirability of this move, however. Said Dr. Wesley W. Hall, president-elect of the AMA, "We are victims of our own folly. . . . I see no urgency in having liberalized criminal abortions."

There may be a good case for the law providing for abortion if needed to preserve the mother's life.

However, with modern medical methods and facilities, this may rarely — or never — be necessary. In fact, Dr. Joseph P. Donnelly, formerly medical director of a New Jersey hospital where 115,000 children were born between 1947 and 1961, has said, "Abortion is never necessary to save the life of the mother."

Dr. Leo T. Heywood, professor of obstetrics and gynecology at Creighton University School of Medicine, says, "I am against abortion. It is not necessary in the practice of medicine, and it destroys the very thing the physician is dedicated to preserve — human life."

Dr. John L. Grady, chief of staff of Glades General Hospital, Belle Glade, Fla., says, "The right of the unborn child to life must outweigh the desires of others to destroy it."

When God said, "Thou shalt not kill," did He mean this to apply to grown people only, or to infants and also those who have not yet been born? At what point is an unborn child entitled to life?

**Abortion Immoral**

Rabbi Tibor Stern of Miami has stated, "Centuries of traditional Jewish law clearly establishes the human nature of the unborn fetus and the immorality of abortion. Those Jews who support abortion legislation have erased every trace of Jewish law from their religion."

The Colorado Supreme Court has stated, "Child should include a human being upon conception and during pregnancy, as well as one actually born."

Dr. Richard V. Jaynes, Detroit obstetrician-gynecologist, says of abortion, "Legal or illegal, statistics show that it is definitely more dangerous than childbirth to the mother. To the child, of course, it is the ultimate danger—death."

Can we justify, on the basis of expediency, this destruction of human life — which has throughout our history been considered to be a criminal act?

## TAX MAN SAM SEZ:

The 1969 Tax Reform Act contained a change that can be important to many taxpayers. Under the old law you could decrease your withholding tax for the following year if your itemized deductions for the past year ran high enough to create a very large refund. However, under the new law you can now decrease your withholding during the year before you pay a lot of withholding tax that you don't owe. A good example of what can happen was brought out by the tornado and storm victims in West Texas. Many of these taxpayers are eligible to immediately reduce the amount of tax withheld from their pay, since their itemized deductions for the 1970 tax year will include a casualty loss amounting to several thousand dollars. Of course the itemized deduction provision of the law is not limited to casualty losses, but also applies to all types of itemized deductions. If your itemized deductions have increased by a very large amount you can obtain a new Form W-4 and a Form W-4 Schedule A

## NEWS OF SERVICEMEN

USS GUAM June 22--Marine Lane Corporal Dennis E. Cope, son of Mrs. Alberta Cope of Bullard, Tex., is participating in a mercy mission to earthquake-torn Peru with Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron 365 aboard the amphibious assault carrier USS Guam.

In addition to transporting 40 medical teams of eight to ten persons each into devastated areas of the country, the "choppers" are flying hundreds of disaster victims to the carrier, which is equipped with three operating rooms and 1,000 beds for treatment of the sick and injured.

The massive earthquakes in Peru have claimed an estimated 50,000 lives and left nearly a half-million people injured or homeless.

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## Have We Done Our Best?

Imagine an artist standing back from his newly-finished canvas and studying it intently. He holds up his thumb to check proportion and perspective. He scrutinizes each brush-stroke for fineness of curvature and detail. He squints, and varies the lighting, to evaluate the balance of color and contrast.

Finally, with hands on hips, the artist announces, "It's my masterpiece. But it is ugly." Ugly? The creation that represents the sum and excellence of his talent and experience, the best production of which he is capable—and he calls it ugly?

If he had tried to portray ugliness his creation would have been an achievement—but no. He was trying to synthesize beauty.

Yet ugliness is what he produced. Obviously, something is wrong.

What Went Wrong? It could be that he didn't try hard enough. Or, he didn't have the proper materials. Or someone else destroyed the creation. But these did not happen.

He gave it the best of his time and resources and protected it from any possible tampering.

No, the fault had to be more basic. Perhaps he was not born creative. Maybe he trained under an inadequate master. Or he might be incapable of comprehending the nature of beauty.

Somehow he failed, though he gave it his best.

It seems a pity. Actually, it is much worse, for this artist is us—and the creation is our world. It is a tragedy.

Sunday School Lesson for July 12, 1970

"The World: Man's Masterpiece," we will title it. You don't need me to tell you what it looks like. Stand back for a moment now and judge it for yourself.

Could you imagine someone stepping back from the world, with a critical eye surveying the whole, and declaring, "I like it. It is very good"?

It's impossible. Indeed, it seems impossible for most people even to imagine a world in the far future of which it could be said, "It is very good."

Why is it impossible? Not because we haven't tried. The best efforts of the best of men have been negligible. The fault is more basic.

True Beauty

To what true beauty there is in the world we have contributed almost nothing. We point to trees, parks, rivers, birds, wild life—everything from the lark to sunset—as the outstanding examples of our world's beauty. None of it was our doing. All of it, in fact, was more beautiful before we came along.

The artificial beauty that we have created is almost exclusively a reflection of the natural. Modern art is a rebellion against just this fact—that in all things beautiful nature had it first.

Who made this beauty? The Bible says, "God saw everything that He had made and, behold, it was very good."

He could make our world good again.
