WOODWORK Mrs. Chatwell Rites Held BY DALTON

THIS WEEK'S timely topics include such things as bricks, varicose veins, houses for people who mostly don't deserve them and the McFarlin Diamond, a real gem of a topic.

Varicose veins maybe sounds like a pretty unglamorous subject, but to those who have them, it's certainly no laughing matter. Dr. Wayne Brandstadt of Newspaper Enterprise Assn. offers some steps to take to prevent having them, although he cautions that once you have varicose veins, there's not much you can do to clear them up.

Varicose veins, he says, are caused by a failure of the valves in the veins to check the backward flow of the blood. "It occurs chiefly in the legs, especially in barbers, dentists, bank tellers and others who stand in one place for long periods.

"Whenever you must stand or sit for a long time, you should wiggle your toes vigorously at frequent intervals," he says. "Don't sit with your legs crossed and avoid wearing tight girdles or circular gartess. "



NICHOLS EARNS COLLEGE HOURS


