THIS WEEK'S timely topics include such things as bricks, varicose veins, houses for people who mostly don't deserve them and the McFarlin Diamond, a real gem of a topic.

Varicose veins maybe sounds like a pretty unglamorous subject, but to those who have them, it's certainly no laughing matter. Dr. Wayne Brandstadt of Newspaper Enterprise Assn. offers some steps to take to prevent having them, although he cautions that once you have varicose veins, there's not much you can do to clear them up.

Varicose veins, he says, are caused by a failure of the valves in the veins to check the backward flow of the blood. "It occurs chiefly in the legs, especially in barbers, dentists, bank tellers and others who stand in one place for long periods.

"Whenever you must stand or sit for a long time, you should wiggle your toes vigorously at frequent intervals," he says. "Don't sit with your legs crossed and avoid wearing tight girdles or circular garters."

If in spite of all this, your veins become dilated, you should get elastic stockings or spiral bandages and wear them to prevent "a full-blown varicose."

BUSH-PRICE RECEPTION SET

The Bush-Price tour will stop in Littlefield for a coffee reception at the XIT Room in The Security State Bank, 501 Phelps Ave. at 9:45 a.m., Friday, August 7, 1970, it was announced this week.

George Bush of Houston, Republican candidate for the U.S. Senate, will tour the Panhandle Friday and Saturday, Aug. 7 and 8, with Congressman Bob Price.

Rep. Price, the host, has made the arrangements for the campaign stops which include a barbecue and rodeo, a news conference and townhall meeting, a luncheon and a reception.

They will visit Plainview, Littlefield, Hereford, Amarillo, Aug. 7, and Pampa, Dalhart, Dumas, Stratford and Borger on Saturday, Aug. 8.

Bush and Price have both been popular Congressmen, reflected by the fact that Bush was unopposed by either party in 1968 and Price is unopposed this term. Bush has actively sponsored legislation in such areas as rural job development and has op-

posed efforts to severely restrict farm subsidies.

Also, Bush has introduced legislation to require Congressmen to give yearly disclosures of their assets and liabilities, which he has done annually since elected.

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR15)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 1-d, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 1-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops rather than upon the value of such lands and the crop growing thereon."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
General Election Nov. 3, 1970
NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (HJR15)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-b, Subsection (a), Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "(a) The State Building Commission is created and its duties heretofore vested in the agency of the same name by this Constitution and to the powers and duties the Legislature has vested or may vest in the Commission. Its membership shall consist of three Texas citizens appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. The term of each member shall be six years except in the first appointments to the Commission the Governor shall appoint one member for two

years, one for four years, one for six years, and thereafter one member biennially. The Governor shall biennially designate one member as Chairman. Vacancies in the Commission shall be filled by appointment by the Governor for the unexpired term. The provisions of this paragraph shall be self-enacting." Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment reconstituting the State Building Commission as a three-member appointive commission."

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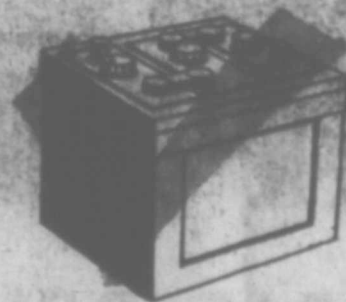
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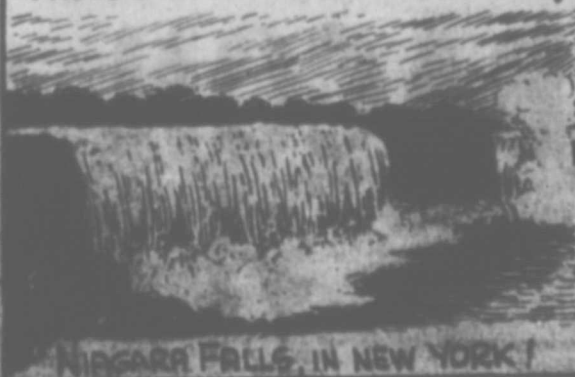

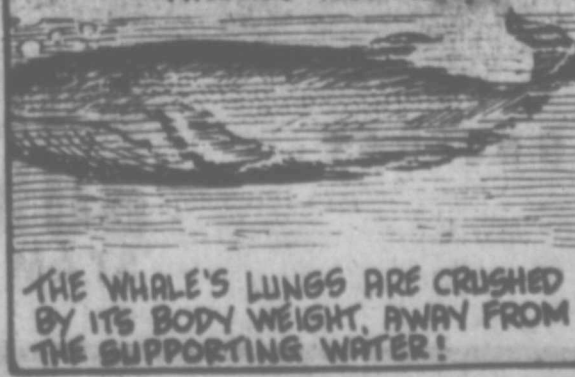
