#### EARLY MAILING SOUGHT HERE

yard stressed this week the importance of mailing Christmas packages and cards early, especially those to servicemen overseas.

Christmas parcels for servicemen overseas can be sent until November 20 by "Space Available Mail" for only the small domestic parcel post charge involved from Sudan to the east or west coast. Parcels up to 5 pounds are accepted at this low rate.

Larger parcels can be sent by airlift mail for \$1 extra charge per parcel provided they are mailed before Nov. 27.

"The key to efficient Christmas mailing" Minyard commented, "is to mail early and carefully. Clear addressing, with the ZIP codes, proper packaging and early depositing can prevent most problems and provide the greatest value for money spent for postage.

Minyard also announced that rural delivery of mail for the City of Sudan began Saturday. Persons wishing to obtain this service need only (1) to live on the route; (2) install a mail box at street level;(3) inform post office and change mailing address.

Minyard reminded residents that tampering with mail or mail boxes is a federal offense and any violation should be reported at once to the post

### **A** Generation Of Peace?



that his goal is to work for "a generation of peace" for this country. There seems to be no reason to doubt his sincerity, but there is considerable reason to wonder whether this laudable goal can be achieved in this generation.

It is so obvious that it hardly needs to be stated that the powers arrayed against us the powers which are a threat to world peace - are Communist powers. 4

Yet one of the greatest obstagles to world peace is the fact that Communists have proved to us, over and over again, that we cannot trust them to observe their solemn agreements. One need look no farther than the Egyptian Suez Canal area to have current proof that this situation has not changed.

Peace - When? If peace must be achieved

through negotiation between us and the Communists, and if we can confidently expect that they will violate the terms of their agreements whenever it suits them, what basis is there for expecting that there will really be peace any time soon?

Yet the Bible does say, "They shall beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruninghooks. Nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither will they learn war any more."

The real question is not whether we shall have a period of peace on earth but when.

The Scriptural quotation which seems to apply to our time is, "Ye shall hear of wars and rumors of wars. See that ye be not troubled, for all these things must come to pass. . . . Nation shall rise up against nation, and kingdom against kingdom."

Is there then no hope for peace in our time? Is the promised peace in the far-distant future? This is, obviously, a matter of opinion - and yours may be

different from mine. As I see it, those who ve-

hemently insist that there can and must be "peace now" are either viewing things as they wish they were, not as they are, or -as in the case of some of the young agitators who shout this slogan - deliberately playing on our emotions to achieve their very unpeaceful ends.

Actually, the word "peace" has different meanings, depending on who is using the word and what his objectives are. The Bible speaks of two kinds of peace - international peace

and personal peace. "Peace I Give Unto You" International peace may not be attainable now. Personal

In the midst of the turmoil of this war-filled world, there can be a peace - an inner peace which is the gift of God to those who will receive it.

When Jesus was facing crucifixion - when the agony of this excruciating and ignominious death was only hours away, and He knew it - He said to His disciples, "Peace I leave with you. My peace I give unto you. Not as the world giveth give I unto you. Let not your heart be troubled, eneither let it be

Jesus had a serene, inner peace, in spite of what was

This peace we can have, whether there is peace in the

We should work for peace in the world. We must have the peace of God in our hearts.

#### DPS ISSUES ACCIDENT REPORT

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated ten accidents on rural highways in Lamb County during the month of October, according to Sergeant Thurman Kaffer, Highway Patrol supervisor of this

These crashes resulted in eight persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$14,575.00.

The rural accident summary for this county during the first ten months of 1970 shows a total of 92 accidents resulting in four persons killed, 44 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$87,528.00.

Traffic wise, November and December are noted as dangerous months for pedestrians. During November and December of 1969 in Texas, there were 86 pedestrians killed and 885 injured in collisions with motor vehicles. 
