> It was noted that according to City Ordiance number 25, enacted by the city government in 1934, that it is unlawful to park a car within twenty feet of a fire hydrant or 10 feet from a street or alley intersection. It also states that it is illegal to park or abondon a vehicle in a street or alley.

> The ordiance went on to state that it is unlawful to park a vehicle in a street or alley intersection or in any way to obstruct traffic.

Another ordinance passed in the same year states that it is unlawful for a business to obstruct sidewalks, streets with rubbish or junk on or about his

Mayor Arnold Reed reported that these ordiances are going to be re-enacted and enforced by the local law officers. He said that owners of junked or abandoned vehicles will be notified on a personal basis first, and asked the cooperation of all residents in obeying these ordiances.


