



# Feedlot Industry Continues Growth

Feedlots with capacities of under 8,000 head (at one time) decreased in number while lot with capacities between 8,000 and 15,999 head made the biggest gains in 1970, according to Dr. Ed Uvacek, Extension livestock marketing specialist. Feedlot marketing in the U.S.

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



### **PONTIUS PILATE**

After the mockery of a trial before Caiaphas, the High Priest, they then took Jesus to the Governor's palace. Pon-tius Pilate was the governor of the providence of Judea. In this trial of Jesus before Pilate, we see the most dramatic account of a trial in the entire New Testament.

The fi: question that comes to mind about this trial is why did the Jews bring Jesus before a Roman governor. In the time of Jesus the Jews were subject to the Romans. Because of this fact, they did not have the right to carry out the death penalty and the death penalty was exactly what they sought for Christ. It was for this purpose that the Jews were seeking to use Pilate. They could not legally stone Jesus, but Pilate could

have Him crucified for them: The Jews had charged Jesus with blasphemy, but they knew that Pilate would not convict Him on that type of charge. So, they produced a charge of rebellion and political insurrection. They accused Jesus of claiming to be a king and they knew that this accusation was a lie. In this act we see the hatred of the Jews, twisting the truth into an out-

and-out lie. As we take a closer look at Pilate, we see a man who knew that the charges the Jews made were a series of lies. He knew that Jesus was completely innocent. This is clear, and it is also clear that Pilate was deeply impressed by Jesus. Pilate definitely did not wish to condemn Jesus to death. Now, those things being true, the

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fact remains that Pilate did condemn Jesus to die. And the question rings out far and clear, "Why, Pilate?" "Why did you do this horrible deed when all the time you knew you were doing wrong?" And then we see Pilate was a man

on the spot. Pilate had allowed some in fractions to take place in the process of governing Judea. He could be reported to the Emperor for these incidents. He had already been reported once and if reported again, he would be relieved of his posi-

We have to give Pilate credit for trying to evade placing the death penalty. He first tried to get the Jews to handle the whole thing themselves. However, he had to deal with Him. No one can deal with Jesus for us. We must deal with Him

He then tried to find a way of escape for Jesus by releasing a prisoner according to custom. This failed when the crowd chose Barabbas. He then ordered Jesus to be punished by scourging Him, hoping this would be a successful compromise. He continued to try to appeal to the mob for His release but was unsuccessful and finally gave in to their wishes.

And, here is the tragedy of the life of Pilate. He met Jesus. He was impressed by Him. He sought to know the truth. He had one of the most dramatic chances in all of history to take a stand for Christ, but he did not have the courage to defy the world in spite of his

#### Molded Interior Trim Is Predicted for Autos

By 1975 a special polyurethane coating called Neohane, which looks and feels ike vinyl, will be used in car interiors, according to The Goodyear Tire & Rubber Company, which is developing the new trim material.

"Neothane coating is sprayapplied so it becomes a part of foam-padded parts rather than a covering for them. This eliminates stitches that tear," says J. A. Lucas, general manager of Goodyear's Foam Products Division.

Neothane coatings are applied by spraying the inside of a mold with the material, then filling the mold with a liquiti foam. Heat expands the foam and chemically interlocks it with the coating. The finished product is a


