



We let the 22 of March slip up on us, and forgot that it is on that date each year that J.W. (Indian) Crim of Lazbuddie makes his annual weather prediction for the year.

Since many readers of the Star are interested in Crim's prediction, we are giving them herewith. When Crim made his annual forecast at sunrise March 22, the wind was blowing from the southwest, carrying smoke from Crim's ceremonial fire to the northeast.

This means, Crim says, light moisture once again this year. The wind velocity held steady, indicating that this year will be a "little better" than last year, when another "poor" year moisture-wise was predicted.

Some encouragement could be taken by area farmers in the fact that this year won't be any worse than last year, and indications were that it could be better.

There is the possibility of some fast-forming hail storms, which will dump heavy hail and rain in some areas, but will entirely miss other areas, Crim says. Other areas will have moisture with little or no hail. The 1966 weather, like that of 1965, bids to be spotted in nature, but on the whole fairly dry.

Crim has been making the annual weather forecast for the past 33 years, but did not start making his forecast public until 1952. The last year in which Crim predicted a bumper dry-land crop was 1960, and the prediction held true.

Again in 1961, Crim predicted a good crop year for the farmers, but the past five years have seen the Lazbuddie prophet look for "lean" as far as moisture is concerned, and he has pretty well been borne out.

Crim's predictions are based on an old Indian legend, which gives him his nickname. The legend has it that a fire burning at sunrise on March 22 will give signals through its smoke indicating whether the year will be good for crops or not.

Crim says that if the smoke from the fire is carried west or southwest there will be a bumper crop. If the wind is from the north or northwest and carries the smoke south or southwest the crop will be average. Wind from the west, south or southwest means a poor crop year.

The wind was from the southwest this year. Snaps and crackles from the fire indicate the quick storms during the year, Crim says.

It doesn't matter whether you can see the sun in making the predictions, as long as it is done at sunrise. However, on March 22 this year the sun was not clouded. Later in the morning, though, began the worst dust storm of the season.

Members of the Crim family take advantage of the annual weather forecast to have a family gathering, and once again this year several members and neighbors were on hand for the prediction.

At least, with the coming of irrigation, farmers have an opportunity to offset the dryness, something they could not do 33 years ago, and Crim recommends that farmers start up their wells. "Cause it's gonna be another tough year."

CITY ELECTION

Edelmon Named Mayor; Cranfill, Snead Win

W.L. (Preach) Edelmon was elected mayor, with Dr. Lee Cranfill and Rene Snead named aldermen in a good turnout of voters in Tuesday's city election.

Edelmon became mayor after

he received 179 votes. Outgoing mayor J.C. Claborn on the strength of a last-day write-in campaign, received 105 votes. Ben D. McDonald received 58 votes.

R.L. Fleming, a former Fri-

ona Mayor, received two write-in votes, and Steve Messenger received one. A total of 345 voters went to the polls.

Snead led the six-man field in the city council race with 205 votes. Dr. Cranfill polled 191 votes, and Stanley Bengel received 125. Other results were Steve Struve, 78; Dale Williams, 52 and Gerald Shavor, 17.

So heavy was the turnout that additional ballots had to be printed. Only 300 ballots were originally ordered.

Edelmon and Dr. Cranfill

were sworn into office at a meeting of the Friona City Council Tuesday night. Snead was out of the city and unable to attend the session.

The new councilmen replace Glenn E. Reeve Sr., and O.D. Bingham, who did not seek re-election.

The voting turnout was the heaviest since 375 persons voted in the 1958 city election, a highlight of which was the approval of the council-manager form of government which the city has enjoyed since that time.

Massie, Buske Win School Board Posts

W.M. Massie and W.D. (Doris) Buske were elected to the Fri-

ona Independent School District's board of trustees in the annual board election last Saturday, in which 387 votes were cast.

Massie was an incumbent, having served as secretary for the board the past year. Massie received 184 votes, and Buske had 154.

E.G. Phipps was third in the voting with 131 votes, followed by Bill Wooley, 114; H.H. Horton, Jr., 86, and Charles Howell, 80.

Wendol Christian, unopposed was elected as a member of the county school board as an at-large candidate.

Downtown Parade Rodeo Highlight

Plans for the sixth annual Friona Junior Chamber of Commerce Rodeo have been announced, including a big downtown parade to kick off the opening day of the rodeo on Friday, April 15.

Also new this year is the Rodeo Queen's Contest, which has five Friona High School girls competing for the queen's title. Each of the girls will be selling advance tickets to the three rodeo productions. The girls selling the most tickets will be crowned Queen at the Sunday afternoon rodeo performance.

Advance tickets are selling for \$1.25 for adults and 50 cents for students. At the gate the price will be \$1.50 for adults and 75 cents for students.

Girls entered in the Queen's are Glenda Mingus, Becky Turner, Linda McVey, Connie Stone and Barbara Fletcher. Gerald Shavor, one of the rodeo officials, says he is expecting two out-of-town bands (from Hereford and Bovina) to go along with the Friona High School Band, as well as three or four riding clubs for the Friona parade, which begins at 5 p.m.

All local riders, as well as owners of antique automobiles are invited to take part in the parade April 15.

Performers in the rodeo must be 19 years of age or younger. Parents of performers must sign a minor's release. Inter-scholastic League rules will apply. An entry fee of \$10 per event will be charged, except in the goat-tieing, which will be \$5. Deadline for entries will be prior to the Saturday evening performance, 8 p.m.

Performers of the rodeo will be held at 8 p.m. on Friday and Saturday, and at 2:30 p.m. on Sunday.

Events include bare back bronc riding, bull riding, tie-down roping, barrel racing, pole bending, ribbon roping and goat tieing for both boys and girls.

DEADLINE NEARS

**Almost 750,000 Autos
Need To Be Inspected**

Approximately three quarters of a million Texas vehicles have only until Friday, April 15th to be inspected as required by law, according to Captain Alan Johnson, Commander of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Service of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"In the remaining days of the inspection period, it is possible for the State's 5350 license inspection stations to handle the last minute inspections only if motorists take their vehicles in immediately so there will be no delayed periods between inspection of one vehicle and the next," he said. The first of the last week is usually not too crowded as the lines begin forming on the last two days due to motorists waiting to the very last minute.

"From now until the deadline every minute of the inspection station's time will be at a premium, and waiting lines will become general throughout the States as it approaches," Johnson urged all Texans to avoid the inconvenience of waiting in line to get the safety inspection sticker for 1966 by taking immediate action now. He said that beginning Saturday, April 16th, officers will be obliged to start handing out tickets for non-compliance with the Motor Vehicle Law which requires an annual safety inspection of vehicles.



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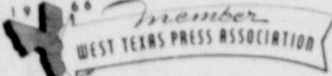

**Hunting For Eggs Renews
Custom Of Ancient Times**

When your children search for colored eggs this Easter, they'll be renewing a custom far older than Christianity.

Eggs represent the new life that returns to earth every spring -- around the time of Easter. The custom of exchanging eggs as part of the celebration began in ancient times. The ancient Persians often dyed eggs in the colors of spring and gave them to their friends as gifts. Some early peoples believed that the earth had hatched from a giant egg.

World Book Encyclopedia says the early Christians of Asia and other eastern lands exchanged eggs at Easter. They colored the eggs red.

Elaborate decoration became the rule in some eastern European lands. The Ukrainians are famous for their beautifully decorated Easter eggs. Each village makes its own design -- fir trees, horses, priests' robes, flowers, bell towers, crosses, chapels, etc. Residents of Czechoslovakia, Poland, Lithuania, and other lands also are known for their highly decorated Easter egg.

In England, friends often exchanged eggs at Easter, although nowadays these usually are chocolate eggs. The Irish break the long

Lenten fast by eating eggs at dawn on Easter. Germans color eggs green on "Green Thursday" -- the Thursday before Easter -- and carry the eggs all day for good luck. On Easter Monday the young people have an egg-rolling contest.

In Italy, a priest blesses the eggs on Easter. The eggs occupy the center of the breakfast table, with other dishes arranged around them.

In the Netherlands, children go from door to door during Holy Week, collecting Easter eggs. Young and old alike play games involving eggs on Easter Monday.

In Greece, World Book notes, people tap red eggs together as a greeting when they meet on Easter. The first person says, "Christ is risen," and the second replies, "He is truly risen."

In Bulgaria, on Easter Saturday, people exchange eggs and baked almond cakes. In Hungary, boys sprinkle girls with water on Easter Monday and receive Easter eggs in reward.

Customs vary from land to land, but colored eggs have been associated with spring-time since the dawn of history.

**Sen. Hightower Makes
Official Announcement**

State Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon today formally announced his candidacy in the Democratic Primary for reelection to a second term in the Texas Senate. He seeks election in the new 30th Senatorial District which includes Farmer County.

Senator Hightower, 30, was the choice of a wide margin of voters in 1964 to succeed the well-known Sen. George (Cotton) Moffett of Chillicothe, long-time agricultural leader.

During his first term in the Senate, Sen. Hightower became well-known as an effective and dedicated legislator. He has achieved the enviable record of appointment as chairman of an important committee and a member of twelve of the Senate's committees, some of the most important of which are: Water and Conservation; Finance; State Affairs; Counties; Cities and Towns; and Agriculture and Livestock. He has been named by the Lieutenant Governor to two interim committees to make studies of the Texas Election Laws and the needs of the Nursing Profession in Texas. The findings and recommendations of these committees will be made to the next legislature.

Senator Hightower's distinguished service earned his ap-

pointment by Governor Connally as a delegate to the Southern Regional Education Board Conference on Higher Education. His effectiveness has been fully demonstrated in his support of important legislative measures concerning water and soil conservation, education, law enforcement, water and air pollution, health, etc.

Senator Hightower has an important record of public service. He served two years in the Texas House of Representatives and seven years as District Attorney. In 1957 he was appointed by the Governor to the Texas Law Enforcement Study Commission, and at the time of his election to the Texas Senate, was vice-chairman of the Board of Regents of Midwestern University.

A native of Memphis, Texas where his Mother, Mrs. Walter Hightower, still resides, Sen. Hightower moved to Vernon in 1951 to begin the practice of law upon his graduation from Baylor University. He served in the U.S. Navy during World War II.

He is a leader in civic, religious and fraternal affairs on the local and state level. His wife, the former Colleen Ward, is a native of Tulla, Texas, and is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W.H. Ward of that city. They have three

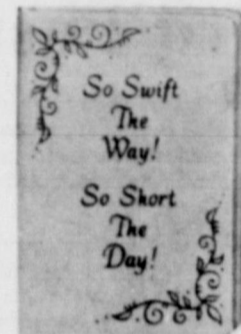
daughters, Ann, 13, Amy 9, and Alison, 6.

The recent Supreme Court decision concerning redistricting caused a major rearrangement of Senatorial Districts in West Texas. The new 30th district now contains 90 thousand voters, approximately 60 per cent of whom live in that part of the new district heretofore represented by Senator Hightower and approximately 40 per cent live in that part of the district heretofore represented by another Senator.

"In order to properly represent the people a Senator should know them, their problems and their needs. I have been privileged to know many people all over the wide area that is now the 30th district. I hope to become better acquainted with many hundreds more during this campaign. My promise is to serve you sincerely," Senator Hightower said.

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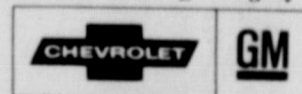
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Winners Given For Promotion

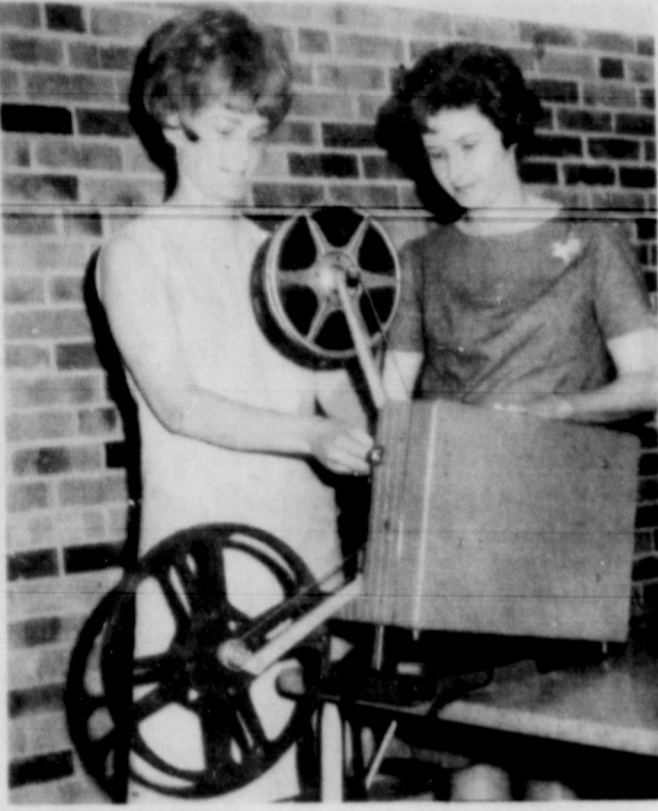

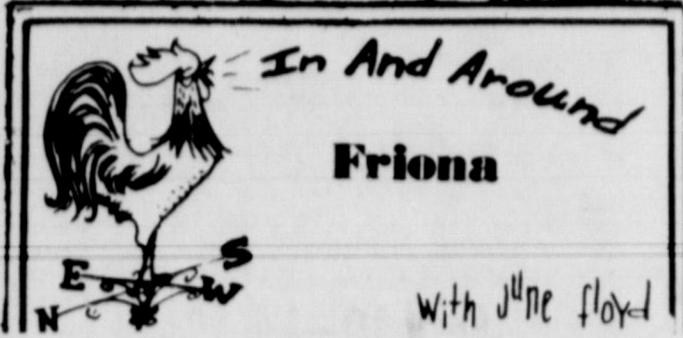

ATTENTION, COTTON FARMERS:

As a result of several inquiries pertaining to the value of the PURE LINT AGREEMENT AND GUARANTEE being offered by one Texas Certified Seed Producer, the following comments are offered for your consideration.

- In order to qualify for this program, a Grower is required to plant Texas Certified cotton planting seed, of the variety so designated in the Pure Lint Agreement and Guarantee, purchased directly from those who offer the contract. This seed sells at a market price of 6¢ per pound above the prevailing price for non-certified seed of the same variety. Projecting an average planting rate of 30 lbs. per acre, the Grower is required under the Certified Program to invest \$4.65 per acre in certified planting seed as compared with \$2.85 per acre in non-certified planting seed. The difference in cost between non-certified and certified amounts to \$1.80 per acre. For the Grower who has to replant as a result of hail or other factors, this difference in investment doubles to \$3.60 per acre.
- Under the contract, cotton produced must have a micronaire rating of 3.5 or above. The risk involved on the part of the Grower in not meeting the 3.5 micronaire requirement is quite high, especially at a location in the Northern part of the Plains. This risk is greatly increased in the case of replant.
- As it stated in the Pure Lint Agreement and Guarantee, the Texas Certified Seed Producer guarantees a MAXIMUM AVERAGE of 50 points (1/2¢ per pound) above the government loan value as determined by the USDA Classing Office for all cotton meeting the conditions of agreement. Projecting a yield of 1 bale per acre the Grower may receive a premium of \$2.50 (1/2¢ per pound) per bale for each bale produced meeting the requirements. The additional cost of planting seed based on one planting of \$1.80 per acre yields the Grower a gain of 70¢ per bale above the planting seed cost. In the case of replant, the difference in cost of planting seed at \$3.60 per acre could yield the Grower \$1.10 per bale loss. It is also necessary to consider the micronaire requirement in that if this condition is not met, the Grower receives no premium and stands to lose the full \$180 per acre additional cost of planting seed and in the case of replant \$3.60 additional planting seed cost. The Pure Lint Agreement and Guarantee states that a maximum average of 50 points will be paid as a premium, NOT 50 points for each and every bale. The contract further states that the Texas Certified Seed Producer or its designee has the right of first refusal to purchase the cotton. By placing in the contract the clause -- "MAXIMUM AVERAGE OF 50 POINTS", a Grower has little opportunity to receive more for his cotton than would otherwise be available through his normal marketing channel. For example, the market for Middling cotton may be even the loan and the market for Strict Low Middling light spot cotton may be 100 points above the loan. The Texas Certified Seed Producer is only required to pay the market price of 100 points above the loan for the Strict Low Middling light spot bale and even the loan for the Middling bale. By averaging the 100 points premium for the Strict Low Middling light spot bale with no premium for the Middling bale, he has fulfilled the requirements of the contract which only calls for an average of 50 points above the government loan.
- There are two other means of income that the Grower will lose should he sign the Pure Lint Agreement and Guarantee:
 - The Cooperative Marketing Association has for several years yielded a dividend above the market price. The Grower will not participate in any dividends should his bale of cotton be sold to others.
 - The Growers will lose the potential dividend on a bag of cotton planting seed purchased from his Cooperative Seed Association thereby widening the cost difference on planting seed.
 - The Grower will lose the potential dividend on a bale of cotton that is not ginned with the co-op gin.
 The foregoing comments are presented for your information as an analysis of the Pure Lint Agreement and Guarantee.

SHOP at HOME

On The Farm In Parmen County

Commercial vegetable growers were reminded that copies of a new guide covering insect control recommendations for 1966 are available from the County Agent's office.

MP-675, "Texas Guide for Controlling Insects on Commercial Vegetable Crops," was prepared, he said, by entomologists of the Texas Agriculture Extension Service and that the control recommendations are based largely on research conducted under Texas conditions. The revised publication is intended as a guide for growers producing vegetables on a commercial basis who are equipped to apply some of the more toxic material without hazard. Home gardeners were reminded that they should continue to follow the recommendations outlined in L-642, "Control of Insects in the Home Garden." Copies of this publication are also available from the County Agent's office.

It's not too early, the county agent said, to begin the planning for the "battle with the bugs" on this year's vegetable crops whether in the home garden or on commercial acreages.

IMPORTANCE OF PHOSPHORUS

The major element phosphorus is required by all plants. With the possible exception of nitrogen, no other element is as critical in the growth as is phosphorus.

Analyses of hundreds of soil samples by the Texas A&M University soil testing laboratories reveal that available soil phosphorus is seldom adequate for crop needs.

Phosphorus is an essential element for plant growth and development. It functions in metabolism and is present in every living cell. As plants mature, most of the phosphorus moves into seeds and fruits.

Phosphorus is associated with several vital functions in plants and is responsible for several characteristics of plant growth. Some of the things done by phosphorus are:

- It determines flowering and fruiting; hastens maturity; increases disease resistance; improve resistance to drought and cold temperatures; en-

courages early spring growth; strengthens stalk and straw; improves seedling vigor; improves forage quality; thus improves animal performance; increases yield; improves palatability of forages and vegetables and balances other plant nutrients.

An impressive list of chores. It pays to follow the soil test recommendation on phosphorus.

DRYLOT RANCHING

After five years, 34 cows kept in drylot have performed just as well as 34 similar cows maintained on native pasture at the Rolling Plains Livestock Research Center at Spur. The percentage of calves weaned has been 88 per cent for both groups. The drylot of calves have been heavier by 15 pounds but net returns lower because of higher maintenance costs. But Supt. Paul Marlon believes a modified drylot system will become increasingly more popular with stockmen because more cows can be kept on fewer acres and when grass and temporary pastures are used, the modified system can be competitive with present grass production methods.

Four Counties Complete Planning Work On Draw

Curry County, New Mexico, Castro, Lamb, Hale and Swisher Counties in Texas have completed their plans for Flood Water Retarding Structures in their work areas.

Soil Conservation Service assisting our District, states A. L. Black, chairman of the SCD board of supervisors.

Parmen County has completed planning on the Catfish Draw structure, completed the field work on the South Bovina Structure, and the Lazbuddie Structure. Designs for flood water retarding structures are being developed on these proposed sites.

The proposed structure on Catfish Draw will hold approximately 187 acre feet of water covering 65 surface acres at the port in the principal spillway. It will approximately hold 593 acre feet of water covering 109 surface acres at the 50 year sediment pool and 1232 feet of water covering 164 surface acres at the 100 year sediment pool level. The height of the dam will be approximately 23 feet and will contain 79,450 cubic yards of earthen fill.

Although planning is progressing at an acceptably rate, the county is still lagging behind in land treatment phases of the project. That is to say that before any flood water retarding structures can be constructed, active erosion, both wind and water, must be stopped on a minimum of 75 per cent of the land that drains to Running Water Draw. "If you have an area on your farm on which active erosion is taking place and the field is not making you a economic return on your investment, contact the local

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

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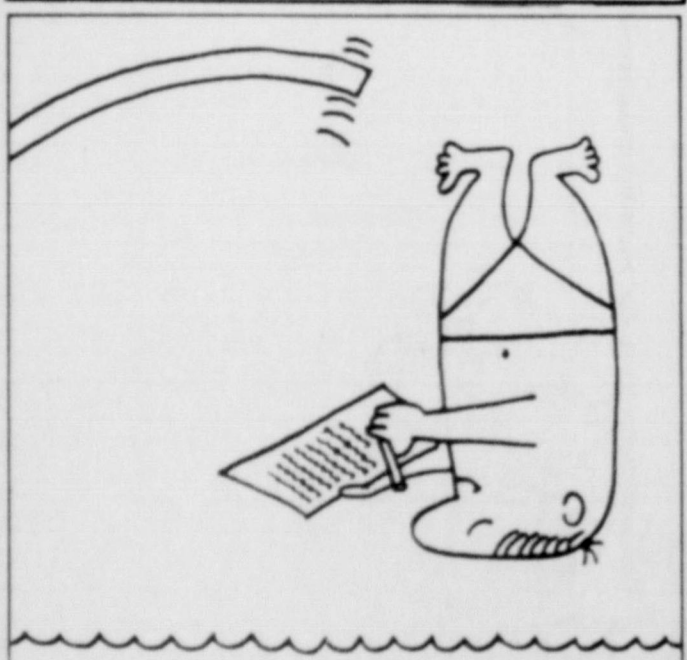
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
