

that a month-long City-Wide Cleanup will begin Monday, April 26, when residents are asked to make a dedicated effort to clean up the trash which has been blown into their yards and alleys. Thursday with four radio units in operation plus the base station at city hall. The radio system in incorporated with the Lamb County radio system, giving Sudan complete area storm coverage.

The firemen went into action again Sunday night as an unconfirmed tornado was reported some nine miles northwest of Sudan. Radio units were dispatched to cover the area.

With the advent of the storm season, the local fire department and civil defense workers would like to re-familarize the residents with the use of the storm

A tornado or storm warning is an oscilating blast (fifteen seconds on and fifteen seconds off). This alert is sounded when sed vere weather is sighted in the area. The all-clear signal is a solid 2-minute blast and is not sounded until the area is free from storm clouds. Resident should take precautionery measures when the oscilating blast is sounded and continue to do so until the all-clear signal is heard.

The fire department also reminded residents that the most simple way to report a tornado is to call City Hall, 227-3601. There will be someone on duty at the radio during all storm alerts. However, if you do not reach someone at this number, you should call 227-4321 for a member of the fire department.

They also announced that a test will be sounded for the alarm system in the near future. This will occur on a clear day between 6 p. m. and dark. The warning will be sounded first for approximately five minutes before the all-clear signal is cound fore the all-clear signal is sound-

An additional storm warning system will be installed in the very near future in the east part of town. This will bring the number of alarms to four which are strategically located






