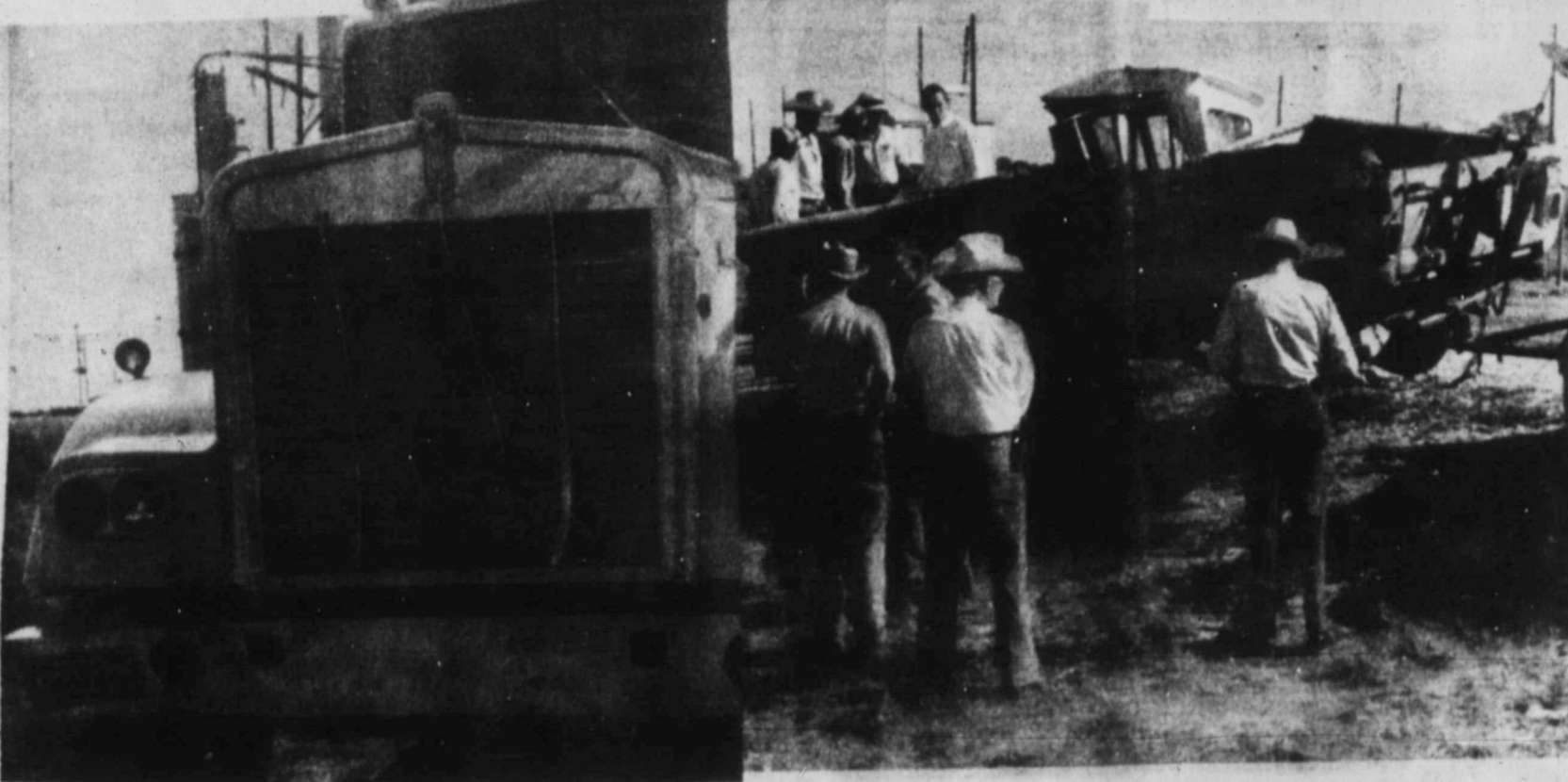

All students who are entering Sudan school for the first time must have immunizations against six diseases, diphtheria, tetanus, poliomyelitis, measles, rubella, and smallpox. The students entering High School will be required to have had all of these except Measles. It is strongly recommended that your High School child have these but it will be on an individual basis. All children under 12 years of age must be immunized against the rubella measles and have had 1 dose of (Red) measles vaccine, or history of measles illness. Exclusions from compliance

## Lamb Mishap Kills Three, Hurts Six

Three members of a Lamb County family were killed about 9 a. m. Sunday and the remaining six members injured when their pickup truck was in collision with a tractor-trailer rig just south of Amherst.

Fabian Gonzales, 38, his wife, Adelia, 30, and daughter, Oralia, 5, were pronounced dead at the scene, the intersection of Farm Road 37 and U. S. 84, by

The six injured Gonzales children were identified as Antonio, 12, Janie, 8, David, 6, Arturo, 4, Angie, 3, and Amado, 2.

The Gonzales family's address was listed as Gage Gin in Amherst.

David and Antonio were taken to South Plains Hospital, Amherst for emergency treatment and later transferred to Lubbock's Methodist Hospital. Arturo, Amado and Janie also were taken to Methodist Hospital after receiving initial treatment at Littlefield Hospital.

Angie was placed in Littlefield Hospital, where she was listed in satisfactory condition late Sunday.

David, Amado and Janie were listed in critical condition late Sunday while Antonio and Arturo were said to be "serious."

Investigators said all but Mrs. Gonzales were thrown from the pickup, which was southbound on Farm Road 37. The truck, driven by Jerry Raymond Yalch of Los Lunas, N. M., was traveling northwest on U. S. 84.

Yalch was not injured. The smashup was the 10th multiple fatality this year on the South Plains. The three deaths raised this year's traffic toll on the South Plains to 65, one more than had been recorded during this period last year.

The crash was second in severity only to a two-car accident Feb. 7 of this year on a snow-creek hill near Dickem which killed five persons.

Services for Gonzales, his wife and child were held at 3 p. m. Tuesday in the Amherst First Baptist Church. Burial was in Amherst Cemetery.

A report from the State Capital concerning the disease discussed the following information:

"U. S. Agriculture Department which originally had scheduled an experimental vaccine against Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis in 13 counties, later released it statewide and slapped an embargo on Texas horses."

"Later, a state Animal Health Commission order halted movement within state or out of state horses not vaccinated at least 14 days earlier."

"Several persons were hospitalized in Brownsville with VEE symptoms. Cases in horses increased sharply, though laboratory confirmation lagged behind discovery of symptoms."

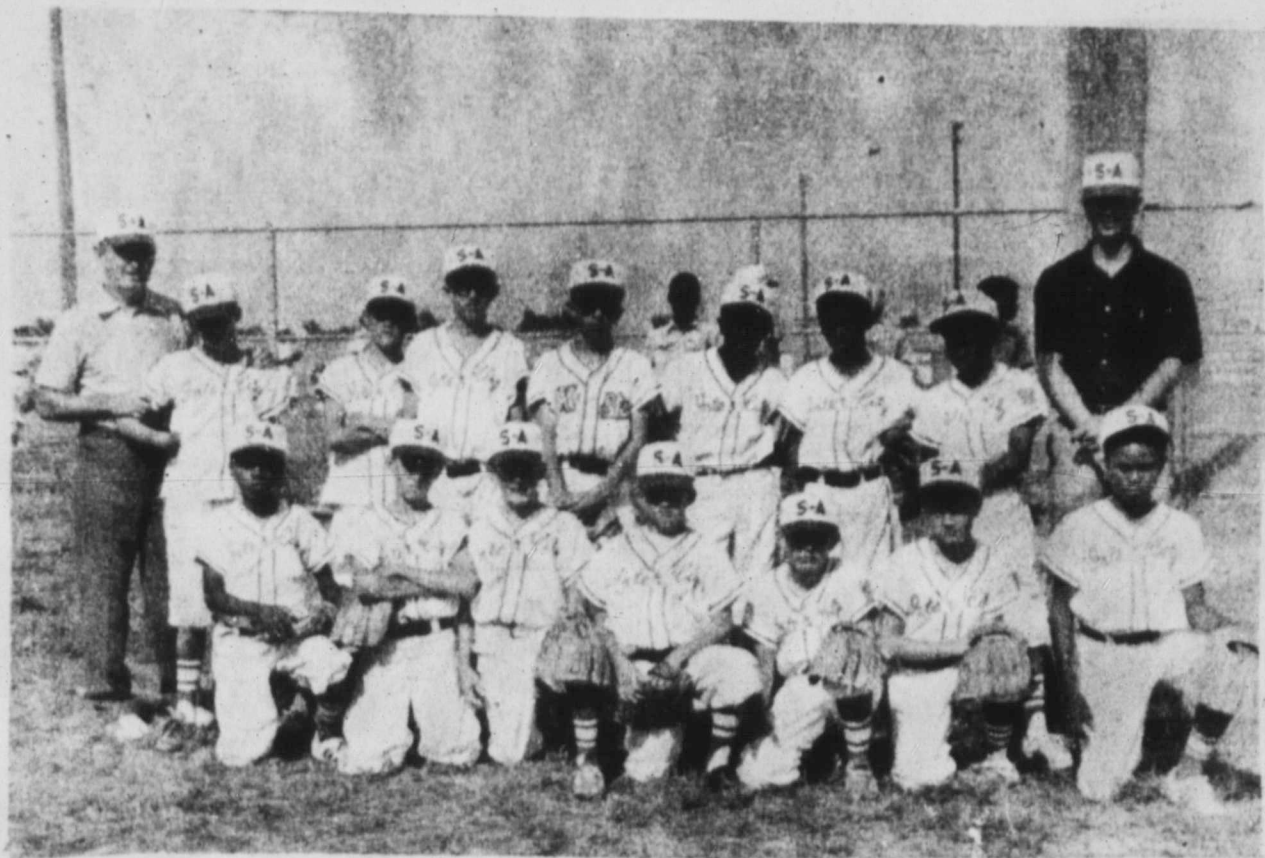
"Disease, described as 'flu-like' among humans, is deadly to horses, and concern was expressed for the equine population."

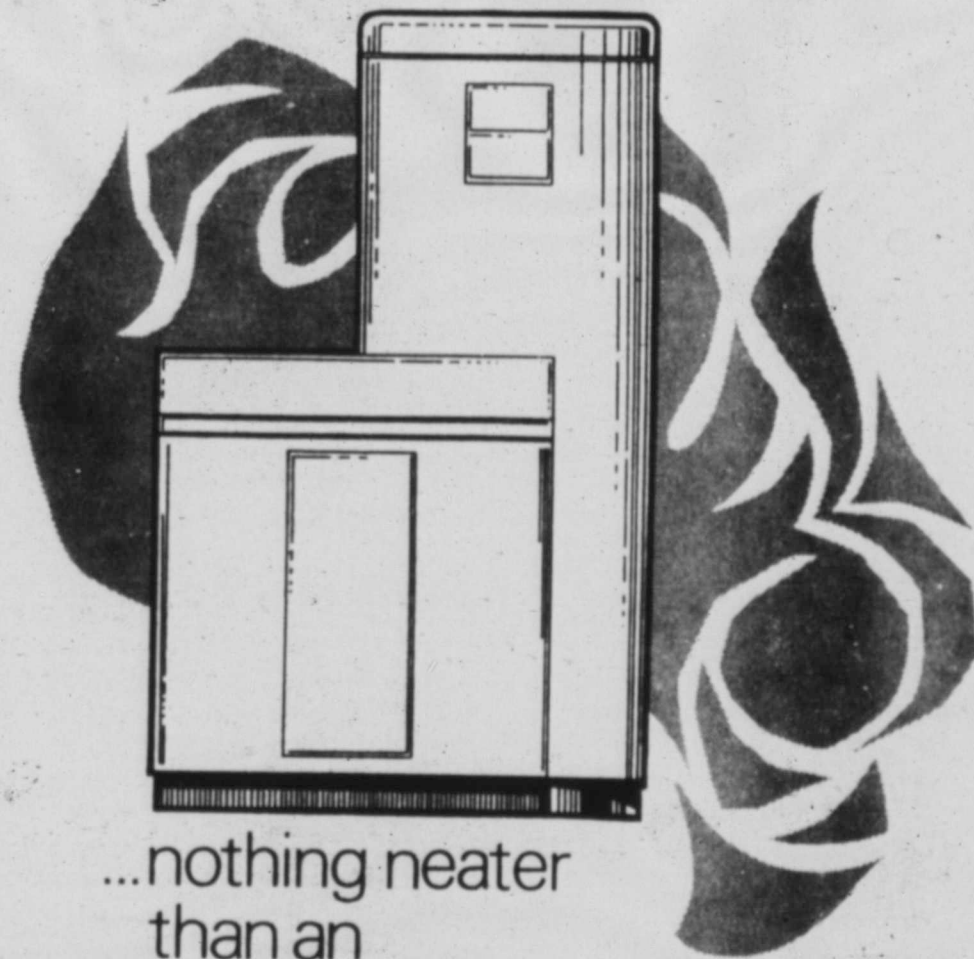

The Weekend Guest

Have you ever been a weekend guest? It can be such fun — and the responsibility rests completely with the hostess. That's why in advance of my guests' arrival, I always make a detailed list of the things I can do to make their stay an enjoyable one.

A reading light over the bed, and a desk and chair equipped with pens, pencils and writing paper show thoughtfulness. Matches, cigarettes and an ashtray are reassuring if your guest smokes. If it's summer, don't forget to check the screens on the window. I once spent an entire weekend battling mosquitos! I always place Pepsi-Cola in a bucket of ice and some snacks by the guest's bed when he's ready to retire. Imagine being hungry and thirsty in a strange house, with breakfast eight hours away. Plenty of hangers are another essential; so is an alarm clock. The important thing is to spare your visitor the embarrassment of having to ask you for anything.

The bathroom should be well-stocked, too. Besides toothpaste, toilet paper, soap and thick Turkish towels, you might include some detergent in case your guest wants to wash some things. Shaving essentials, a new toothbrush, cleansing cream, or nail polish remover may be just the life-savers your friend forgot to bring.

If you can accommodate more than one or two guests, fine. Just be sure they are all compatible and do not smother your guests with a regimented weekend. Once you have the essentials taken care of, relax. Your guests came to see you, not your house!

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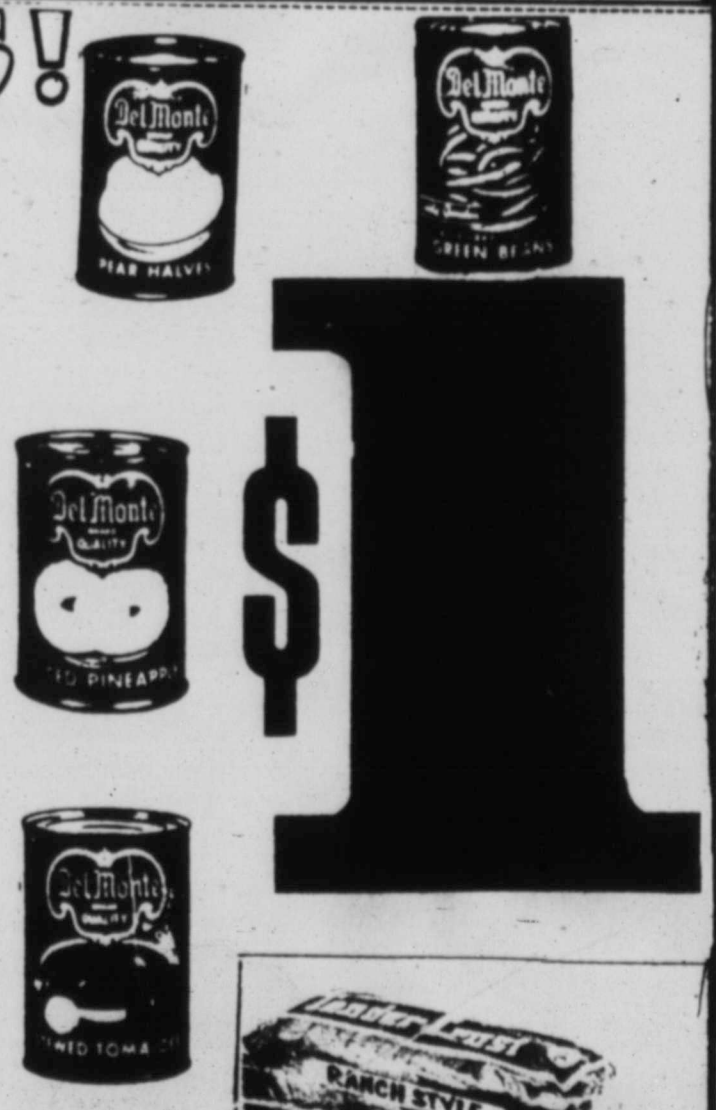
