### CAUTION LABELS NOW REQUIRED

Caution labels against possible eye and skin irritation and other injuries are now required on 25 brands of laundry and dishwashing detergents, reports Lady Clare Phillips, county home demonstration agent.

The labels, required by the Food and Drug Administration, warn consumers of possible eye and skin irritation, and of internal injury if the product is swallowed. Manufacturers have agreed to the labeling.

FDA authorities passed the ruling as a result of government testing on detergents. The test included a sampling of nationally marketed non-phosphate and low-phosphate brands, as well as regular phosphate-based detergents.

"So when you reach for detergent at the market, " Mrs. Phillips says, "check for these warning and caution labels for your own health and safety. " Follow directions for use and keep the product out of the reach of child-

"The FDA can require warning and caution labels, but only you can read that label and put it to proper use, " she reminds.

The form itself is simple to complete and requests information needed to determine economic need based on the income and number of persons in the family and any unusual circumstances or hardships which affect the family's ability to pay for school lunches. The information provided on the application will be confidentail and will be used only for the purpose

of determining elegibility. Under the provisions of the policy the Elementary Principal will review applications and determine elegibiltiy. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the local official he may make a request either orally or in writing for a hearing to appeal the decision. Supt. Kenneth Noles, whose address is Box 247 Sudan, Texas, has been designated as the Hearing Official. Hearing procedures are outlined in the policy.

The policy also provides that there will be no identification of our discrimination against any student unable to pay the full cost of a lunch.

A complete copy of the policy is on file in each school and in the office of the Superintendent where it may be reviewed by any interested patron.

# When to Drink

Mohammedans, Black Muslims, and Mormons all disallow drinking of alcoholic beverages, as part of their basic rules. Christianity, however, has no such prohibition, yet many Christians think drinking is wrong. Why? How is it that various people who all believe the Bible come to different conclusions about the propriety of

drinking liquor? The cynical reply would charge that some people read the Bible to find out and perform what it requires and other people read the Bible to conform to what they like and, otherwise, to do as they wish. True or not as these attitudes may be on some issues, concerning alcohol such

cynicism is not valid.

Drinking Restricted Do passages of the Bible prohibit drinking? Yes. Do passages of the Bible permit drinking? Yes. Is the Bible thus

contradictory? No. The state in which I live permits some people to drive cars and prohibits others, but it is not contradictory-why? Because the issue is not really driving or not driving. The issue is safety. So the state allows drinking and allows driving, but does not allow drinking and driving together. Separately they may be relatively safe, but in combination they killed 30,000 people last

ness because intoxicated people cannot think or act properly and, consequently, are a menace to themselves and others.

The Bible, however, further disallows intoxication because the drunken man cannot be controlled by the Holy Spirit, and the essence of Christianity is that God lives in a man to guide and empower his life. "Be not drunk with wine . . . but be filled with the Spirit."

Thus the Bible is against drunkenness, but what about drinking? If the alcoholics in the country number in millions, the drinkers number in tens of millions. Does the Bible address them? Yes and no.

Concern for Others Yes, because most people who drink will occasionally get drunk, and the Bible says that is the act of a focl. No, because the other standard concerning drinking is given only to Christians - though non - Christians would be wise to adapt it to themselves also.

"The kingdom of God is not eating and drinking, but righteousness and peace and joy in the Holy Spirit. . . . It is good not to eat flesh, nor to drink wine, nor to do anything whereby your brother stumbles."

The second standard is concern for others. In the first century people could buy meat standards by which a Christian. that had been used in sacrifices to idols. Some Christians refused to eat it because they felt ship. Other believers knew betcumstances differ, the answers, ter but, to avoid offending and confusing their brothers, they also abstained in their presence. Likewise, many believers gave drunkenness,

"Dishonesty is the best policy" may be the motto of the men who have established a fastgrowing business operationproviding term papers for college and university students who have more money than ability or integrity.

In the Boston area, where there are several educational institutions of national reputation, there is an obvious market for ghost-written term papersif the ghosts can stay hidden and the students can pass off the papers as their own.

This has resulted in the formation of several companies which are doing business openly, under such names as Universal Term-International Term papers, Inc., and Termpapers

The estimated volume of their literary output in the Boston area alone was 10,000 term papers during the past school year, with a total dollar volume of about \$250,000, according to Time magazine.

One father, wanting to make sure that his two children would graduate from college with creditable grades, reportedly contracted to have all of their term papers ghost-written.

The erosion of moral standards, even in some educational institutions, may be seen in the fact that the faculty of Babson College, when confronted with the fact that one of the Babson seniors, Ward Warren, was the owner and operator of Termpapers Unlimited, declined to take action against him. The faculty declared that Warren's ousiness was "very distasteful," but refused to punish him, on the basis that his customers were the guilty ones. Perhaps they believed Warren's explanation that those who bought term from him were using them only as research material. Perhaps . .

Is dishonesty infecting our whole society? Have people really begun to believe that there are no absolutes-that the only measure of right or wrong is what will be accepted by

### Passed the Test

Before you lose heart entirely with the whole human race, let mention another incident which occurred recently.

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
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

Armadillo, once found only in the Mexican border region, have now immigrated as far north and east as Oklahoma and Mississippi.



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
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
