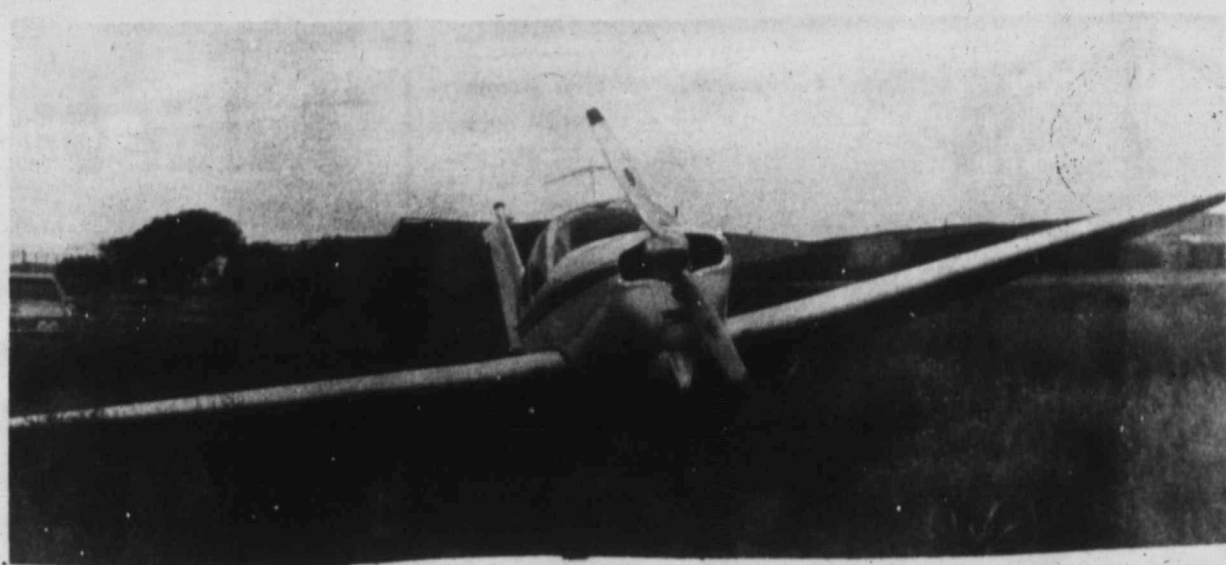
Couple Reveals Wedding Plans

Plane Makes Emergency Landing

A single-engine Beechcraft Bonanza, piloted by Billy Patrick Walsh, 20, of Amargillo made an emergency landing early Tuesday morning on the Union Compress yard just south of Farmers Co-op Cindue to being empty of gasoline.

According to a spokesman at Tradewind Airport in Amarillo where Walsh rented the aircraft at 10:30 p. m. Monday, the original plan was to fly to Ab-

buquerque. It was not determined whether a flight plan was filed or not. The group, including Geneva Brown, 19, Jan Carver, 16, Debbie Frank, 19 and her 18-month-old daughter, Steve Martin, 19, Bobby Moyers, 19, all of Amarillo; flew to Abilene instead and reportedly left the Abilene area at approximately 1:50 a. m.

Walsh notified Lubbock Approach at about 5 a. m. and told them he was low on fuel after he saw that he would not be able to make Tradewinds. Minutes later he again notified Lubbock that the engine had failed and he was going to make an emergency landing.

Walsh related that he was trying to make Hwy. 84 but put down in the pasture when his airspeed slowed. He made a miraculous landing by barely missing some parked cotton trailers. The plane was severely damaged in landing and upon crossing a ditch. None of the passengers were injured.

The FAA administration of Lubbock is making an investigation of the accident.

NINE WEEKS TESTS SCHEDULED

Manning Wins P,P&K Contest

Jeff Manning, 9-year-old son of Rev. and Mrs. J. R. Manning, won first place in the area competition of Punt, Pass & Kick contest held Saturday at Lubbock. This will qualify Manning to compete in the district competition at Dallas Saturday, Oct. 16.

The Punt, Pass & Kick contest is an annual event sponsored by Ford dealers throughout the nation. It begins on the local level and advances through seven competitions and ultimately reaches the finals held each year at the Super Bowl.

Some 32 youth participated in the local contest held Saturday, Oct. 2, in Hornet Stadium. Winners were named in five age groups including Joey Bellar, 8-year-olds, with a 100 total score; Jeff Manning, 9-year-olds, 157 1/2; Billy Dale Williams, 10-year-olds, 166 1/2; Darren Provence, 11-year-olds, 191 1/2; Edgar Tamplin, 12-year-olds, 244. All local winners participated in the area competition where they went against some 15 boys in each age level.

Jeff Manning, whose score at Lubbock was 173 total points, scored 61 in the punting division, 61 in the passing and 51 feet on the kicking. He and his parents will go to Dallas Friday afternoon where he will compete with 11 boys from North and Central Texas at the Samuel Grand Park on Saturday morning. The winners of the Dallas contest will be eligible to attend a NFL football game and compete during halftime on the state level.

The Sudan Hornets traveled to

Vega Friday for their second conference game. The Longhorns had their horns sharp and went to work early in the first quarter with halfback Tony Cassetty nabbing a pass for 19 yards and the six-pointer.

Sudan again had trouble crossing the goal line as they had several deep penetrations into Vega territory but were unable to score.

Vega scored again late in the first period to give them a 14-0 lead at the half.

Neither team was able to score during the third period but Vega scored two quick touchdowns in the fourth with Cassetty adding both scores, one from the two-yard-line and the other from 18 yards out.

Sudan's only score came late in the final period with Bo Lane going over from the two-yard-line, then passing to Roger Bellar for the conversion points. Vega's 26-8 victory gave them a 2-0 district record and a 5-0 season record. Sudan now has two losses with no wins in district and a 2-3 season record.

Leading the rushing for Sudan was Roger Boyles and Gary Edwards. Boyles had 73 yards on 25 carries while Edwards gained 84 yards on 20 carries. Cassetty was leading rusher for Vega with 147 yards.

Vega and Springlake are the only undefeated teams in district play going into the third game. Farwell is only slightly behind as they defeated Happy and tied with Hart. Sudan will play Hart here tomorrow, Fri-

day, with the game to begin at 8 p. m.

The Junior varsity blanked the Vega team 12-0 here Thursday when Sudan had total yardage of 313 compared to 70 for Vega. Sudan gained 253 yards from scrimmage with Pat Hedges leading the attack with 128 yards on 24 carries. Mitch Chester racked-up 60 yards in the air for Sudan, completing three out of four throws. Legg captured two of these with Hatch grabbing one for 8 yards.

Sudan got both their touchdowns in the first half with Hedges crossing the goal line for both scores, once on a ten yard scamper and once on a 45-yard punt return.

Outstanding offense linemen for Sudan were Jimmy Markham, Tommy Seymore, Rory Manning, Ryan Dale Harvey, Mart Davison. Carroll Legg and Terry Hatch were defensive standouts. Legg participated on 17 tackles and Hatch on 10.

The Junior Varsity will go to Hart this afternoon (Thursday) with games to begin at 4:30 p. m.
