Captain Cox emphasized that alcohol is the most misused and and abused drug in the world, that marijuana causes hallucinations, poor judgment in judging distances and, develops a "no care" attitude.

The most dangerous drug is L. S. D. which has no medical value, no formula, and is illegally made.

A trip on L. S. D. can last eight o ten hours, and the brain has een put through such turmoil that a person should not make decisions for three months. There can be a re-occurring trip as much as five years later. Such facts should alert all of s to the dangers which con front our communities and
