**Library Okayed As  
Function Of City**

In an age where such things as electric toothbrushes, cordless electric razors, electric scissors, knives, etc., are accepted as commonplace, I suppose it shouldn't come as too great a shock that the next thing we know, we'll be driving electric cars.

**Electric WHAT?**  
Yes, according to the latest edition of the Rural Electric "Minuteman," the official publication of the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association, the Federal Power Commission has submitted to the senate Commerce committee a report which says electric cars could be commonplace by 1980.

The report indicates that on the basis of current research and development, annual sales of short-range electric passenger cars could reach 1.5 million to 2 million by 1980, and three to four million by 1985.

Naturally, the electric company publication is quick to point out that the tremendous impact such a thing would have on electric power sales. Batteries which run the electric motors would have to be recharged every so often, you see.

However, people in the gas and oil industry are probably looking at the prospects in an entirely different light.

Electric cars must not be dismissed as outlandish. About a half-century ago rich people rode around in glass-enclosed living rooms that were propelled by storage batteries, and while these are now collectors items, there are a lot of trucks and buses in our large cities that never have to stop at a gas station, unless they need fresh air.

And, such by-products as air pollution in our larger cities have set out the need for certain improvements or changes in our motor vehicles.

Necessity, they say, is the mother of invention. And when big outfits such as the automobile manufacturers push on a project, you're likely to see results. The big push is on.

General Motors has developed an electric vehicle called the "Electrovair," which does a pretty good job. The only drawback, as we see it, is that the batteries cost \$15,000. This would be too expensive for most of us even with a small down payment and easy terms.

Another manufacturer has attacked the problem differently. It has developed a new kind of battery that is a lot cheaper, and is now working on improving the battery and hooking it up to the best possible motor.

Since we're not much help on such things, we'll have to leave all this in the hands of the research people, but we may not be going too far out on a limb when we say that it may not be many years from now that you're likely to be driving an electric car.

However, don't throw away your gasoline credit cards. You still might be able to use them to plug into "pumps" at service stations that will dispense kilowatts instead of the high-octane stuff.

One thing which drivers perhaps should consider before getting an electric car in the future: in the quietness of such a car the voice of the back-seat driver will come through loud and clear!

**TAX MAN SAM SELZ**  
It pays to read your tax instructions carefully before claiming a dependent. You can't pro-rate a dependent. For a child born during the year you may claim the full \$600 exemption if the other dependency tests are met. You can also claim a dependent who died during the year. Read the instructions again before deciding whether to claim or not to claim a dependent you supported but who might be questionable.

The Friona City Council, taking the initial step toward assuming financial responsibility for operation of the Friona Library, passed a motion Monday night that would lead to making the library a department under the city government.

Representatives of the library gave a presentation showing the growth of the library in its four-year history. Then Mrs. Rosalyn Shamblin, field consultant for the Texas State

Library, gave the council an outline of the TSL's role in conjunction with local libraries. After much discussion by the council and city manager, Mrs. Bill Stewart renewed the request that the city take over operation of the library, to include the salary of the librarian and building rent; total cost to approximate \$200 per month.

A motion was then passed requesting the city attorney to draw up an ordinance prior to

the next regular council meeting to establish a library department within the municipal government of the city of Friona, to include the naming of the board of directors and the constitution and by-laws for the operation of the library.

Members of the library committee told the council that the library could continue to operate in the Friona Women's Clubhouse through the summer, but by the end of the summer, it would need to move. This would

give the group more time to secure a building.

It was the thought of these present that a rented building would do nicely for some time to come.

In other business, the council passed a resolution adopting summer water rates beginning March 20, through September 20. Also, the week of April 10-15 was officially designated "Spring Clean-Up Week" by official proclamation.

Approval of two outstanding bills on city water well number seven was granted. They amounted to \$1138.27 in payment to Big-T Pump Co., and \$1238.34 to the city engineer.

In his monthly summary of activities, City Manager Outland reported that 72 delinquent tax statements were mailed February 27 to assist in clearing up the 1966 tax roll.

Four building permits were issued. This consisted of two storage sheds, one move-in garage and a one-room addition, for construction estimated to cost \$900 total.

Water department records showed that 10,115,000 gallons of water were pumped in February, an average of 337,166 gallons per day.

Rainfall during the month amounted to .36 inches, with .32 of the total falling the night of February 26.

Work continued during the month on the connection of the east storage tank and the city's new well number seven. A total of 915 feet of ditching was done Feb. 14 and the laying of line and connections were finished Feb. 16.

Initial testing showed the well pumping 640 gallons per minute, and it levelled off at 600 gpm after drawdown. The in of the automatic controls was pending arrival of parts at the end of the month.

Two separations in main lines occurred in February. They were at Seventh and Main on Feb. 2 and Seventh and Euclid Feb. 22. It is believed these were caused by seasonal contraction of the ground.

The sewer department reported one new tap made, to bring the total active taps to 982 as of the end of February. The number of mail line stoppages decreased from the previous report period.

Fire department records showed only two fire calls during the month. One was an automobile fire south of the city limits Feb. 2 resulting in damage of \$200. On February 5, assistance was given by the Herford Department when they had three alarms at the same time.

Police department records showed 40 arrests during the month. Twenty-eight were traffic violations; four each for traffic warrants and burglary; two for drunkenness and one each for vandalism and driving while intoxicated.

Twenty-three complaints were received. Eight were for bothersome dogs; four were reports of poisoning of dogs and thefts of property; three for attempted burglary; and two each for runaways and public disturbances.

Two traffic accidents were investigated with a property damage estimated at \$1200. There were two injuries requiring hospitalization.

The park-cemetery department reported three adult interments during the month. They were Mrs. J.R. Southward Feb. 3, and Mr. and Mrs. Pat Busby Feb. 28.

Several days were spent by the street department in patching the three holes where leaks occurred in the water mains, and patching of other pot-holes.

Much assistance was given in hauling of tree limbs that were pruned from trees in the city. Considerable effort was used in picking up beer bottles and cans from over the streets.

**Deadline Nears For  
Rec Center Drive**

Tuesday is the deadline set for raising the money needed for installing a new recreation center at the old Friona Lanes location. All who have not contributed or pledged support to the fund drive are urged to do so immediately.

Stock in the corporation is being sold at \$100 per share.

It is emphasized that should the project not materialize for any reason, the money will be returned.

The proposed recreation center is envisioned to provide recreation for residents of all ages in the Friona area. A board of directors would be elected by the stockholders.

Types of recreation being considered include bowling (eight lanes), billiard, pin ball machines, chess and checker boards, and shuffleboard.

No annual dues will be charged. A qualified manager will be hired by the center. Donations are accepted and appreciated if anyone wishes to contribute but not become a stockholder.

It was estimated that total cost of such a recreation center would be close to \$40,000. The drive has presently raised in excess of \$17,000. Many people have not been contacted, however.

Friona High School's speech department rose to perhaps its highest pinnacle last Friday and Saturday, when it won the coveted "Sweepstakes" trophy at the Texas Tech Invitational speech and debate tournament.

Featuring the debate portion of the tournament was the winning of both first and second place by Friona in the girls division. Two Friona teams ended up debating against each other in the finals.

All four debate teams got as far as the semi-finals, and 11 of the 16 students entered in the speech events reached the finals.

The girls debate team of Ann Ayers and Susie Carmichael won first place, compiling 7-0 record and beating Becky Coffey and Terri Cummings in the finals. The latter team had a 5-2 mark.

The boys debaters, Jim Bob Jones and Mac Hancock, placed

second, being beaten by McCamey in the finals. The team of Gary Shirley and David Reeve reached the semi-finals, where they, too, were beaten by McCamey.

In the individual events, Friona won both first and second in girls informative speaking, with Shirley White and Kara Sides taking top honors. The other first-place trophy was won by Terri Wilson in persuasive speaking.

Other finalists included Crista Evans, Janice Clark, and Billy Burton, poetry reading; Jerry Stephens, Donna Patterson, and Belinda Mabry, prose reading; Norman Mohr, informative speaking and Isidore (ordova), persuasive speaking.

In winning the "sweepstakes" honor, Friona High School tabulated more points than the runner-up, McCamey.

The pale moonlight of spring-time in Virginia shone dimly upon the row of pup tents. In the center of the line of nineteen tents the scoutmaster occupied a small wall tent. He crawled into his sleeping bag tired but happy in the knowledge that his troop was enjoying the camping trip.

Sleep did not come quickly, nor did he wish it. His custom was to remain awake until the last shout and giggle had subsided. Some would say that taking thirty-two young teenagers for an overnight hike would be too much responsibility. They wouldn't know the pleasure of seeing the self-reliant youngsters at work and at play.

His musings were interrupted by a series of low sobbing cries from the tent just east of his. Making his way to the tent flap he called softly, "Hey, what's wrong in there?"

For a moment -- silence. Then he heard the steady breathing of the boy on his left, then from the other boy, "Nothing, sir, I was just thinking about my Daddy."

"Well, come on out and let's talk," he invited.

A slender fourteen year old emerged from the tent and stood barefoot on the pine needles. The moonlight showed tousled hair and blue-grey eyes still

bright with tears.

"I guess you think I'm a cry-baby. I didn't mean to awaken anybody," he said, as he looked up in embarrassment.

"I wasn't asleep," said the scoutmaster. "Come crawl in with me and let's talk it over."

The scoutmaster, being somewhat wise in the way of boys, knew that in the darkness of his tent and the warmth of the sleeping bag the boy would probably speak more freely. He was not disappointed.

The boy, a newcomer to the troop, spoke of his former life. Born in the eastern part of the United States, he had been reared in China, where his daddy represented an American manufacturing of air conditioning equipment. On a vacation trip back to the states, they stopped in Europe because of business interests in Italy. This delay lasted two years while his father tried to salvage something from a world that was exploding.

Learning that he must return to the Orient for a conference, the man put his family aboard a ship bound for America. Upon arriving at home they learned that he had been arrested by the Japanese and placed in a concentration camp along with several other civilians.

Here we must quote the boy again. -- "We heard that he gets a cup of rice every day and a leaf of raw cabbage once a week. I wish the war would end so my daddy could come home. I just got to thinking about him and that's when you heard me crying."

All right, old experienced scoutmaster, what do you say to a kid under those conditions? Well, it was difficult, but not impossible because we were fighting the war to win and could hold out some hope to the families of the captives.

What could I tell him today?
