Information on employment and unemployment will be collected in this area by the Bureau of the Census during the week of January 17. Walter A. Freeman, Jr., Director of the Bureau's Data Collection Center in Denver, announced today.

The sample of households in this area taking part in the survey are among 50,000 across the country scientifically selected to represent a cross section of all households in the Nation.

The survey is taken monthly by the Bureau for the U. S. Department of Labor. Statistics on conditions in the labor force, especially on the unemployed, are prime indicators of economic conditions of the United States. For example, the Labor Department reported that the November survey showed there were 4.8 million unemployed persons. After allowance for the usual seasonal changes, this was 210,000 more than in October, with virtually all of the increase among young adults. However, the November survey also showed that employment continued at an all-time high, with 80 million persons employed.

All information about individuals and families provided the Bureau is held confidential by law and can be published only as statistical totals.

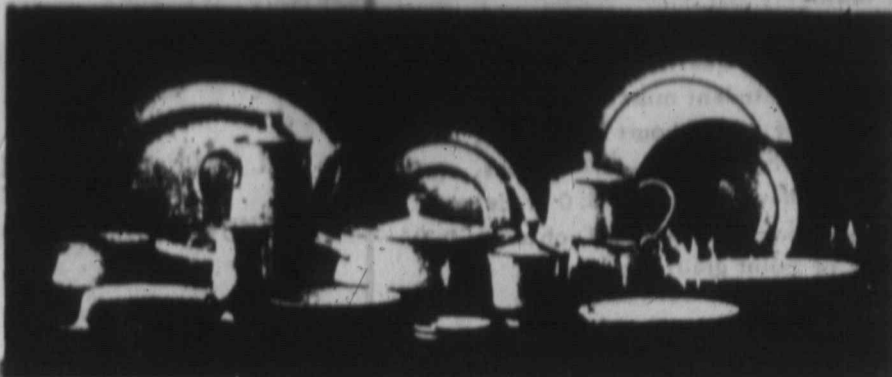
