As everyone who lives in this area knows, this is the season for tornadoes in Texas, although they can hit any time of year,

In an average year, 96 tornadoes strike in Texas, occurring most often in the northeastern portion of the low rolling plains, says a release from Texas A & M. And they do occur most often in late spring and early summer,

In a 20-year period, from 1950 to 1970, three-fifths of all Texas tornadoes occurred in May, so we're out of the woods on that one. More tornadoes struck in Texas than in any other state, although Texas ranks ninth in the number of tornadoes per square mile, with Oklahoma and Kansas topping the list.

The Lubbock tornado of May 11, 1970, with which we are so familiar, was the costliest in Texas history, with 26 deaths, 500 injuries and \$135 damage.

The release from Aggieland goes into the difference between tornado watch and tornado warning, which confuses so many around here, and mentions some things to do when twisters are likely.

A tornado watch is given when the storms are likely to develop in a given area (70 miles either side of a line beginning at a point 135 miles west of Broken Arrow, Okla,) By the time you figure out whether you're in danger or not, it is too late.

A tornado warning means tornadoes have been sighted, and you should seek shelter in a storm cellar or reinforced building. Stay away from windows, and "curl up so that your head and eyes are protected," says the A & M engineer.

If you live in a mobile home, leave it when tornadoes are likely, because they are particularly vulnerable.

"If you're in a car, get out and lie in a depression," says the release. Politicians (and maybe newspapermen?) should have no problems here; they can lie from any position. If there are no depressions, you should turn the .car at a right angle to the path of the storm as quickly as possible." (If you're a teenager, this means to "haul").

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NURSING HOMES AD OPT NEW CONCEPTS

The Executive Board of the Texas Nursing Home Association, by resolution duly adopted, eddorsed the concept of comprehensive health planning and encouraged its membership to partcipate in the various county, areawide and State planning councils.

There has been participation by association members in the various councils, although in many areas, there has been a disproportionate representation of other health disciplines in relation to nursing homes which has been a discouraging factor.

The dramatic increase of nursing home beds throughout the State in the past few years to the point that there are now in excess of 71,000 such beds, would certainly indicate that there should be a more representative participation of the nursing home profession in all the various planning councils, The indiscriminate building of nursing bomes throughout the State will place a strain upon the entire health care picture for many reasons, among which is the general shortage of professional and paramedical personnel which creates a staffing problem for such homes,

It is imperative that extensive effort be directed toward achieving proper distribution of musing

home beds throughout the State so as to assure appeopriate patient care to all citizens, and the concept of comprehensive health planning. Appropriate representation of the nursing home profession on the various planning councils would contribute knowledge and expertise which would be of great assistance in finding a solution to this pro-
