Local Man Fatally Wounded

Brewster Fulcher was shot here Sunday afternoon late at the Sudan Hotel which he and his wife, Pauline, owned.

A report from Lamb County Sheriff's office, stated that according to witnesses, two persons were shot with Fulcher shooting first and wounding J. C. Caldwell in the hip. Fulcher was then shot, according to witnesses, and was then taken to a Littlefield hospital. After being examined, he was sent on to the Methodist Hospital in Lubbock where he was pronounced dead on arrival at 5:11 p. m.

Caldwell, of Waco, was admitted to the Littlefield Hospital and it was reported that he has been dismissed and is being held in custody at the Littlefield jail with bond set at \$7,500. Also being held is another Waco man, Jerry L. Kendricks, as a material witness.

An autopsy was performed on Fulcher Monday at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock but results had not been reported at press time. Justice of the Peace Wayne LeCroy of Lubbock was withholding a ruling pending a report by the Lamb County Sheriff's Office.

Services for Fulcher were held Wednesday afternoon at 2:30 p. m. in the First United Methodist Church.

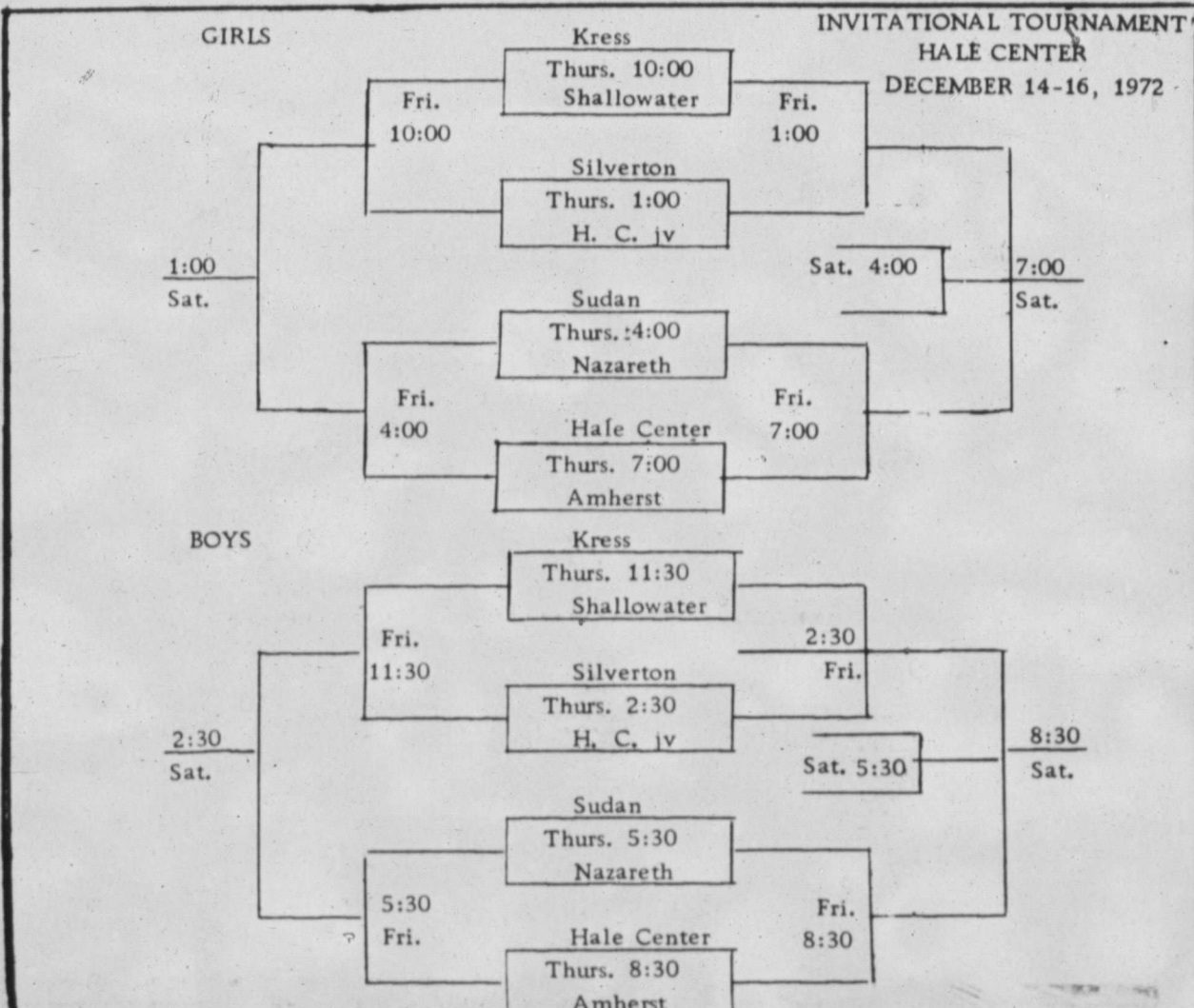


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SHOWN above is the 1972-73 Girls "B" Team who won second place in the Amherst Tournament last weekend.

Students will report to their first test period room at 8:45 for roll check and a study period until 9:00 a. m.

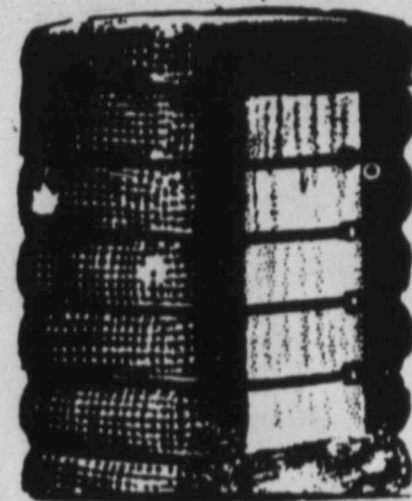
