

The release last week by the Texas Water Development Board of the "Texas Water Plan" apparently left our part of the state "high and dry," although perhaps more is in the offing for West Texas.

At first blush, it would appear that West Texas was not deemed too important by the board. Last week's story about the report said the plan provided a means of water until the year 2020 for "most of the state." In the next breath, the story that areas not covered by the plan included the High Plains, the Trans-Pecos region and the El Paso area. It doesn't take much of a student of Texas geography to come to the conclusion that the statement "most of the state" must have been referring to population. Because the areas described as not being included must make up some 40 per cent of our sprawling state.

However, a note in our mail this week states that the Texas Water Development Board has scheduled a meeting for Friday, June 17 in Lubbock.

Most of the meeting, the release says, will be devoted to West Texas' phase of the Texas Water Plan. Unless the board has come up with some new angles, it could be a short meeting.

The board, in its report, recognized the future water needs of West Texas as "the most urgent water requirements facing the state," but said the area would have to rely on importation from outside Texas.

Studies from the plan have shown, it was said, that there is not sufficient surplus water in East Texas in excess of higher priority needs to make it feasible to transport water from those sources for irrigation in West Texas.

Surplus water is available from river basins in other states, the board said.

Even if surpluses were available in Texas, the nearest source is 300 miles away, and pumps would have to lift the water 3,300 feet in elevation to reach the farm lands, it was pointed out.

"This could be overcome from an engineering point of view, but the cost would be too high," Joe Moore, executive director of the Texas Water Development Board, said.

Moore pointed out that farmers would have to pay an estimated \$168 per acre foot for the cost of transporting such water from East Texas, which would be prohibitive.

The main hope for West Texas, then, are to be made a part of a regional plan calling for importations of surface water from other states, such as the Mississippi River, the Missouri River, or perhaps the Columbia River.

The Columbia River is the boundary between Oregon and Washington. An organization of 11 Western states currently is trying to have water from the river diverted for their use, and Texas congressmen are trying to get Texas added to the group.

The board said development of water for West Texas would have to be carried out in such a compact with other states, because it is not economically possible for Texas to import water over a long distance by itself.

The West Texas, Trans Pecos and El Paso areas in 1960 had a combined population of around 1,111,191 persons, or just about 11.6 per cent of the state's population. This is probably why the plan was said to cover "the majority of the state."

Farming, ranching, petroleum, and industry are intense in the area, which produces a good chunk of the nation's agricultural goods. Water is a necessity if the economy of this area is to continue.

As an article in the current "Cross Section" magazine pointed out, West Texans will help pay for the diversions which will provide water for the rest of the state.

You would think, then, that some of provisions would have been made for the participation of our area in the results of this program.

Perhaps the meeting at Lubbock will shed some further light on the subject.

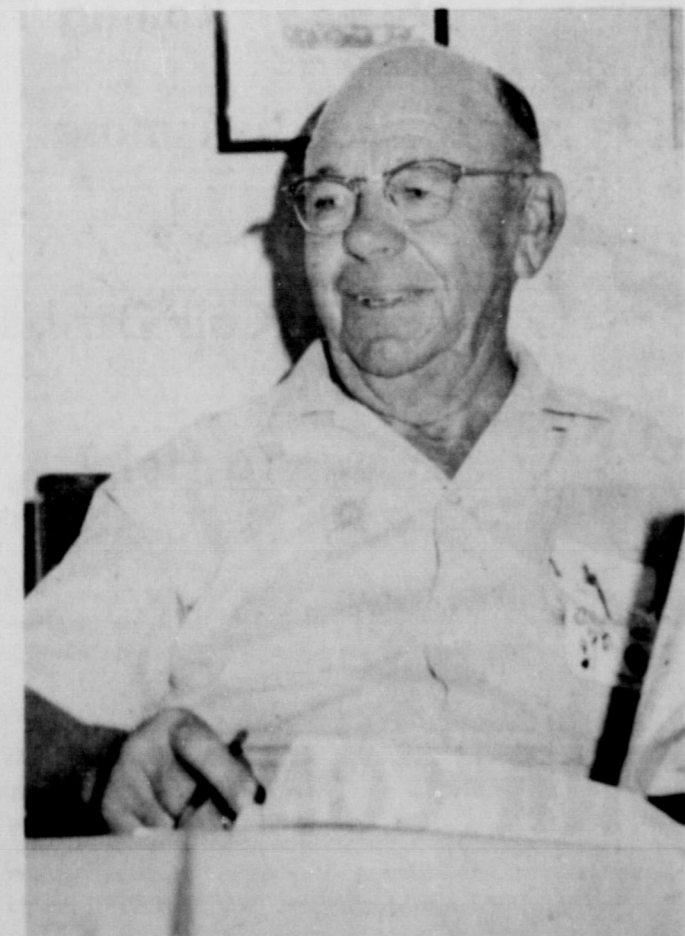

McDERMOTT NAMED

Clements Replaced As Friona Police Chief

Travis Clements, Friona's Chief of Police since last September, was relieved of his duties, and patrolman Kenneth McDermott was named his successor during the regular meeting of the Friona City Council Monday night.

McDermott becomes the fourth Chief of Police for Friona in four years, as the Police Department at Friona continues its record of rapid "turnover" it has had for some time now.

The action was sanctioned by the City Council, after the group heard a prepared recommendation of City Manager A.L. (Jake) Outland.

Outland cited the former Chief's inability to work with the city manager's office, and police dispatchers as chief reasons for his recommendation.

The police department has been in an almost continual state of change during the past few years, as patrolmen who will keep the job have been hard to find.

The council made its final verdict after clearing a fuller-than-normal meeting room by entering into executive session, allowing Doyle Elliott, city attorney, and Bill Ellis, editor of the Star, to remain during the discussion.

After much debate, the council voted 4-0, with one member abstaining in favor of the city manager's recommendation.

In other business, the council awarded a bid for a new patrol car for the department to Friona Motors, okayed a request for a new street light at the corner of Third and Woodland, and approved the purchase of two picnic benches for the City Park.

Also the council went on record as favoring a survey by General Telephone Company on Extended Area Service for the area.

In his monthly summary of activities, city manager Jake Outland reported that the annual tour of city facilities was conducted Friday, May 6 for all interested residents of the city. The newly elected mayor and one alderman visited and were briefed on the functions of the various installations maintained by the city.

Approval of the project, final estimate and payment of \$4,111.91 was made to Conklin Brothers, Contractors, for Water and Sewer Improvements in Western Addition on May 19.

There were nine transfers of city properties reported by the County Clerk's office during the month.

Only one purchase and 105 work orders were processed during the month.

There were 93 delinquent bills as of noon, May 11; four cut-offs were made and all others came in before the end of the month.

Eight building permits were issued; two new residences estimated at \$37,500; one addition to residence, \$500; and five carports, storm cellars and/or storage facilities, \$2,500 for a total estimate for the month of \$40,500.

There were five dogs, one cat and nine requests for special trash pickups during the month.

Water Department — Records showed that 26,782,700 gallons of water were pumped and 23,002,000 gallons accounted for in sales to indicate an efficiency of 83 per cent in the distribution system. This computes to 892,757 gallons per day and is a relative high for the summer's consumption. Rainfall recorded for the period was .64 falling on five different days with .51 of that on the evening of May 28.

Four new water services were made with no discontinuances to bring the total number of active services to 1042.

Four additional fire hydrants were installed; these at fifth and Cleveland, Eighth and Woodland, 11th and Main and Ninth and Main. This completes the change-out program with the exception of the hydrant at Sixth and Main.

Three days were utilized in the care, watering and mowing of the water producing facilities areas.

Sewer Department records indicate approximately 4,441,170 gallons of sewage were pumped through the plant for an average of 143,264 gallons per day. These amounts are comparable to the previous month records.

Four new service taps were made during the month to bring the total of active sewer taps to 970 as of end of May. Nine stoppages were correct, two of these in mainlines, several days were used at the plant in maintenance and control of weeds.

Fire Department records indicate there were six fire alarms sounded during the month; three within the city limits with an estimate of damage, \$25,00. Two of these were to Mrs. Whaley's vacant lot and old storage house which proved

FRIONA RADIO

Station K-Triple-N Signs On The Air

The "on the air" light flashed at Friona's new radio station, KNNN, for the first time this week, as the new daylight hours station officially went on the air.

The new station designed to serve the Friona and Bovina area with radio facilities, had its official sign-on at noon Wednesday, although the station began test broadcasting Tuesday at noon.

Attending the official sign-on ceremonies were officials from Friona and Bovina, including the mayors of the two towns, and representatives from the chambers of commerce.

"Throwing the switch" to officially christen the new station was Mrs. O.F. Lange, longtime Friona resident who has been active in community affairs.

Station KNNN broadcasts from sunrise to sunset each day at 1070 on the dial. The station has 250 kilowatts of broadcast power, or a radius of approximately 50 miles.

The station passed its last hurdle through the Federal

Communications Commission last Friday when it received approval to broadcast. It had tested its facilities during nighttime hours during the week preceding May 26. On May 26 the station finished checking out its equipment and reported to the FCC that it was "ready to broadcast." Approval was received locally eight days later.

Application for the radio station was made in February of 1965 by Parmer County Broadcasting Company. The application was approved early last November by the Federal Communications Commission. Then followed the tedious tasks, such as getting call letter approved, a change in location from the original application and other matters.

Parmer County Broadcasting Company is made up of Bill McDonnell, Frank Spring, H.K. (Pudge) Kendrick and Joe Shields.

McDonnell, a former radio employee at Muleshoe and Clovis, is station manager. Bob Hopewell, a former member of

the Friona Police Force, is an announcer for the station. Neva Raybon is receptionist and will serve as news editor.

Roberts Wins JP Nomination

Some 220 Friona voters took part in the Democratic runoff last Saturday, as J.W. Roberts was given the party nomination for the position of Justice of the Peace for the Precinct.

Roberts won the runoff, 142-102. He carried the Friona box by 25 votes, 122-97, led at Black, 11-2, and at Lakeview, 9-4.

Parmer County voters joined voters statewide in giving a majority to Crawford Martin as Attorney-General. Martin led in the county, 522-183. He was favored in Friona, 179-39. His opponent, Franklin Spears, won only one county box, at Lazbuddie, 10-9.

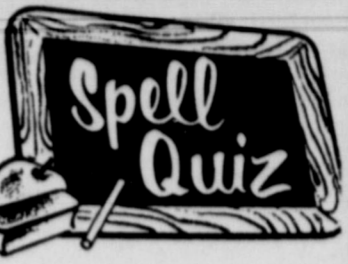

COTTON TALKS

FROM PLAINS COTTON GROWERS, INC.

A meeting on the Cotton Research and Promotion Act, H. R. 12322 will be held in Lubbock on Thursday, June 9, at the Koko Palace, beginning at 12 noon. Lunch will be served courtesy of the National Cotton Council and all cotton producers and interested businessmen in the area are invited.

H.R. 12322 is the Act now being considered in Congress which would provide for a referendum of producers to authorize a uniform collection of \$1 per bale on all U.S. cotton. Producers not wishing to participate would retain the right to request and receive a refund of the assessment.

Funds would be used to mount a greatly expanded research and promotion program for cotton in an attempt to reverse the trend of cotton's declining share of the fiber market.

Disposition of the funds collected would be in the hands of a Cotton Board appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture from a list of nominees submitted by approved state and regional cotton producers organizations across the belt. The actual projects undertaken in the program would be decided on and contracted for by a beltwide cotton producer organization governed by producer delegates chosen in much the same manner as CPI Trustees are selected.

The program for the meeting will be presented by Clifton Kirkpatrick, director of field service for the NCC, Memphis, Tennessee, and Earl Younts, NCC District field man, Lubbock. Also attending from the Memphis NCC office will be Emmett Robinson, Assistant Director of Public Relations.

Instrumental in calling the Lubbock meeting were Roy Forkner of Lubbock, chairman of the Cotton Producers Institute Steering Committee on the High Plains, and Howard Alford, also of Lubbock, member of the CPI Board of Trustees.

Officials of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Services are reminding area farmers that June 10 is the deadline for requesting and paying the fee for the ASCS acreage measuring service.

It is the farm operators responsibility in 16 of the 23 High

Plains counties to measure and report his crop acreage to the county offices not later than August 15. In the remaining 7 counties — Borden, Briscoe, Cochran, Dickens, Gaines, Howard and Motley — acreage will be measured by ASCS personnel as in previous years.

The 16 counties are included in a "trial run" effort to reduce USDA operating costs by letting farmers measure their own acreage and then certify to the accuracy of their measurements.

Originally the penalty rate for insufficient diverted acreage or for over planting of an allotted crop was four times the diverted acre payment rate. This has been reduced to twice the diverted acre payment rate, but it still is a severe enough penalty to warrant extreme care on the part of producers to make sure of correct measurements.

After August 15 no cotton or feed grain acreage can be plowed up to avoid the penalty or get in compliance. And there is no tolerance allowed for error. For those who do not wish to chance an error in measurement, the ASCS measuring fee is \$5 per farm plus 4 cents per acre, and \$2 for additional plots after the first one.

Two notes encouraging to prospects for U.S. cotton exports are found in recent Foreign Agriculture Service reports from South America.

According to the letter of invitation sent to cotton leaders throughout the High Plains area the theme of the program will revolve around four questions:

1. Does cotton need additional research and promotion and if so, how much?

2. Does research and promotion pay dividends for cotton?

3. Can farmers themselves operate and administer the Research and Promotion Act effectively?

4. What is the next step?

NCC officials are emphasizing that this is a completely new presentation, different from any that has been made in the area, and they join other cotton leaders in urging all producers to attend.

The prepared program is expected to last about 45 minutes, after which whatever time is

necessary will be devoted to answering producer questions.

Forkner, who is also chairman of PCG's Board, emphasizes the critical nature of cotton's present situation by saying: "In all the trials that cotton has undergone over the past 25 years or so, I cannot remember a time when the need for positive action was so urgent, and every Plains farmer who intends to continue in cotton production should be present for the meeting June 9."

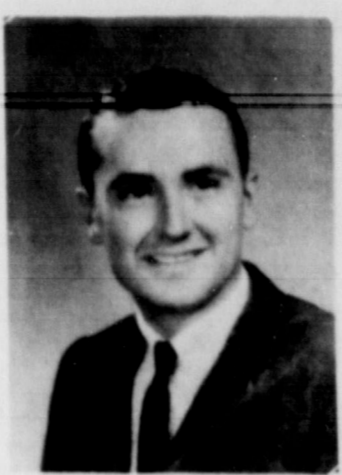
She will teach home economics in Rogers Junior High School in San Antonio.

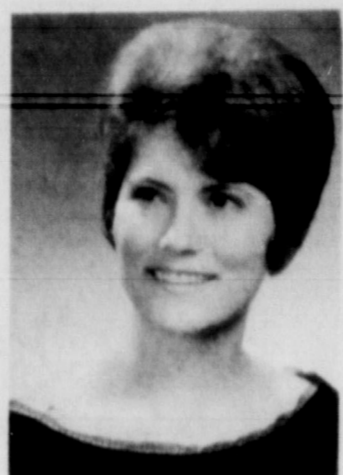
In the fall Sanders will begin study toward a master's degree in mathematics at the University of Oklahoma, Norman, where he was accepted for graduate assistantship.

June Off To Good Start, Moisture-Wise

June got off to a great start, moisture-wise, in the Friona area. After starting the month with .90 inches, which fell the night and morning of May 31-June 1, Friona received another fine rain of 1.2 inches the following (Wednesday) night.

This rain fell in at least two different showers, which were of the slow-falling soaking variety. Then on Thursday night, another .25 inches were measured, this being the hardest rain measured during the week, accompanied by high wind and hail in some areas.

Hail damage from the Thursday night cloud was extensive in some local fields, particularly east of the Hub Intersec-

tion, and also to the west of Friona. The hail damage was not a general thing, however.

The three nights of rain left the June total at 2.35 inches, after only 1.78 inches had been measured during the first five months of the year, .61 inches of that coming the final week of May.

The Texas State Library's High Plains Bookmobile will make its regular run in the Friona area this weekend, according to a reminder from bookmobile headquarters.

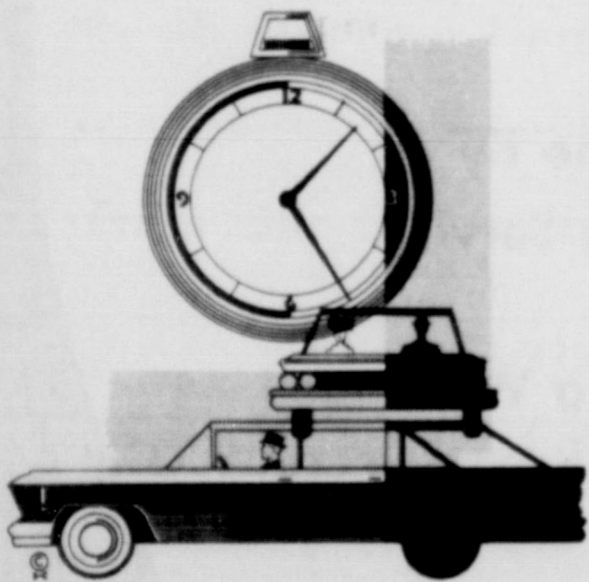

Then on Saturday, the bookmobile goes to Farwell from 8:45 to 11:45 a.m. and comes to Friona from 1 to 4 p.m.

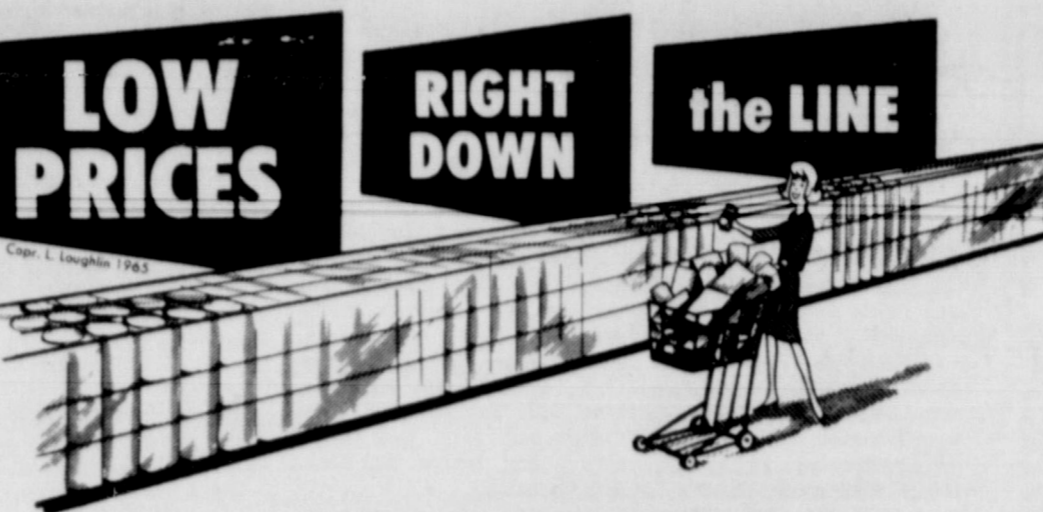

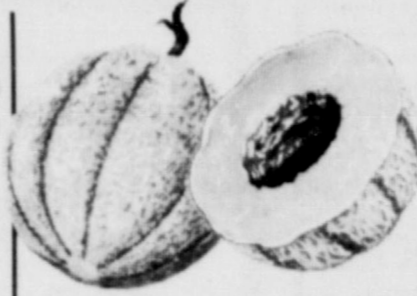
