Future Of GSPA In Jeopardy

The future of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association is in jeopardy, according to A.W. Anthony Jr., unless grainfarmers take the initiative in making their membership dues payments of two pounds per thousand, which is needed to keep the organization going.

The grain organization, which has been instrumental in passing favorable feed grain legis-

lation, as well as developing world grain markets ten-fold in just a few years, is in bad shape financially, it was pointed out.

The failure of grain farmers and elevator managers to deduct the two pounds per thousand membership dues is the primary reason for the trouble.

The GSPA board of directors met in Amarillo last Friday

and developed its most aggressive program and the largest budget in the ten-year history of the organization.

Elbert Harp of Abernathy, GSPA president, pointed out that "It is ironic that this great and obvious need for Association expanded activities and leadership has come at a time when it is least able to do so because of apparent farmer complacency and non-payment or renewal of membership dues."

Harp said "Even though we have proposed in the strongest and most costly program ever -- a minimum \$30,000 increase over last year's \$55,000 budget -- it is still just a proposal and no expanded activity will get under way until a membership and budget expansion effort is successfully initiated and completed. In fact, without additional farmer and agri-business support, much of the existing association programs will be curtailed or completely discontinued."

Santa To Appear Here Tuesday

Santa Claus is coming to Friona Tuesday, December 13, with The World's Largest Sleigh, to give all the children free rides.

The 30-foot sleigh, bright red and trimmed in silver will be pulled by six Shetland ponies. Sixty children can be seated on

the sleigh for each ride, Porter Roberts, president of Friona's Association of Retail Merchants said.

Santa will personally interview each child on the sleigh. Concealed speakers on the giant sleigh will broadcast the interview throughout the business area. Christmas carols are also played continuously.

Santa's crew all dressed in costume, will help Santa in taking care of all the boys and girls who want to ride. Miss Merry Christmas will be official hostess.

Free ride coupons will be given away by the cooperating local merchants who have arranged for Santa's appearance in Friona. Santa has urged parents to bring their children down early in the day, to offset the after-school rush.

The sleigh, which will follow a route set by the local committee from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. is equipped with a music box and a motor to help the Shetland ponies pull it.

Friona merchants will give away free ride coupons.

Council Approves Audit

The Friona City Council approved the annual audit of the city's books by Gowen, Glover, Graham and Brown. Payment of the \$600 fee to the firm was approved.

In other business, the council approved the renewal of the city's workmen's compensation and general liability insurance through Rushing Insurance in the amount of \$2,163.09.

A statement from Parkhill, Smith and Cooper, Inc., consulting engineers for the city, was presented in the amount of \$257.31 for work done from July through August. Payment was approved.

A letter from the Friona Independent School District stating that the school did not wish to participate in a tax re-

evaluation program at this time was read to the council.

A request by Lucy Jones to remove the offices of the Friona Credit Union from the Bingham Building to her home at 301 W. 7th Street was tentatively approved on an interim basis, so long as Mrs. Jones procure signature from all adjacent property owners that there is no objection to the proposed siting of the office.

Mrs. Jones cited age and health of her parents as the reason for the request.

The council further discussed a request for city water service to the Lewellen Brothers Shop, just outside of the city limits east on Highway 60. Review of past conditions and circumstances in connection with the policy of extend-

ing water services outside the city limits was thoroughly discussed.

The request was denied unless all property owners along Highway 60 between the east edge of the existing city limits and the cemetery road voluntarily agree and request to be brought within the corporate city limits.

A letter and proposed resolution was read to the council in which the Texas Municipal League was asking for the support of proposed legislation which would allow cities optional voters choice of using one-cent city sales tax.

While it was thought that such tax would not be warranted nor desirable for the foreseeable future, eventual conditions may show need for its usage.

FOR BASKETBALL TEAMS

District Play; Tourney Is Set

District play for the 1966-67 basketball season for the Friona High School Chieftains and Squaws will begin next Tuesday night at Hale Center -- a month earlier than district play has commenced at FHS in a number of years.

Reason for the earlier district starting date is the fact that Friona is in an eight-team district. With all teams facing each other twice in basketball, that calls for 14 games. This is four more district games than Friona has had in each of the past two seasons, and six more than the two seasons prior to that.

Meanwhile, the teams will play in the Springlake Invitational tournament this weekend. The Squaws and Frenship High School help kick off the tournament in a 12 noon game today, followed by the Sea-graves-Friona boys game at 1:15 p.m.

Winners of Thursday's games play in Friday's semi-finals against winners of the Olton-Bovina girls game and Bovina-Frenship boys contest. Losers of the same pairings meet early Friday in the consolation bracket.

Other teams in the contest are Springlake, Floydada and Amberst girls; along with Olton, Amberst, Springlake and Boys Ranch in the boys divi-

sion. Both Friona teams are fresh from tournament victories in their own tournament last weekend. The Squaws, should they win today, would most likely face Olton, their opponent in the Friona finals, on Friday. They would need a win then to get to the finals where they could meet the host Springlake girls (if they handle the Floydada-

Amberst winner.) Springlake holds the only win over the Squaws this year, that coming in the season opener at the Flying Queen clinic in Plainview.

County's Bond Sales Given

Frank Spring, Chairman of the Parmer County Savings Bonds Committee, has announced that bond sales in Parmer County totaled \$2,057 during the month of October. Sales for the first ten months totaled \$32,577 which is only 33 per cent of the 1966 sales goal.

During the month of October, Texans purchased \$13,520,322 in Series E and H Savings Bonds. This is an increase of 13 per cent over the same period of 1965. Total sales to date amounted to \$128,194,374 which is 87 per cent of the state's goal of \$147.5 million.

"A \$25 bond purchased for \$18.75, for example, is a gift that keeps on giving. Attractive gift envelopes are available at all banks. Savings Bonds aid in control of inflation and support our men in Vietnam," Chairman Spring stated.

AN EDITORIAL

Advertising Helps To Give Gift Suggestions

This year Christmas advertising began in August in some cities. Many individuals, like the late Eleanor Roosevelt, start shopping for the next Christmas in January. The last frantic week of activity before Christmas is fading tradition.

The head of a large variety store has predicted the eventual elimination of a special Christmas shopping sale. He believes that year-around gift-giving has become so extensive that retailers cannot afford to concentrate gift advertising in any one season.

"Probably the first outlet for surplus income is gift buying. In a prosperous society that means that every occasion becomes a small Christmas. Birthdays, anniversaries, and other holidays have become major occasions for gift giving.

"It has been greatly stimulated by travel. Whenever a person visits or returns home he carries a gift. Airports have become a major outlet for variety items," he said.

The problem of the consumer, the executive commented, is more a matter of choice than cost. "The buyer looks for something unique, something special. Nothing can be more time consuming than the search for just the right thing for a certain person."

Apparently a great latent market exists which has scarcely been tapped by many retailers who could be serving the consumer and gaining new business. It is a market which cannot be fully served without extensive advertising.

If the gift-seeker does not know what he wants he is wide open to suggestion. The appropriate gift for a child may range from abacus to zither. Only advertising can tell the giver where he can find such gifts.

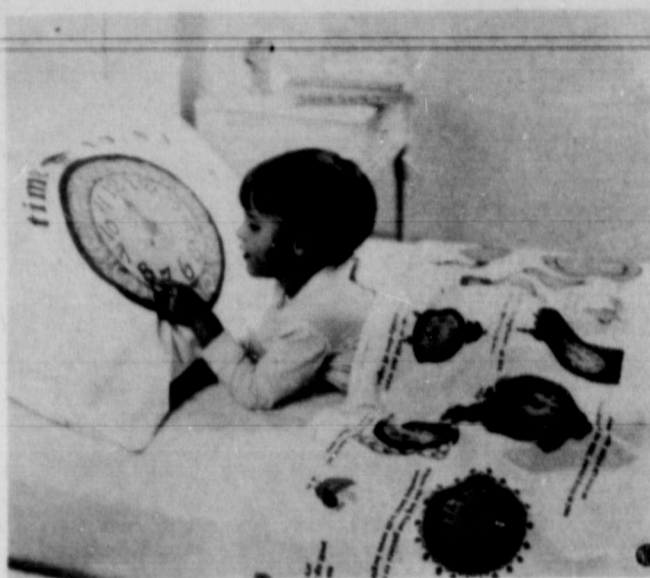

A farm welding short course for adult farmers will be held Dec. 12 - 13 - 14 - 15 under the sponsorship of the Friona High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Mr. Alton Farr, Superintendent and Mr. Benny Pryor and David McVey, teachers of vocational agriculture.

C.B. Edwards, welding spe- Agricultural Education from Texas A&M and an M.S. in Agricultural Education - Animal Husbandry from Oklahoma A&M; and in addition, has several graduate hours at the University of Texas. Edwards has had experience as a vocational agriculture teacher and as supervisor of state schools. He has organized T&I programs and supervised the operation of several shops. Edwards has been with the Adult Specialist Program since its initiation in 1958.

The short course at Friona is scheduled to begin Monday, Dec. 12 at 7:30 p.m. in the vocational, agriculture building. Others meetings in the series of 4 will be held Dec. 13-14-15. During the dates the short course is in progress, Edwards will be available to assist farmers with individual

problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Pryor and McVey.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the superintendent of schools, Alton Farr, 247-2281 or Benny Pryor or David McVey at 247-3072. An entry fee of \$5.00 will be charged. Farm Welding Short Course Certificates are to be presented to each enrollee who attends all the training sessions.

Producers have until Friday to return their ballots for tabulation in the proposed program.

Inspection Scheduled For Cattle Scabies

Every herd of cattle in Parmer County must be inspected for Cattle Scabies. This inspection will begin around December 10.

Thirty-eight Counties in the Panhandle will be inspected for cattle scabies by March 31. All 38 Counties must be inspected before other states will lift their restrictions for Texas cattle to be brought in.

California and Colorado and the only two states that require Texas cattle to be dipped before entering the state.

Eight state and eight federal livestock inspectors are work-

ing jointly in inspecting the 38 Panhandle Counties.

Dr. G.D. Lindsey, State Area Veterinarian, is in charge of the Cattle Scabies inspection in the Panhandle. Dr. Lindsey is living in Levelland at the present time.

Oliver Pratt, federal livestock inspector, and Denman Burns, state livestock inspector will be inspecting Parmer County. Pratt is located at the Sands Motel in Dimmitt and Burns is located at Lubbock.

Pratt said inspection of cattle in Parmer County should begin around the 10th of December.

Chiefs, Squaws Win Own Tourney Titles

Friona High School's surprising Chieftains, and the not-so-surprising Squaws, captured championship trophies in their respective divisions in the Friona Invitational Tournament last weekend.

The Chiefs becoming known as the "comeback kids," scored rallying wins over Petersburg and Muleshoe to capture the boys' title, while the Squaws were pressed only in the finals by Olton to take the girls' trophy.

The three tournament wins by each team left the Chiefs with a surprising 6-0 season record, an even better start than either of the past two Chieftain teams and left the Squaws 7-1.

A brief summary of the local teams' tournament action follows:

Squaws vs Bovina
The Squaws never trailed in their opening tournament games Thursday, although their Parmar County neighbors stayed doggedly in the game for a half. After trailing by 10-2 and 14-5 in the first quarter, Bovina rallied to cut Friona's lead to 21-16 at halftime.

But the Squaws got on a hot streak as the third quarter opened, and a 25-20 lead was soon stretched to 41-21, sparked by the shooting of Cindy Ingram. Bovina cut the final margin to 46-33.

Olton grabbed the lead back at the outset of the final eight minutes, scoring on a pass from the tip-off. The "Fillies" led 41-40 with 6:39 left in the game when the Squaws turned loose their "secret weapon" -- sophomore Hazel Fallwell.

All Hazel did was score 17 points in the final quarter, and it was her basket and two free throws that turned a 45-43 lead into a 49-43 score, and after Cindy scored a free throw, Hazel scored 10 straight points as Olton was having scoring problems, and the Squaws were out front, safely, 60-49.

But Petersburg came back to go ahead, and went into a delay game with three minutes left, but took a stray shot with 25 seconds left in the game and Friona got the ball.

The Chieftains then survived the zany finish as Murphree rammed home a shot at the buzzer for a 54-53 win to send the Chiefs into the finals.

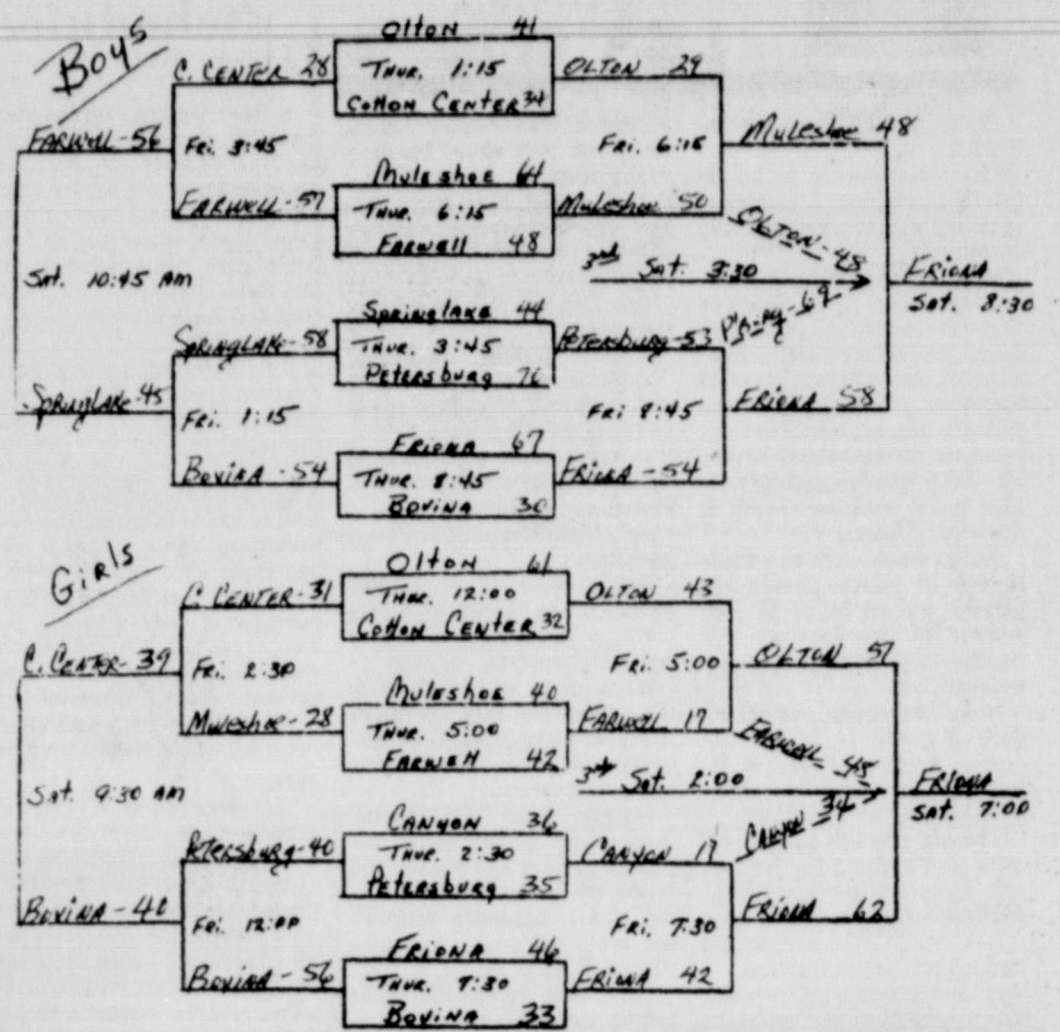

Wolffington Is Awarded Health Dept. Citation

An official State Health Department citation for work proficiency has been awarded to Albert L. Wolffington, plant operations specialist for the Friona water supply system. The citation reflects the regard in which Wolffington is held by state water officials.

Signed by the State Health Commissioner and authorities of the Texas Water and Sewage Works Association, the certificate of competency is awarded only to those utility plant operators who have successfully demonstrated their skill and knowledge in modern principles of plant management.

To qualify for certification, a plant operator must have accumulated a prescribed amount

of actual work experience. He must also have attended both regional and statewide short schools at which the techniques of water treatment and waste water disposal are taught, and must have passed an examination given by State Health Department sanitary engineers. State law requires that at least one operator per shift be certified for competency by health department engineers, but many operators seek certification on their own time and at their own expense to increase their efficiency as key public servants to their community and state.

The engineers said the attainment is evidence of Wolffington's efforts to better prepare himself for the duties of his profession.
