Which way is the U.S. birth rate going? Will it continue its recent downward course or will it reverse the trend? Percy R. Millard, Director of the Bureau of the Census Data Collection Center in Dallas, announced today that a survey in this area will help to answer the question. Information on birth expectations will be collected here the week of June 18-22 from a sample of households,

Census Bureau interviewers will ask wives how many children they expect to have within the next 5 years. The responses will indicate the future growth and composition of the Nation's population, data vital to planners both in government and private business.

Householders in the sample will also be asked about benefits from various government and private programs. Answers to these questions will be used to evaluate the effect of such income on the economy of the






