TEXAS TECH SETS ENROLLMENT RECORD

LUBBOCK, Texas—Texas Tech University has set another enrollment record. The figure for the first term of the summer session reached 8,333 at the end of the fourth class day Monday, according to announcement by the office of the registrar.

No more students will be enrolled without special permission from the office of the dean of the particular college, except in the case of summer institutes, short courses and other special activities.

Last summer's first term enrollment was 8,225.

First term finals will be July 12-13. Registration for the second summer term will be July 16, with classes beginning the following day. Second term final examinations will be Aug. 21-22.

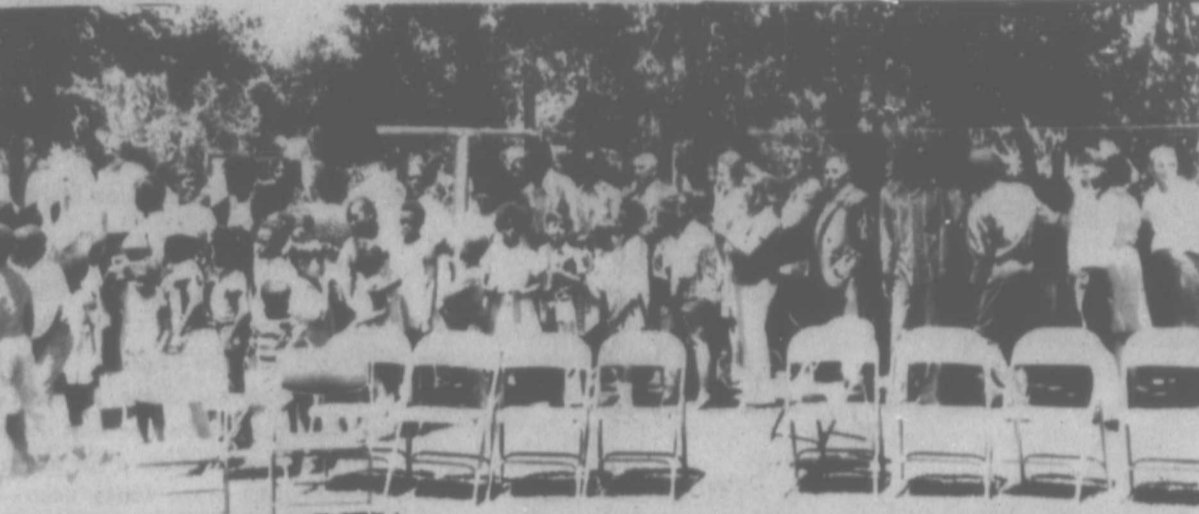
Couple Sets Wedding Date

Lotws Hold Annual Roundup

The ninth annual LOTWS roundup was held Saturday highlighted by the tenth anniversary program. The program was held in the LOTWS Center with Kenneth Burgess of Olton as leader. Some 49 volunteers including pastors from all Sudan churches, aided in the program and serving of the noon meal of barbecued hamburgers to some 260 persons in the Salem's back yard.

Bishop O. Eugene Slater of San Antonio, president of the Methodist Council of Bishops.

During the review and aims of LOTWS given by the founder, Joe Salem, he stated that the first meeting of the organization was held June 19, 1963. He added that the program has been divinely led and has been based on the needs of the people in the community. "Love in Action" is the motto used to show Christian love to all persons. Salem said that through the ten year period attendance has been from only one person at the weekly meetings to some 75 boys and girls. Last year the average attendance was 42, serving a total of 195 boys and girls including 75 first attendances. In ten years LOTWS has served some 976 boys and girls (only two less than the total population of Sudan). Some 75 first decisions for Christ have been made during the devotional times. Last year the organization assisted some 42 families or individuals.

All boys and girls are invited to attend the weekly Saturday morning meetings. An outline for the meetings include: registration at 9 a. m. with brief devotionals at 9:15. From 9:30 until 10:30 the boys have service assignments while the girls do sewing, arts and crafts. Dur-

CITY TO INSTALL CHLORINATOR

Pete Phillips, Sudan City Water Commissioner, announced this week that an automatic chlorinator will soon be in operation for the local water works. The injector, a state requirement, will be in fulltime operation and will distribute an even dosage of chlorine. The local dosage, according to Phillips, will be the very smallest amount required by the State.

He also added that residents may notice some taste difference in the water and that people with aquariums should take precautions with their fish. Phillips also issued a warning to all residents in that the injector will be housed in the city pump house and will give off deadly gasses if tampered with.
