But remember, foods from all HOME SOLICITATION ACTS BECOMES LAW

AUSTIN-Both the consumer and the door-to-door salesman will have reason to think twice about an at-home sale now that there is a new State law which gives the buyer the right to change his mind.

The "Home Soliciataion Act" by Dallas Senator Bill Braecklein and Representative Chris Semos of Dallas became law when governor signed it June 13.

Basically, this law provided that if a consumer is solicited at his home for a sale or merchandise or services costing \$25 or. more, and subsequently decides that the goods weren't what they'd been cracked up to be, he can back out of the deal within a three-day period. But it also imposes some strict

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


