Rabbit meat is in great demand by hospitals and other medical facilities which are aware of the advantages of the food. It is low in cholesterol, low in calories and high in protein content. Major supermarket chains are interested in obtaining properly processed rabbit meat which is all white meat.

Besides that, it tastes great, they say. I don't know, because I didn't eat any of it. "I'll bet you thought it was chicken, " the speaker said to the Lions Club queen and sweetheart. I thought it was chicken, too; that's why I didn't eat any of it. I don't like chicken very much. Actually chicken tastes okay, but it's so much trouble to get it separated from the bone that I'm exhausted by the time I get a nice big bite. COTTON TALKS

The new cotton program which will govern the industry for the years 1974 through 1977, as it is being explained to High Plains farmers at county meetings around the area by officials of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., shapes up as "considerably less than is needed. but if properly administered a program with which we can continue as the nation's leading

Major provisions of the program, with PCG comment as to their application on the High Plains, are as follows.

-- A minimum national allotment of 11 million acres, compared to this year's 10 million acre allotment. Allotment for the 25 PCG counties surrounding Lubbock therefore should be about 10 percent more than this year's 1,488,145 acres. And, and/or production efficiency as generally speaking individual farm allotments will be up 10

-- Price support payments equal




