## A.C. Mann Rites Held

SOME OF YOU probably wouldn't believe the amount of interesting (but to me, not very useful) information I absorbed over the weekend: Most of the stuff I picked up won't do me much good in the production of a newspaper, except that we newsmen are supposed to know a little bit about everything (and not much about anything). The subject of all the new (to me) information was ranching and related subjects, and it all came to me during a delightful weekend visiting on a ranch operated by Jack Ham, a former resident of Slaton. Some of the information came from Jack, but mostly I got it from listening to a couple of oldtime cowhands—Jack's father, C. E. Ham, and R. J. Clark of Slaton—swap stories about ranch life. They both knew what they were talking about, and I just sat back and listened, because every word I spoke showed my ignorance. We drove around on the place, and I forget just how many sections it is, but one section, I learned, will support about 18 cows, hundreds of rattlesnakes and 347,000 mesquite trees and bushes.

The Ham ranch is located four miles down a caliche-gravel-dirt road fairly close to Slide, or Stiles, or Snipe, or something like that, only this place isn't there any more—it's just a big old vacant building that looks like it once was a courthouse. In fact, there's not any place close to the ranch unless you go 25 miles to Big Lake or 40 miles or so to Stanton. I guess the best way to describe the location of the ranch might be to use the weather bureau's system: It lies about 70 miles either side of a line drawn from El Paso to Beaumont.

The food and hospitality at the ranch are Grade A, top quality. I guess they don't have many visitors, so when they get one, they treat him royally. Before and after the delicious meals, I sat around and absorbed the following data:

If you have a lot of coyotes, you won't have any foxes. Don't nothing fight like two old jacks.

Champion roper Toots Mansfield had a rope somewhere (I forget where, now). And old Jake McClure was a fine roper... he was killed in a car wreck. And all good "four-footers" used a pretty big loop. Mesquites will grow from a mesquite bean that's been lying on the ground 25 years. A sheep will just stand there and drown if the water rises around him; you can't even drive one out.

It's hard to realize now how fat one of those old ponies would go in a day... "we used to saddle one up at daybreak and ride him all day, 50 or 60 miles, without hardly giving him a drink."

Cows that run in the sand have longer toes than those that graze elsewhere... "you can hear them popping a half mile."

One thing I learned for sure is that whitts I may not be exactly super-efficient in the office,

## HORNETS DROP FARWELL, 30-14

The "Hitting Hornets" displayed both their running and passing talents last Friday night as they trounced their old rivals—the Farwell Steers by a 30-14 score to close out Farwell's season at 1-9. The victory marked the Hornets' sixth victory of the season against three defeats and their third district triumph.

Hard-charging fullback Pat Hedges was the "workhorse", along with the offensive line, for the Hornets. Hedges amassed a season high of 213 yards rushing, 19 pass receiving, and three Hornet touchdowns while also leading the Hornets on defense with 11 tackles.

The locals dented the score-

board in the first quarter as they mounted a drive on their second possession from their own 24 yard line. Sticking to a strong inside running game provided by the blocking of Curtis Chester, Tommy Seymour and Richard Tamplin, quarterback Mitch Chester successfully guided the Hornets 76 yards on 9 plays to paydirt with Hedges going the final seven yards. The extra points run by M. Chester put the Hornets on top 8-0, a lead they would never relinquish.

The Steers gave the Hornets a "scare" on their next possession as they swept left end for for an apparent 51 yard score only to have the ball returned because of a clipping penalty. This time, the Hornets defense held though and Sudan took over the pigskin at their own 26. A stubborn Steer defense denied any significant yardage to the Hornets and Donnie Noles came on to boot a 41 yard punt that carried to the Farwell 31.

Finding the option play to be favorable, the Steers continued to hit the flanks of the Hor-

net defense and only a Craig Harper tackle saved a "would-have-been" Farwell touchdown at the nine yard line. Third and four from the five yard line brought about a critical situation and this time it was Richard Tamplin and Mart Davison who stunted into the Steer backfield and forced a fumble which Roby Lynn pounced on for the Hornets.

The relief, however, was short-lived for Sudan as a stray pass on third down fell into the arms of Farwell's Kevin Hargrove and the Steers owned the ball again on the Hornet 16.

The Hornet goal-line defense was called in to stymie the Steers as they have been forced to do so many times this year and once again they dominated the Steers. Roby Lynn and Craig Harper each accounted for unassisted tackles on second and third downs and Kyle Martin broke up a vital fourth down passing attempt to throttle the attempt.

Owning the ball at their own 11 yard line, the Hornets began a goalward trek once again. Hedges moved the ball to midfield where a penalty appeared to have the Hornets stopped, but the accurate passing arm of Mitch Chester came to life as he completed three straight passes. Tight end Roby Lynn made two outstanding receptions for 24 and 30 yards and a screen pass to Pat Hedges picked up another 19. From the 24 yard line, Hedges toted the pigskin four plays in a row before crossing the stripes from one yard out with only 0:54 left in the half. Mitch Chester kept

**THE FAMILY LAWYER**

**"Payment In Full"**

Suppose somebody owes you money. According to your figures, the amount is \$300. But the debtor insists that the amount is only \$200. One day you receive a check from him for \$200. On the back he has written the words "PAYMENT IN FULL."

Should you cash the check and take a chance on collecting the extra \$100 later on? It is tempting to do just that.

The trouble is that if you cash the check as is, the law will probably consider the whole debt wiped out. The debtor has made you a legal offer to settle up for a total of \$200. By cashing the check you are accepting his offer and agreeing to a final settlement at that figure.

Truc, with the \$200 check in your hands, you might be reluctant indeed to let it go. One man in this predicament tried to steer a middle course. He erased the word "FULL" and substituted the word "PART," then cashed the check.

However, his strategy did not work. A court held later that he had no claim to any more money. The court said he had no authority, on his own, to alter the terms of the defendant's offer.

Another man tried something else. He too cashed a PAYMENT IN FULL check, but at the same time wrote the debtor that he simply was not accepting it as a full settlement.

But again, a court ruled that the entire debt was wiped out. The court said the man's actions in cashing the check spoke louder than his words of disavowal.

Even if you don't cash the check but merely hang onto it, you might be held to have accepted the debtor's offer. Silence can mean consent.

However, that wouldn't happen right away. In one case, a creditor kept such a check for six weeks before mailing it back to the debtor. The latter thereupon insisted that the delay had cancelled the entire debt.

But a court decided the debt was still due and payable. The court thought six weeks was not an unreasonable time, under the circumstances, for the creditor to weigh his next move.

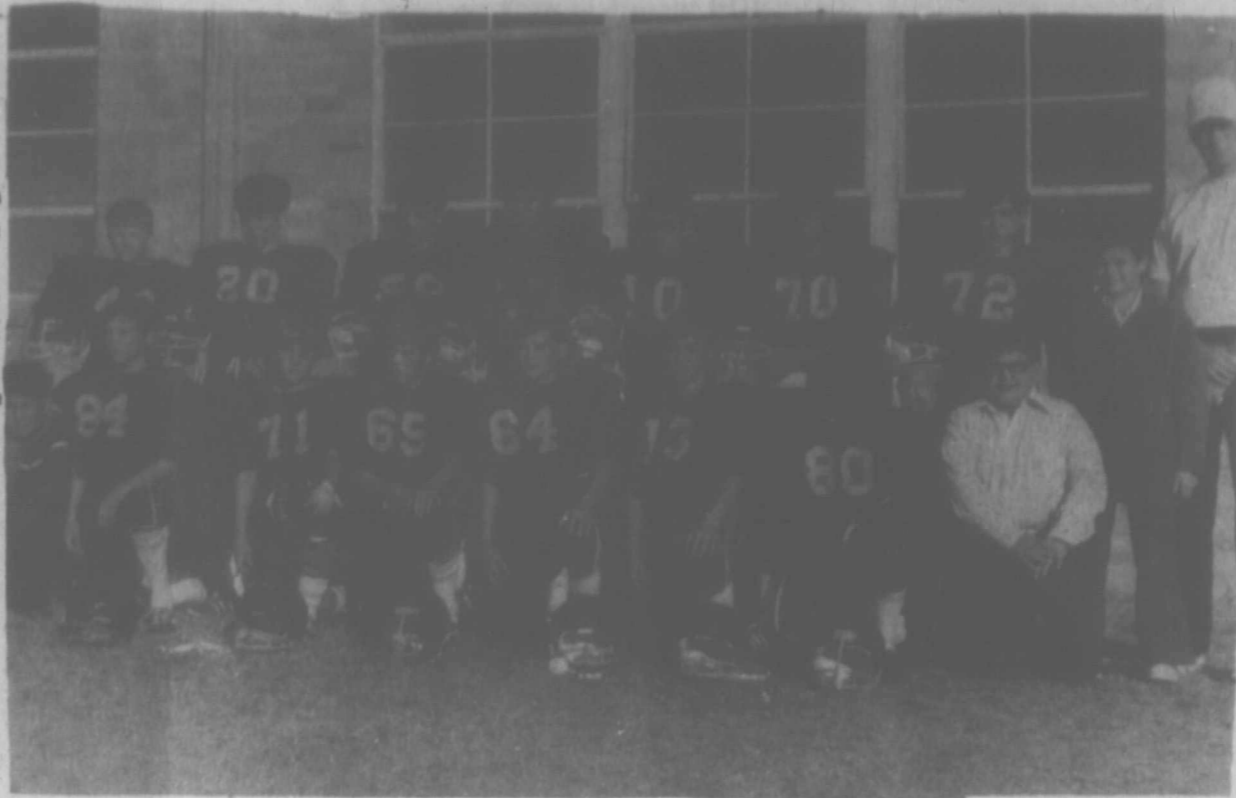

**PREPARING ANTIQUES FOR FINISHING**

Antiques are where you find them...and getting more valuable day by day. To restore them, just follow a few simple rules.

Remember refinishing may not be necessary. Often a good cleaning is all that's needed. But use a good furniture cleaner and a clean cloth, not water.

If you must refinish, remove shelving, drawers and hardware. Sand as little as possible to retain the unique patina the piece has built up over the years.

To raise shallow dents and gouges, place a damp cloth over the area and "steam" it with a medium-hot iron. For deep gouges and cracks, mix animal glue with sanding dust from the piece. Tamp it in, let it dry and smooth with razor blade.

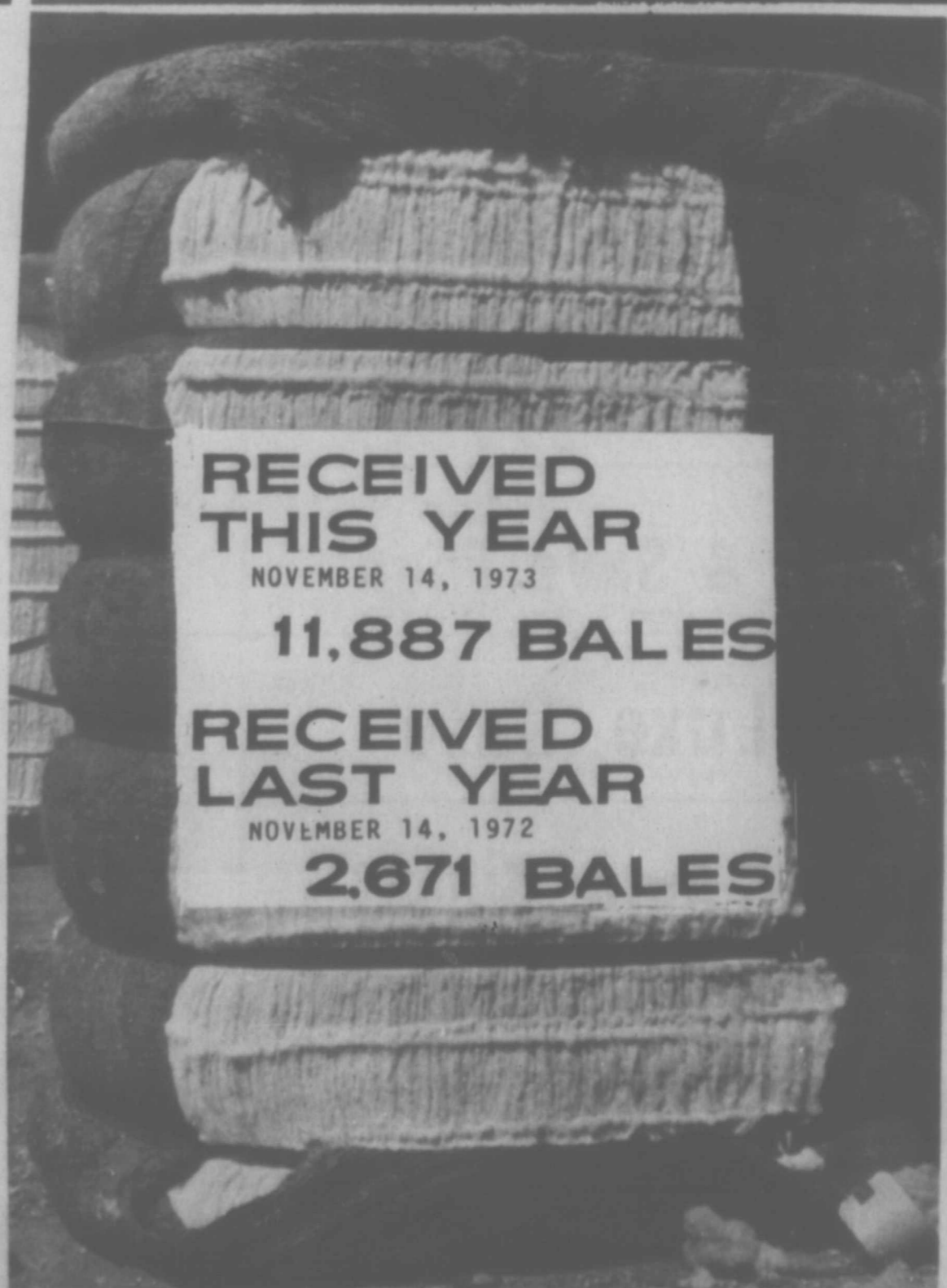

**ADVICE TO VETERANS**

The Veterans Administration urges veterans who haven't done so to "advise survivors of benefits they're entitled to from the agency in event of your death."

Jack Coker, VA Regional Director, emphasized that "failure to do so could cause anguish during times of great emotional stress."

"It's a good idea for veteran and spouse to sit down and openly discuss important family matters, including locations of family documents, which would facilitate filing of claims for VA benefits, he further suggested.

Such documents as military discharge papers, divorce decrees, guardianship or child custody evidence, birth, marriage and death certificate should be kept safe from fire and theft, yet readily accessible.

Other important details include keeping track of GI and commercial insurance policies, "C" numbers from VA correspondence, Social Security numbers and naturalization papers.

Veterans also were advised that in event of death, the deceased's family or close friends should know they can check with veterans service organizations, as well as VA offices, for information or other assistance.
