SOME OF YOU probably wouldn't believe the amount of interesting (but to me, not very useful) information I absorbed over the weekend: Most of the stuff I picked up won't do me much good in the production of a newspaper, except that we newsmen are supposed to know a little bit about everything

(and not much about anything).

The subject of all the new (to me) information was ranching and related subjects, and it all came to me during a delightful weekend visiting on a ranch operated by Jack Ham, a former resident of Slaton. Some of the information came from Jack, but mostly I got it. from listening to a couple of oldtime cowhands-Jack's father, C. E. Ham, and R. J. Clark of Slaton-swap stories about ranch life. They both knew what they were talking about, and I just sat back and listened, because every word I spoke showed my ignorance. ... We drove around on the place,

and I forget just how many sections it is, but one section, I learned, will support about 18 cows, hundreds of rattlesnakes and 347,000 mesquite trees and

The Ham ranch is located four miles down a caliche-graveldirt road fairly close to Slide, or Stiles, or Snipe, or something like that, only this place isn't there any more-it's just a big old vacant building that looks like it once was a courthouse. In fact, there's not any place close to the ranch unless you go 25 miles to Big Lake or 40 miles or so to Stanton. I guess the best way to describe the location of the ranch might be to use the weather bureau's system: It lies about 70 miles either side of a line drawn from El Paso to Beaumont.

The food and hospitality at the ranch are Grade A, top quality. I guess they don't have many visitors, so when they get one, they treat him royally. Before and after the delicious meals, I sat around and absorbed the following

If you have a lot of coyotes, you won't have any foxes. Don't nothing fight like two

old jacks. Champion roper Toots Mansfield had a place somewhere (I forget where, now). And old Jake McClure was a fine roper...he was killed in a car wreck. And all good "fourfooters" used a pretty big loop.

Mesquites will grow from a mesquite bean that's been lying on the ground 25 years.

A sheep will just stand there and drown if the water rises around him; you can't even drive one out.

It's hard to realize now how far one of those old ponies would goin a day. . . "we used to saddle one up at daybreak and ride him all day, 50 or 60 miles, without hardly giving him a drink. "

Cows that run in the sand have longer toes than those that graze elsewhere... "you can hear

them popping a half mile." One thing I learned for sure is that while I may not be exactly super-efficient in the office,

"Payment In Full"

Suppose somebody owes you money. According to your figures, the amount is \$300. But the debtor insists that the amount is only \$200. One day you receive a check from him for \$200. On the back he has written the words: "PAYMENT IN FULL." Should you cash the check and take a chance on collecting the extra \$100 later on? It is tempt-

ing to do just that. The trouble is that if you cash the check as is, the law will probably consider the whole debt wiped out. The debtor has made you a legal offer to settle up for a total of \$200. By cashing the check you are accepting his offer and agreeing to a final settlement at that figure.



True, with the \$200 check in your hands, you might be reluctant indeed to let it go. One man in this predicament tried to steer a middle course. He erased the word "FULL" and substituted the word "PART," then cashed the check.

However, his strategy did not work. A court held later that he had no claim to any more money. The court said he had no authority, on his own, to alter the terms of the defendant's offer. Another man tried something He too cashed a PAY MENT IN FULL check, but at

that he simply was not accepting it as a full settlement But again, a court ruled that the entire debt was wiped out. The court said the man's actions in cashing the check spoke louder than his words of dis-

Even if you don't cash the check but merely hang onto it, you might be held to have accepted the debtor's offer. Silence can mean consent.

However, that wouldn't happen right away. In one case, a creditor kept such a check for six weeks before mailing it back to the debtor. The latter thereupon insisted that the delay had cancelled the entire debt.

But a court decided the debt was still due and payable. The court thought six weeks was not an unreasonable time, under the circumstances, for the creditor to weigh his next move.







PREPARING ANTIQUES FOR FINISHING

Antiques are where you find them...and getting more valuable day by day. To restore them, just follow a few simple rules.

Remember refinishing may not be necessary. Often a good cleaning is all that's needed. But use a good fur-

niture cleaner and a clean cloth, not water.

If you must refinish, remove shelving, drawers and hardware. Sand as little as possible to retain the unique patina

To raise shallow dents and gouges, place a damp cloth over the area and "steam" it with a medium-hot iron. For deep gouges and cracks, mix animal glue with sanding dust from the piece. Tamp it in, let it dry and smooth with razor blade.



The Veterans Administration urges veterans who haven't done so to "advise survivors of benefits they're entitled to from the agency in event of your death. " Jack Coker, VA Regional Director, emphasized that "failure to do so could cause anguish during times of great emotional

"It's a good idea for veteran and spouse to sit down and openly discuss important family matters, including locations of family documents, which would facilitate filing of claims for VA benefits, he further suggested.

Such documents as militar discharge papers, divorce de crees, guardianship or chilcustody evidence, birth, mar riage and death certificate should be kept safe from fire and theft, yet readily access

Other important details include keeping track of GI and commercial insurance policies, "C" numbers from VA correspondence, Social Security numbers and naturalization

Veterans also were advised that in event of death, the deceased's family or close friends should know they can check with veterans service organizations, as well as VA offices, for information or other assistance.


