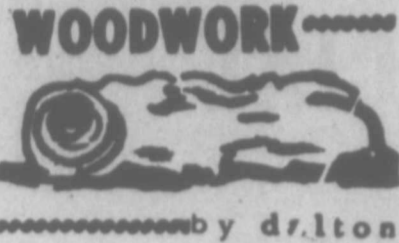

IN THE LAST three or four years, I have owned probably 18 or 20 pairs of sun shades, ranging in price from 49 cents to \$12. It's not that I have such a hard time finding a pair that I like. 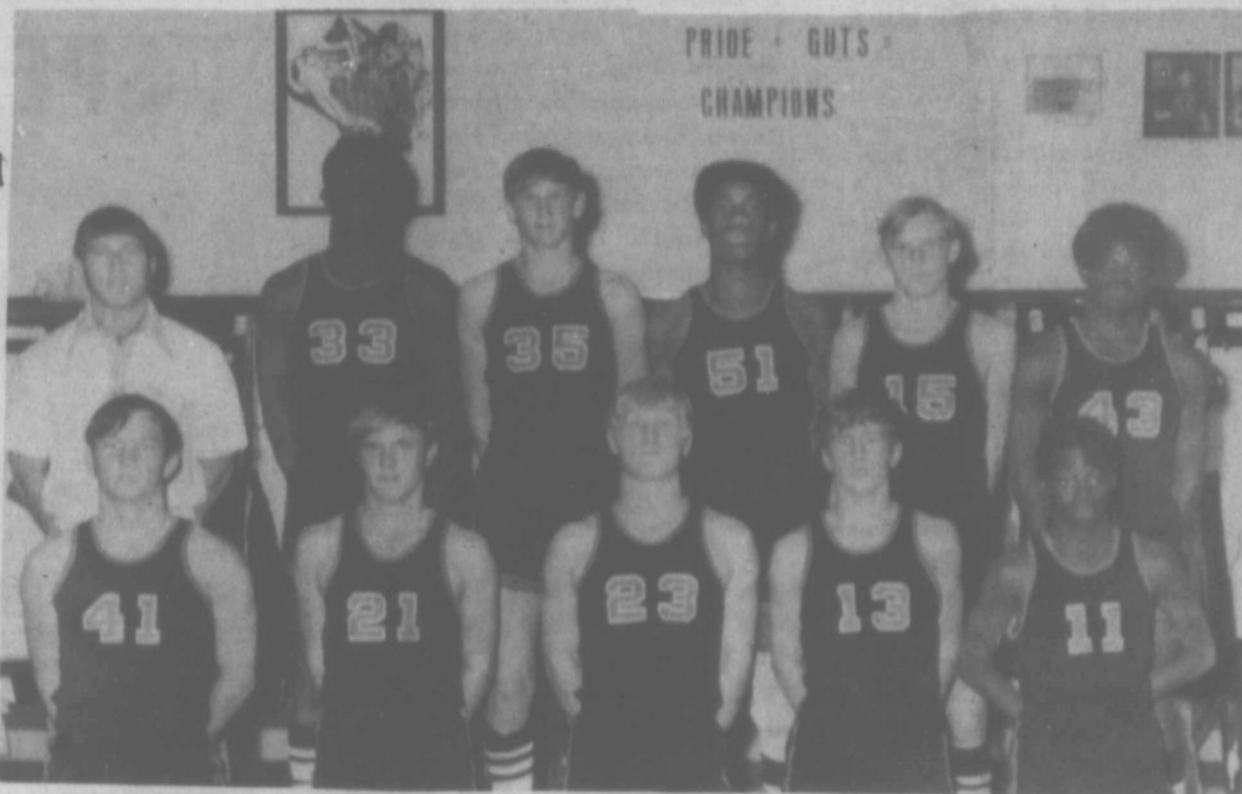
The other day I heard a man say that forgetfulness was a sign of "maturity." If I get any more mature, I'm going to be overripe.

HORNETS ROUNDBALL SEASON OFF TO GOOD START

The Sudan Hornets kicked off their basketball season with a hard-fought victory over the Lazbuddie Longhorns Monday night, 38-31.

Sudan had trouble mustering an effective offense but threw up a tough zone defense that kept the Longhorns on the short end of the score all night.

Carroll Legg, a surprise starter for the Hornets was the "bright spot" of the game. The 5'9"

junior was especially effective defensively with 10 rebounds and one steal. Offensively, Carroll hit on 3 of 4 field goal attempts and scored 6 of the Hornets' first 12 points to pull Sudan into an early lead. For his efforts, Coach Campbell cited him as the "Hustlin' Hornet" of the game.

Offensively, the Hornets managed only 29% from the floor, compared to Lazbuddies' 26%.

Mark Hanna led the local scoring column with 11, followed by Richard Tamplin's 10, Carroll Legg with 6, Danny Williams 4, Mike Robinson 3, Pat Hedges 2, and Ronnie Harrison 2. Bobby Phillips and Craig Harper also played well.

Sudan's lead throughout the contest fluctuated throughout the contest between one and ten points, but they never trailed. A 35 foot shot at the halftime buzzer by Tamplin pulled Sudan into a 22-10 bulge but the 'Horns fought back to within one point in the fourth quarter, 31-30. Sudan went into a stall with two minutes to play and free throws by Hedges, Robinson and Hanna iced the game for the Hornets.

A strong full court press by the JV Hornets enabled Sudan to overcome a 17-10 deficit at halftime and establish a 28-25 lead with 5:00 left in the game. Lazbuddie came on strong at the free throw line, however, and eventually took a 36-33 decision. Kyle Martin and Jerry Williams each scored 10 points while Luther Robinson managed 8 and Craig Pickett 5. Brad Pierce was the workhorse on the boards as he hauled down 16 rebounds.

The varsity boys and girls are entered in their first tournament of the year tonight at Spade as they will play the host teams at 6:30 and 8:00 p. m.

Last Tuesday night prior to the Thanksgiving holidays, the varsity and JV girls played Whiteface in the local gym with the JV losing 43-39 in a thrilling game that went into two overtime periods. The score at the end of regulation play was 34 all. Kay Tamplin led the locals with 30 points.

The Hornette varsity team won 42-39 and led all the way. Scoring by quarters was 9-0, 20-13, 31-25, and 42-39 with Joan Hedges scoring high for the locals with 16 points. She was followed by Linda Edwards and Phyllis Ray with 8 each, Debra Edwards and Mary Ann Bellar with 5 each. Completing the Hornette varsity team were Evelyn Caldwell, Mary Griffith, Jo Gaye Doty, Wanda Weaver, Sharron Burton, Cindy Moss, Shelley Hargrove. Three of the Hornettes fouled out.

In the Lazbuddie games Monday night, the Hornets did not fare so well; however, they led at halftime and at the end of the third quarter. They got off to a slow start and scored only four points to Lazbuddie's 12 in the first quarter. Lazbuddie won on a note of 32-24. Sharing scoring honors were Debra Edwards and Phyllis Ray with 6 each; Mary Ann Bellar had 4, Linda Edwards and Joan Hedges 3 each; and Evelyn Caldwell 2 points. Lazbuddie received 11 fouls to 13 for Sudan with one Hornette fouling out.

The JV girls walloped Lazbuddie by a score of 39-11. Kay Tamplin again led with 24 points.

FIRE DAMAGES BARBER SHOP

An early Wednesday morning fire at The Barber Shop, owned and operated by Dood Harragan and Jimmy Carpenter, occurred around 6:00 a. m. The fire was first seen by J. W. House, publisher of Sudan Beacon News, as he returned from a cafe and on way to his business. House stated that he noticed smoke coming out at the front of the building. He turned in the alarm and local firemen answered the call.

An estimate of damage was not known at press time. However, some wiring was destroyed and there was heavy smoke damage. The smoke also spread to adjoining buildings which were Doods Custom Framing and The First National Bank with firemen again being called to the scene to check for the possibility of more fire.

Cause of the fire was reported to have been from a new hot water heater which had been installed on Monday.

TDPS REPORT

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 18 accidents on rural highways in Lamb County during the month of October, according to Sergeant Thurman Keffer, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in two persons killed and 19 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first ten months of 1973 shows a total of 98 accidents resulting in 31 persons killed and 48 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for October, 1973 shows a total of 664 accidents resulting in 31 persons killed and 377 persons injured as compared to October, 1972 with 605 accidents resulting in 20 persons killed and 280 persons injured. This was 59 more accidents, 11 more fatalities, and 97 more injured in 1973 at the same period of time.

The 31 traffic deaths for the month of October, 1973, occurred in the following counties: Moore, Lubbock, Wichita, Wise, three each; Dallam, Hale, Jack, Lamb, two each; Carson, Castro, Deaf Smith, Donley, Gray, Oldham, Randall, Wheeler, Bailey, Clay, Knox, one each.

LITTLEFIELD FEEDERS GROUNDBREAKING SET

Groundbreaking ceremonies of Littlefield Feeders, Inc. has been scheduled for Thursday, December 6, 1973 at 3:00 p. m. The Littlefield Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture announces that the ceremony will take place five miles north of Littlefield on U. S. 385 and one and one fourth mile west on F. M. 37 for the cattle feed lot. The public is invited to attend.

Construction will start immediately on the 30,000 head cattle feed lot on a 354 acre tract. Projected time for the first cattle to be on feed is in nine months. The feed lot will employ 24 to 28 people with an annual payroll in excess of \$200,000.00.

The actual feed pens will cover approximately 100 acres. They will operate their own feed mill and do custom feeding for single owner and joint owner feeders. They will have the latest automatic equipment for feeding cattle. They also will encourage feeder clubs where individuals may belong to a small partnership or corporation for the purpose of feeding cattle. They will use some 120 million pounds of grain annually, which our local area should be able to supply.

The Littlefield Feeders, Inc. will ship finished cattle all over the U. S. but mainly to the North, East and South.

Littlefield Feeders, Inc. has 62 stockholders with the majority of them living in Lamb County.

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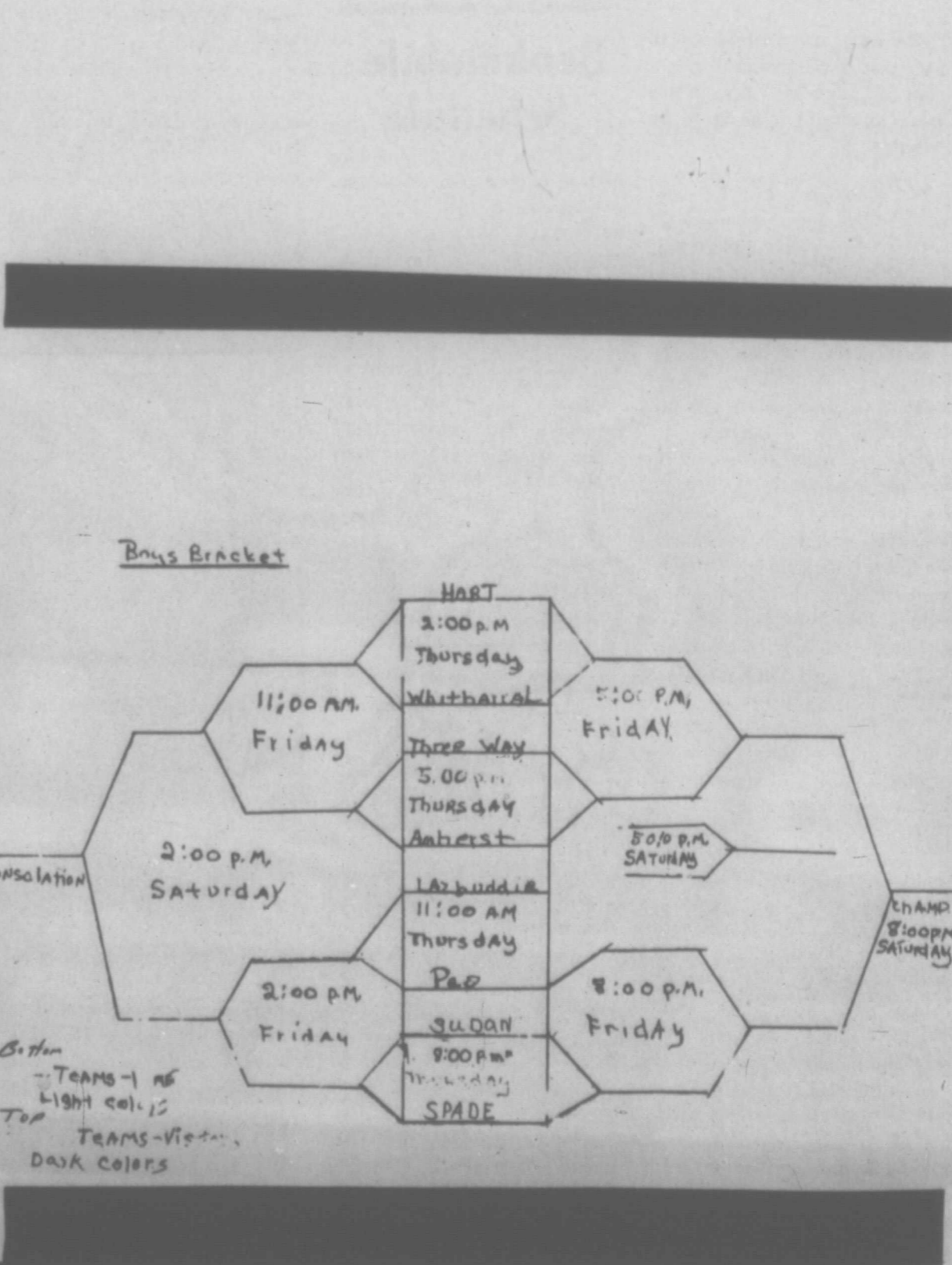
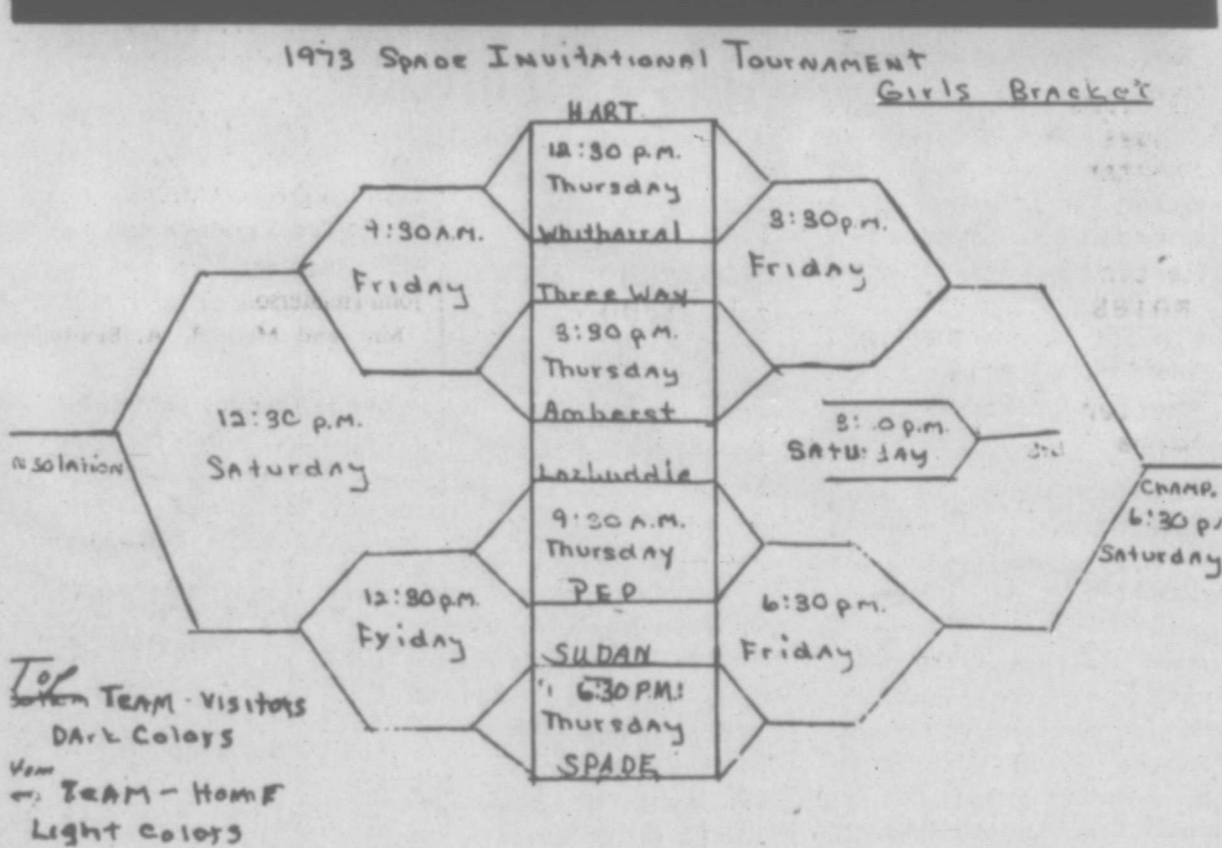

COTTON HARVEST PASSES 500,000 BALE MARK

The South Plains cotton harvest passed the 500,000 bale mark during the past week and is nearing peak activity, according to Paul R. Dickson, in charge of the U. S. D. A. Cotton Classing Office in Lubbock.

Estimates indicate that approximately one-third of this season's crop is now out of the fields. Some farmers in the Sudan area are nearing completion in harvesting their cotton crop and with continuing good weather should finish in the next few weeks.

Local gins have reported a good turnout

3,905 ginned bales as of the same date. Central Compress has received 52,687 ginned bales as compared to 6,831 at the same time last year.

The U. S. D. A. Cotton Classing Offices at Lubbock, Brownfield, Lamesa and Levelland classed samples from 214,000 bales during the week ending Friday, November 23rd. This brought the total classed this season to 572,000.

Quality of cotton continued excellent and is considerably higher than last year.

Grades 31 and 41 continued to be the predominant grades at Lubbock, making up 78 percent of all classed. Grade 31 made up 30 percent, Grade 41, 48 percent and Grade 32, 10 percent.

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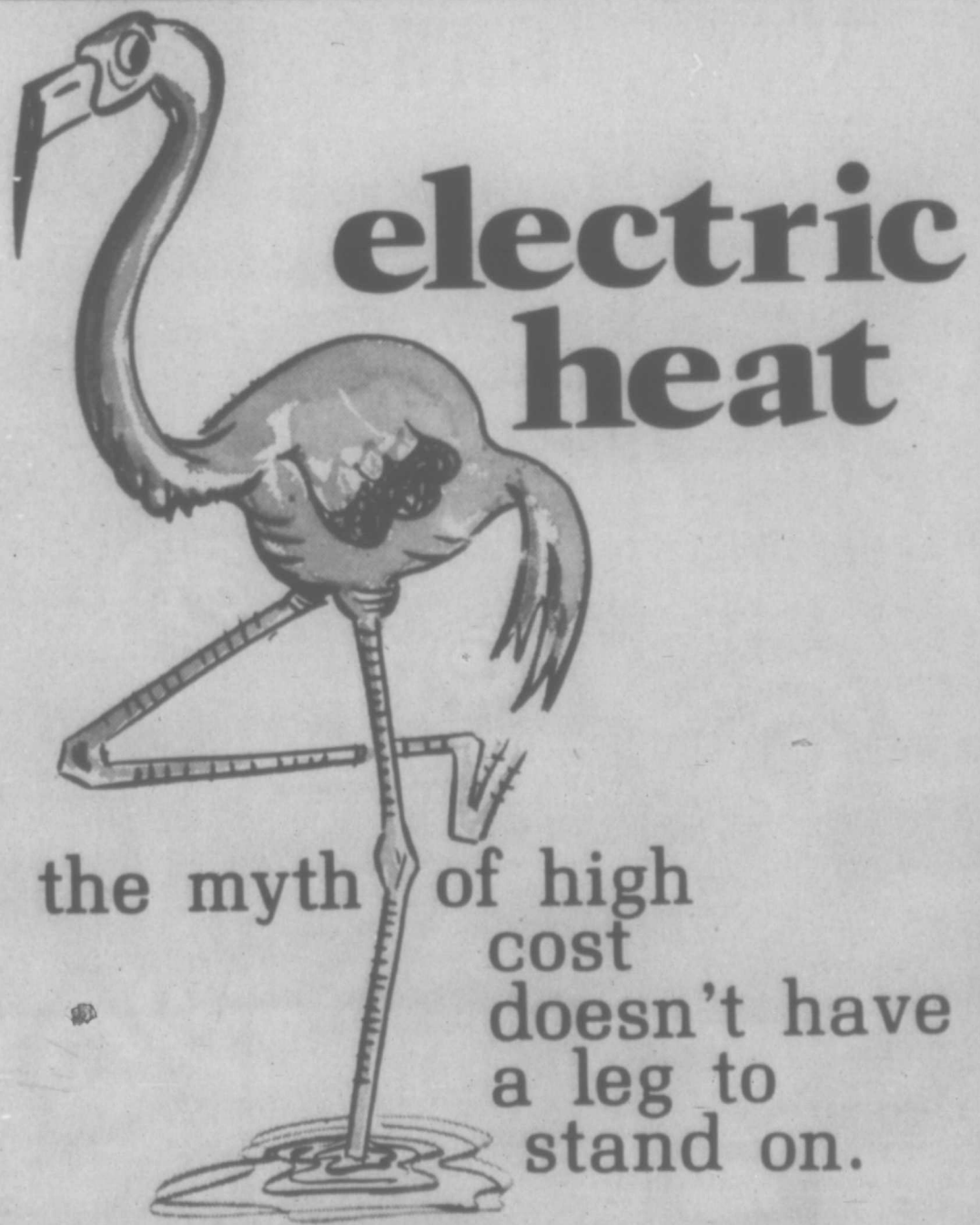

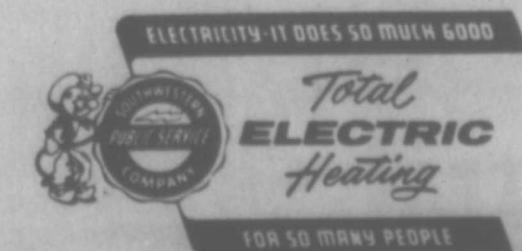
