## HORNETTES NOW HAVE DISTRICT RECORD, 2-3

The Hornets now have a district record of 2-2 after suffering losses to both Vega and Bovina over the past weekend. Coach Alvin Scott commended the work of guards in each game

and stated that the forwards hit cold periods when the hoop seemed to have a lid on it. All team members saw action in the losses. The locals journeyed to Vega

Thursday night where they were defeated by a score of 50-27. They managed only four points in the first period of play and only two in the second. Due to the low-scoring forwards, Scott switched Guard Wanda Weaver to forward who immediately drove to the basket when she got the ball for two points. Others scoring were Joann Hedges with 10 points, Bellar 7, Debra and Linda Edwards 4 each. The hosts had three forwards scoring in double figures.

Saturday night the locals hosted Bovina in an evenly matched event. The score was tied 10 all at the end of the initial quarter and 21 all at halftime. Bovina got the edge in the third period, of play by eight points, a lead the Hornets could not overcome. Their second district loss was by a score of 46-39.

Miss Hedges again led Sudan in scoring with 23 points while Miss Bellar hit for 10, Phyllis Ray 4, and Evelyn Caldwell 2. Nancy Hutto scored 18 for Bovina.

The JV girls also suffered defeat at the hands of Vega, 37-18, and did not score a single point in the first quarter and only 3 in the second. Terri Chester scored 11 points, Linda Moore 3, Kaye Tamplin and Chryl Phillips 2 each.

In the Bovina game here Saturday the locals won 38-34 with the guards playing a strong defensive game and Terri Chester scoring 23 big points. Linda Moore had 8, and Kaye Tamplin and Chryl Phillips again tied with 4 each.

Thursday night's game with Vega found the Hornets fighting back "gamely" from a 22 point deficit in the final quarter before falling to the defending district champions 44-56. Richard Tamplin provided the "hot hand" for Sudan with 23 points.

The Hornets dumped Bovina Saturday night upping their season record 11-6 and district mark 2-2 with a hard-fought 59-52 victory. D. Williams played an outstanding game for the Hornets with 19 points and 16

## NEW TIME SCHEDULE ADOPTED AT SPC

South Plains College has adopted a new day time class schedule due to the change to Daylight Saving Time.

The new schedule—which moves classes ahead by 30 minutes—will be put into operation when spring classes begin Jan.

14. With the 30-minute delay, Monday, Wednesday and Friday classes will start at 8:30, 9:30 and 11:30 a.m. and 12:30, 1:30, 2:30 and 3:30 p.m. Tuesday and Thursday classes will start at 8:30, 9:55 and 11:20 a.m. and 1:30 and 2:55 p.m.

The evening class schedule will stay the same with courses scheduled to meet at 5:30, 7 and 8:40 p.m. Monday through Thursday.

At the same time, administrative office hours were changed to 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays. Under the new schedule, lunch breaks will be shortened to 30 minutes and by staggering lunch times, all offices will remain open throughout the day. The new times for administrative offices is effective as of Monday, Jan. 7.

Registration for spring classes at South Plains College will be Thursday and Friday (Jan. 10-11) in the Technical Arts Center.

Students are to sign up for classes from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. both days, said Jerry Barton, registrar. Evening college registration will begin at 7 p.m. Jan. 10 in the Technical Arts Center.

Classes will begin at 8 a.m. Monday, Jan. 14.

Deadline to register for off-campus classes will be at noon Friday, Jan. 25 in the Office of Admissions at SPC, Barton added. Extension courses are being offered this spring at Brownfield, Littlefield, Seminole and Reese Air Force Base.

Extension courses in English, psychology, business and history will be offered this spring at Littlefield High School by SPC. Cost is \$50 for three semester hours, \$53 for six semester hours and \$67 for nine semester hours.

Late registration will be from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Jan. 10-11 and from 7 to 8 p.m. on Jan. 10, all on the SPC campus.

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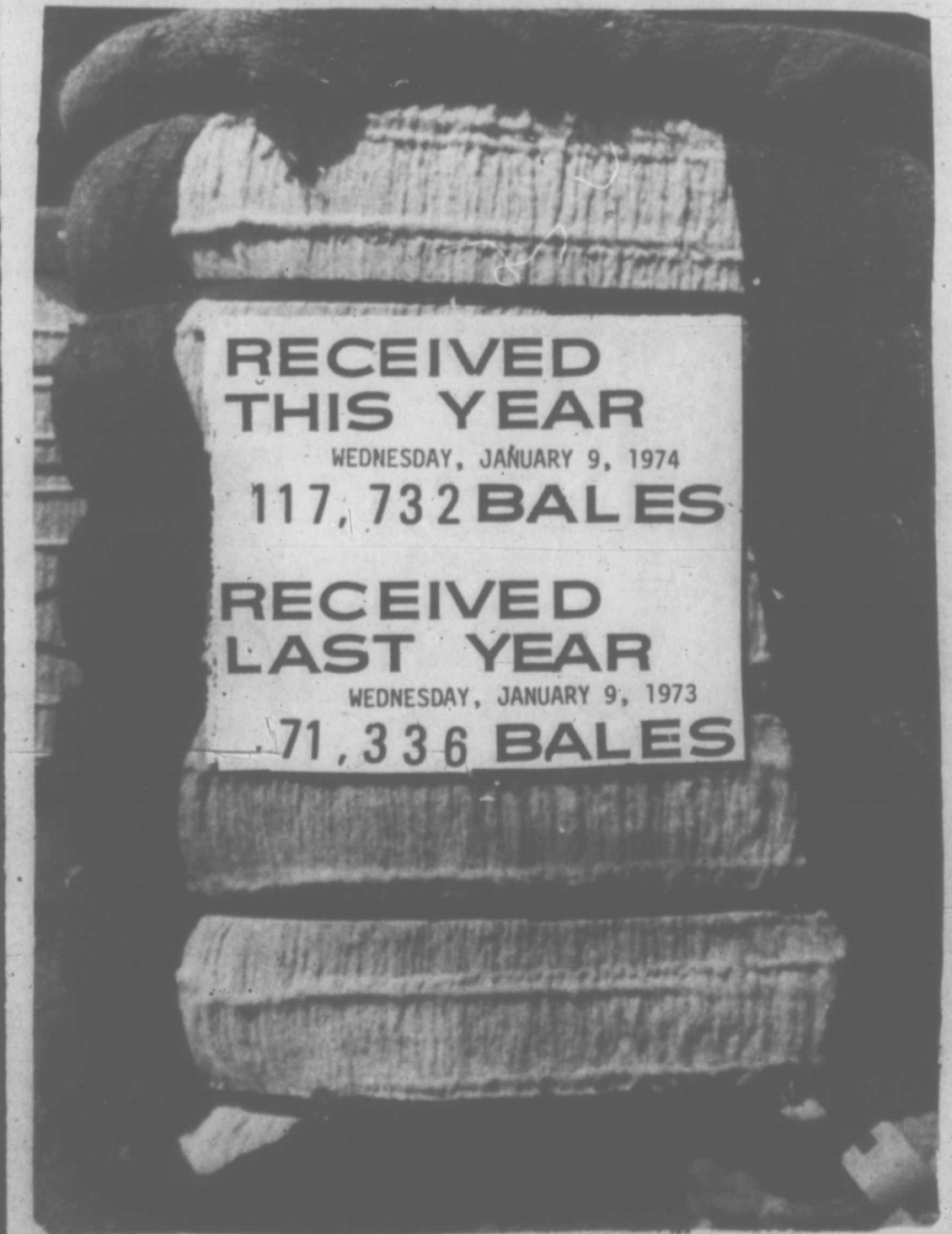
