# Drive Started For Community Rec Center

Friona will continue to have a bowling establishment.

This fact was borne out at a community meeting on Monday night of this week in which a group of residents pledged themselves to raise the money necessary to put in a new recreation center at the former Friona lanes location.

The enthusiasm exhibited by those present Monday left no doubt that instead of losing a recreational facility, Friona will in all probability have a more diversified center in the long run.

It's a shame that all of Friona was not at the meeting Monday in Friona State Bank's Community Room. It made us proud to be in Friona.

Here was a group of people banding together saying "We're not going to stand idly by and lose our recreational facility. We're not going to be like other neighboring towns. We're going to keep something to do in Friona."

And, as we predicted in the opening line of this column, we believe that the group will achieve its goal.

Just like everyone else at the meeting Monday night, we think Friona needs such a recreational facility. Several good reasons were advanced at the meeting for keeping such a place open in Friona.

One reason is that it acts as a recreational center for teenagers. It is a place for them to meet for recreation, without having to go to Clovis or Hereford.

Second, it keeps local bowlers at home. When bowlers go in groups to another town to bowl, it's awfully easy to spend money shopping -- money which is taken away from the business community.

Another point was that newcomers -- both residents and possible industry -- like to know what recreational facilities a town has. As one spokesman said "They look at our schools, our churches, our homes, and our recreational facilities."

The spokesman mentioned above was Ed Hicks, local real estate salesman, who said "Some people may wonder why I'm still interested in a bowling establishment for Friona. (Hicks was one of those instrumental in bringing bowling to Friona originally. He sold his interests in 1963 to W.H. Graham.)

"However, as a resident of the community, I feel that I should be interested in the community and its future," Hicks said.

Usually when you lose something, as Friona bowlers lost the old Friona Lanes set-up, it's difficult, if not impossible, to get something back which is anywhere approaching the original facility.

However, it appears that if the group achieves its goal, Friona will have an eight-lane bowling center, along with a billiard parlor which will cater to everyone -- women and girls included.

This, we think, will make the new center a vast improvement over the old Friona Lanes.

Other cities have tried "family" pool centers, and have found them to be quite successful.

Experts point out that a new billiard parlor such as this will not hurt an established poolroom since an entirely different crowd will be involved in the new place.

They would be players who would not ordinarily go to the established poolroom; and the customers of the established poolroom would probably not be interested in the new place.

All of this sounds very feasible to us. We want to urge you to take stock in the new corporation. Stock is being sold at \$100 per share to raise money to bring the lanes and other equipment to Friona.

We know that there were many people who did not attend the meeting Monday who will want to have a part in the money raising.

Remember, when you're contacted -- this is not just a donation. It's an investment in the future of Friona -- in your future.

And Friona is a progressive town. We're glad to be a part of a community which refuses to give up one of their good points. And we think you are too.

A group of Friona citizens interested in having a bowling establishment in Friona met Monday night at the Friona State Bank's Community Room, and organized a fund-raising drive to finance the establishment of the new recreational facility.

The group is forming a corporation, and is in the process of selling stock at \$100 per share.

Friona Lanes, the former 12-lane bowling facility, came to an end when AMF, owner of the lanes and ma-

chinery, repossessed the equipment last week.

It is thought that arrangements can be made to open a new recreational facility in the same location. Negotiations were underway this week to secure the building from W.H. Graham, who had owned it the past three years.

Raymond Adams was elected chairman of the fund-raising drive. Flake Barber was named vice-chairman and Betty Louise Rector was elected secretary.

Negotiations are currently underway for an eight-lane bowling set-up, which is thought to be adequate for Friona. In addition, it is planned to use the remaining space where the other four lanes were located for billiard tables for the public's use.

In this way, the recreational center can cater to more people than bowlers. It was discussed having at least a partial partition to divide off this area.

One of the drawbacks to the old Friona Lanes, it was explained by Ed Hicks, a former owner, was that a portion of the cost for every line of bowling had to be sent to the AMF company, an item which proved expensive during the years Friona Lanes operated.

Under the new corporation's plans, the lanes and equipment would be bought outright, and owned by the corporation. No monthly lease would be due under this arrangement.

# Friona United Fund Raised 109 Per Cent

The Friona United Fund distributed checks to its various components this week, with all of the participating units getting more than they had requested for the first time in several years.

Steve Messenger, chairman stated that the 1966 United Fund drive totalled \$6251.52, which

represented 109 per cent of the goal of \$5733.00.

Residents of the Friona area contributed approximately \$1.25 per capita, stated Messenger, who expressed his thanks to all who helped put the goal "over the top."

Friona is a possible state record holder, for having

reached its goal only nine days after its drive was kicked off. The city of Hereford had earlier in the year claimed the record for having made its goal in two weeks.

There was a total of \$66.50 given for especially designated charities, which went to these particular funds over and above their share of the undesignated gifts.

Every fund this received at least eight per cent more than their budget request, with those getting specially designated gifts getting a fraction more.

The money was divided as follows: Boy Scouts \$1759.00; Girl Scouts -- \$1470.33; Red Cross -- \$1303.93; Salvation Army -- \$970.94; USO -- \$138.97; Cub Scouts -- \$55.38; and Emergency Fund -- \$552.97.

By raising 109 per cent of its goal, Friona is expected to be among the leading cities in the state for percentage of goal reached. The state United Fund headquarters will release a final report in this regard in the near future.

## Banquet Tickets Still Selling Well

Tickets to the Friona Chamber of Commerce's annual banquet continued to sell at a brisk pace this week, according to Mary Kaye Everitt, chamber manager.

With the banquet still two weeks from tonight (February 9), the banquet is over one-half sold out, Mrs. Everitt says.

The chamber manager announced this week that a set of special tickets are to go on sale for \$2, for the entertainment portion of the evening. Entertaining for the annual banquet will be the Brooks Sisters, vivacious trio from Denton, who have graced the Ed Sullivan Show as well as other NBC shows. Banquet tickets are \$4 per person.

After appearing on the Ed Sullivan show, the Brooks sisters made a tour of some of the largest fairs, in the nation, and were co-billed with such stars as Andy Williams, Red Skelton, Frank Fontaine and Tennessee Ernie Ford and others.

They also had a six-week summer engagement with Ed Sullivan at Harrah's of Lake Tahoe.

Friona High School freshman class members, under the leadership of David McFarland, are to canvass the town with the special \$2 tickets for the entertainment portion of the show, which will be held at the Friona High School Auditorium.

Both teams scored wins over Lockney in games here December 20.

However, next Tuesday the Squaws will be out to gain revenge over Floydada, the only team to beat them during the first half of play, and one of only two teams to turn the trick all season. The Whirlettes scored a 51-33 win at Floydada January 3.

Both games are "musts" for the Chieftains, if they are to keep in the running for the second half title.

# Teams Grab Close Wins At Olton

Basketball teams from Friona High School invaded Olton Tuesday night and made off with two important District 3-AA wins. The games left the Squaws at 2-0 and the Chiefs 1-1 for the second round.

The Squaws, playing their last "crucial" road game, staged off a last-minute whirlwind finish by the Olton Fillies to post a 60-57 decision; the fifth time they've beat Olton this season and their closest call.

The Chieftains, upset last Friday at home by Hale Center, rebounded to beat the improved Mustangs, 55-50 having to

come from behind to do it. It was the team's 17th win of the season.

At one time in the girls' game, the Squaws had a 14-point lead, at 28-14. However, the hosts were able to trim this margin to only five points at the half, 33-29.

By the end of the third quarter, Friona had built up a nine-point edge, but the Fillies went giving up yet. Hazel Fallwell, who scored 23 points for Friona, received her fifth foul with 1:59 left in the game and Friona ahead 55-50.

The Olton free shots

trimmed it to 55-52; and a field goal a few seconds later made the count 55-54; to make things a bit squirmy for Friona fans.

However, Cindy Ingram, who paced scoring with 31 points, canned two free shots for a 57-54 edge and after Olton traded out a single free throw with Friona's Susan Neill for a 58-55 score. Cindy's two shots with 15 seconds left made it 60-55, and Olton was able to sink another field goal before the buzzer.

The Chiefs started out like gangbusters, grabbing an 8-3 lead in less than two minutes. However, they lost their scoring touch, and didn't score again until only 58 seconds remained in the quarter. By this time Olton had opened up its longest lead at 15-8.

Friona proceeded to cut the Olton advantage. The Mustangs had a 26-25 lead at half-time.

The third quarter was all Friona. Going into the last minute of the quarter, Olton had scored only three free throws and Friona had taken a 10-point lead at 39-29. A Mustang basket cut this to 39-31 at the buzzer.

**Chiefs Topped By Hale Center Owls**

The Hale Center Owls, who had almost ruined the district opener for the Friona Chiefs during the first round at Hale Center, were successful when the teams met here last Friday in the opening game of the second round.

The Owls took a 63-50 win, which placed the Chiefs in an "uphill battle" for the second half championship. The team had finished tied for second with Memphis for the first half title, losing to the Cyclones and Dimmitt.

The Squaws, first-half winners, downed Hale Center by the same margin they had in the first round, 49-39 as the team seeks to win the district championship outright by taking both halves.

The Chieftains were hindered in that their usual leading scorer, Bobby Jordan, was playing the game although he was ill with an infected ear. Jordan, who is averaging close to 20 points per game, could manage only three.

Friona struggled to keep even in the early stages of the game. It was tied after a quarter, and at halftime Hale Center led 25-24. The Chiefs' longest lead had been a two-point lead.

The Owls began to pull away in the third quarter, after which they had an 11-point bulge.

The Squaws thwarted the Hale Center girls' bid for a stalling type game, which Hale Center

had used successfully in upsetting Dimmitt a week earlier, a feat which helped Friona win the first half title.

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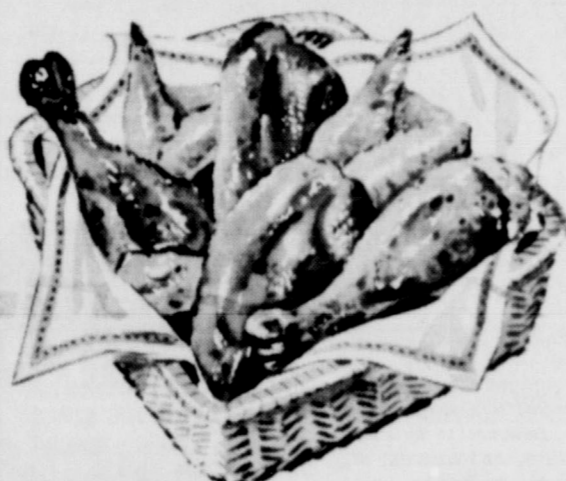

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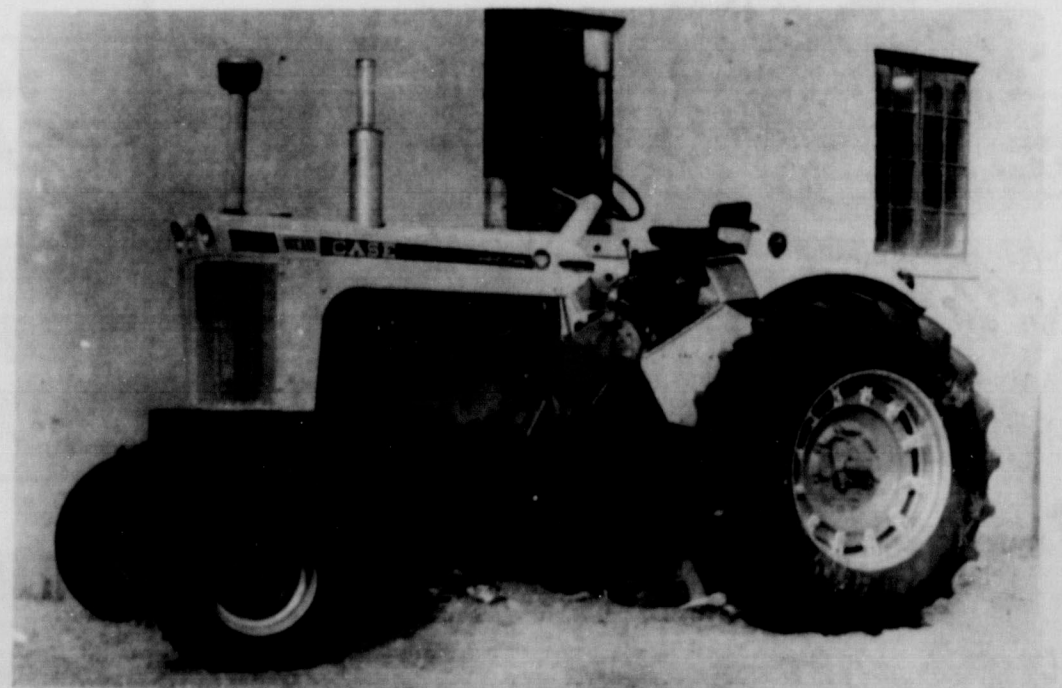

There is no doubt about it, the way you feel, act and the way you look depends upon what you eat.

These girls learn early in life to appreciate and enjoy all kinds of foods. Leader Mrs. Hurshel Harding of Farwell 4-H Food group is doing a good job with a group of 6 girls too. Plans for activities that these girls will be doing sounds very good.

#### SALADS CAN BE GOOD

After those rich holiday meals, a tempting salad can be a pleasant change of pace. More vegetables, of the green type are needed in diets and this can be a way to enjoy them more.

If you want to make your salad a light, one-dish meal, just add chopped protein foods such as meat, chicken, fish, eggs, or cheese. You can find many pleasing taste combinations using any of the vegetables or fruits.

Serve your salad in an attractive bowl or in individual salad bowls. Or you may wish to use a salad plate and form a cup of lettuce leaves. Fill the lettuce cups three-fourths full and garnish with a bit of brightly colored fruit or vegetables.

Remember that too much greenery or greens that extend beyond the edge of your salad plate with detract from the appearance of your salad.

If you are planning a fruit salad, don't forget that there are other fruits besides the old standbys such as pineapple

peaches, and pears. Consider using plums, prunes, cherries, strawberries, apricots and white grapes.

Use only fresh ingredients in your salads, and select them with thought for pleasing flavor and texture combinations. Choose a variety of color and display your salad simply on crisp, chilled greens.

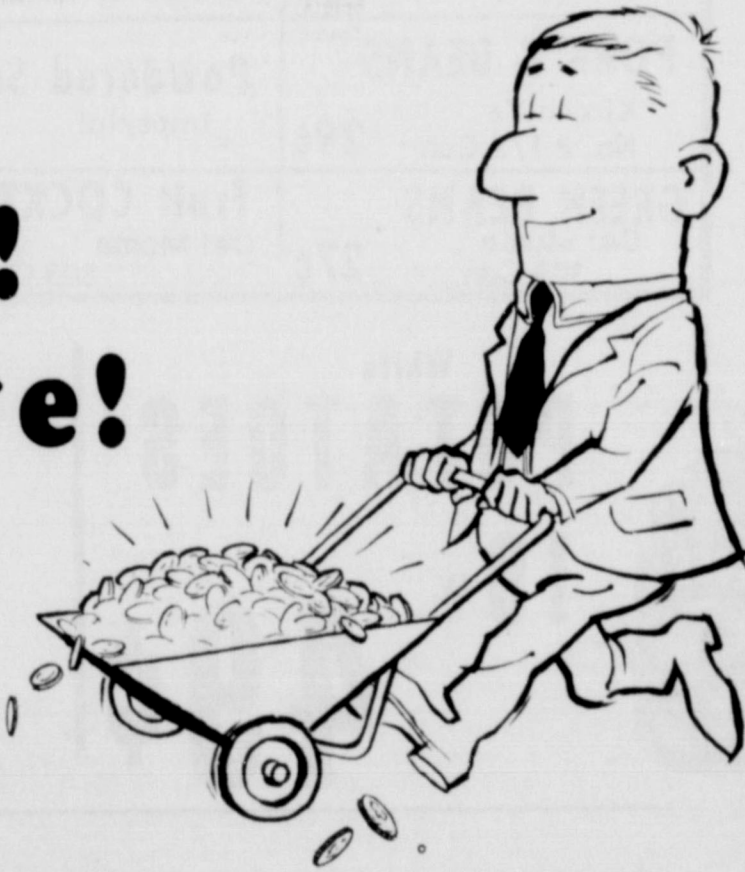

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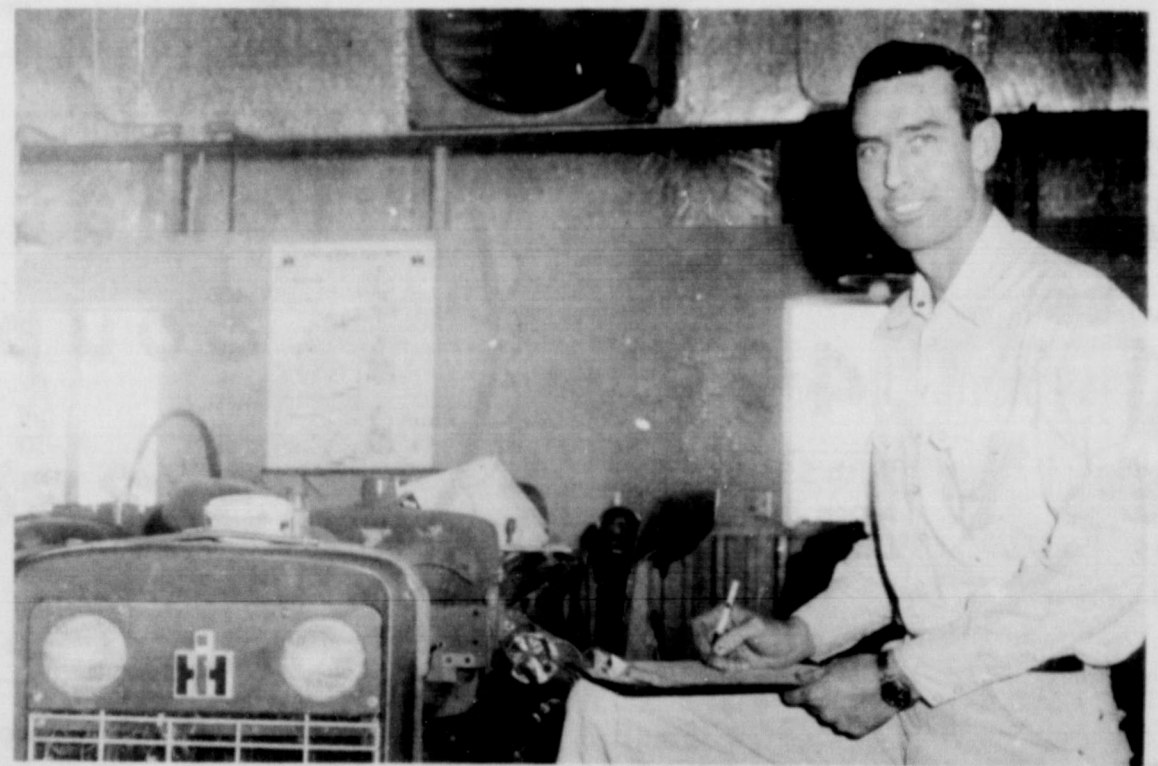
