FHA CONVENTION TO BE HELD IN AMARILLO MARCH 8 & 9

"Impact, NOW" will be the theme for the Area 1 Future Homemakers of America annual convention when it convenes in Amarillo March 8 & 9, 1974.

Impact is a new in-depth involvement project of the National Association of FHA. Local chapters across the nation are carrying out in-depth projects in their communities. Area 1's emphasis this year has been on the impact youth can have on America, now!

The activities on Friday night March 8 will be at three different locations. Beginning at 7:30 p. m. a talent show will be held in the Civic Center Auditorium. Simultaneously at 7:30 at Amarillo High School the meeting of the voting delegates will assemble to transact business and elect officers for 1974-75 school year. Following these two events, the students from HERO-FHA chapters will participate in a program and banquet at the Quality Inn.

The program for Saturday, March 9 will be held in the Civic Center Auditorium beginning with a Choir presentation by the Sharon Singers, one of the Area FHA choirs for juniors and seniors from local FHA chapters.

Miss Cindy Green, Area President from Caprock high school in Amarillo will preside during the morning. During this time certificates of recognition will be presented to 30 FHA members that have completed three levels of Encounter growth. A summary of work of the Area Officers as they undertook a project "Impact Trail" by going to local chapters presenting Impact to the members will be given.

During the noon hour the area officers will host a luncheon where each officer will recognize people that have assisted them closely during this school year.

Beginning the afternoon program, several musical selections will be presented including choir numbers, piano and organ music, as well as special guitar and drum music. Honorary Memberships will then be bestowed.

New officers will be installed and the new president will close the convention after Janet Walker of Sunray has sung "The Lords Prayer".

TAMPLIN NAMED TO ALL SOUTH PLAINS BASKETBALL TEAM

Richard Tamplin, No. 33 junior forward on the Sudan Hornet basketball team, has been selected for a spot on the Avalanche Journal's Class A All-South Plains team. Roy Watley of Vega was the only other player from District 3-A to capture a position on the team.

Others named to the team were Max Blackmon of Ropesville, James McGruder of Paducah, Steve Rathaal of Crosbyton and Carl Wright of Paducah.

Kevin Hardage of Farwell was selected for the second team with Randy Finch of Hart, Arnold Galbraith of Vega, Kevin Hargrove of Farwell, all of District 3-A, receiving "honorable mention".

Tamplin was recently named to the 3-A All-District basketball team by coaches in the district, which was the second year for the honor. ELECTION ORDER AND NOTICE

THE STATE OF TEXAS
COUNTY OF LAMB

On this the 11th day of February, 1974, the Board of Trustees of Sudan Independent School District convened in regular session, open to the public, with the following members present, to-wit: Dexter Baker, President; Marvin Bowling, Guy Walden, Halbert Harvey, Pudd Wynn, Byron Lynn, James Wynn and the following absent: none, constituting a quorum and among other proceedings had by said Board of Trustees was the following:

WHEREAS, the term of office of Guy Walden and Byron Lynn members of the Board of Trustees of this School District will expire on the first Saturday in April, 1974, said first Saturday being April 6, 1974, and on said date a trustee election will be held in said School District.

WHEREAS, it is necessary for this Board to pass an order establishing the procedure for filing for and conducting said trustee election:

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF SUDAN INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

1. That an election be held in said School District on April 6, 1974, for the purpose of electing to the Board of Trustees of said School District Two Trustees.

2. That all requests by candidates to have their names placed upon the ballot for the above mentioned election shall be in writing and signed by the candidate and filed with the secretary of the Board of Trustees at the superintendent's office not later than 30 days prior to the date of said election.

All candidates shall file with said application the loyalty affidavit required by Art. 6.02 of

the Election Code.

The Secretary of this Board of Trustees shall post on the bulletin board in the building where the Board of Trustees meet the names of all candidates that have filed their applications in accordance with the terms and provisions of this Order, and said Secretary shall otherwise comply with the terms and provisions of Art. 13.32 of the Election Code.

3. That said election shall be held at the following places, and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers for said election:

(a.) In election precincts numbered Sudan Ind. School District at Community Center Building in Sudan, Texas, in said School District, with Margaret Smith as Presiding Judge.

The polls at the above designated polling places shall on election day be open from 8:00 o'clock a. m. to 7:00 o'clock p. m.

4. Lucy Kent is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting, and Calvin Vernon and Kenneth Noles are hereby appointed Deputy Clerks for absentee voting. The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at Superintendent's Office within the boundaries of the above named School District and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election. Said place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 9:00 a. m. and 4:00 p. m. on each day for said absentee voting. The above described place for absentee voting is also the absentee Clerk's mailing address to which ballot applications and ballots voted by mail shall be sent.

6. The manner of holding

said election shall be governed, as nearly as may be, by the Election Code of this state, and this Board of Trustees will furnish all necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite to said election.

7. Immediately after the votes have been counted, the officers holding said election shall make and deliver the returns of said election and perform all other duties as provided by the Election Code.

8. The Board of Trustees shall give notice of said election, and this combined Election Order and Notice shall serve as Notice for said election. The President of the Board of Trustees is hereby authorized and instructed to post or cause to have posted said combined Election Order and Notice at three public places where notices are customarily posted in this school district, and said posting shall be made at least 20 days before the date of said election.

The President shall also cause a copy of this combined Election Order and Notice to be published one time in a newspaper of general circulation in the county where this school district is located. Said publication shall be not more than 30 days nor less than 10 days before the date of said election.

It is further found and determined that in accordance with an order of the Board of Trustees, the Secretary posted written notice of the date, place and subject of this meeting on the bulletin board located in the central administrative office of this school district, a place convenient to the public, and said notice, having been so posted, remained posted for at least 72 hours preceding the day of this meeting.

It is further found and determined that in accordance with an order of the Board of Trustees, the Secretary furnished a notice of the date, place and subject of this meeting to the county clerk of Lamb-Bailey County, Texas, the county in

which most, if not all, of this school district's pupils reside.

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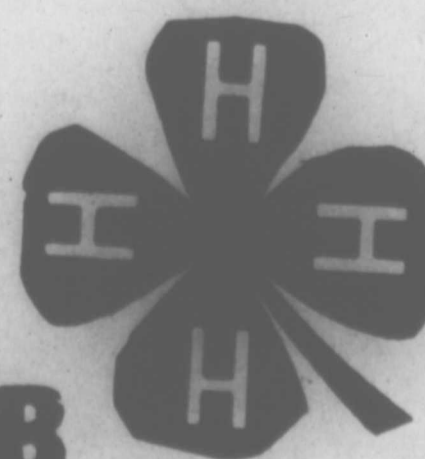

MORE WORK FROM LESS FUEL

Don Ham, Vocational Agriculture instructor at Sudan High School, submits the following suggestions for making the maximum use of tractor fuel. The information was provided by Norman K. Waggoner, Tractor Maintenance Specialist at Texas A&M University.

Waggoner states that never has there been a time when a good schedule of regular maintenance was more important than now. No engine can make maximum use of fuel without an abundance of clean air and clean fuel. This calls for servicing the air filter to assure the engine's "free breathing". Give special attention to keeping the fuel filter and servicing the fuel filter.

Operators may be forced to accept a low grade fuel that may be high in sulphur content. Sulphur in diesel fuel should not exceed one-half of one percent. A greater percentage than this will require more frequent oil changes.

Tillage practices might well be analyzed. Can the number of trips over the field be reduced without affecting yield? Can some tillage operations be combined? Maybe we should ask ourselves, "Is this trip really necessary?" Being sure tillage implements are properly adjusted will relieve side draft and reduce power requirements.

Selecting the proper forward gear to match the load will greatly improve efficiency. In many cases an operator can shift up to the next higher gear and throttle back. Diesel tractors give better fuel economy when fully loaded.

Weight the tractor to keep wheel slippage below 15%. Preferably about 10%. It has been found that wheel slippage of between 15-20 percent increases fuel consumption 10% and tire wear 40%. Excessive weight will also waste fuel. So good judgment is required here. Using the small tractor for small jobs and big tractor for big jobs is more important today than ever.

Don't "baby" the tractor, load it and work it. Remember that an engine that is idling is not idle at all. It is burning valuable fuel.
