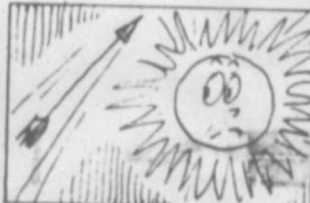

**TDS REPORT**

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated seven accidents on rural highways in Lamb County during the month of February, 1974, according to Sergeant Thurman Keffer, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and five persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first two months of 1974 shows a total of 20 accidents resulting in one person killed and 11 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of

the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for February, 1974, shows a total of 322 accidents resulting in 10 persons killed and 208 persons injured as compared to February, 1973, with 380 accidents resulting in 10 persons killed and 173 persons injured. This was 58 less accidents, and 35 more injured in 1974 at the same period of time.

The ten traffic deaths for the month of February, 1974, occurred in the following counties: three in Young, two in Wichita; one each in Castro, Moore, Randall, Croby, and Montague counties.

### VOTER REGISTRATION REQUIREMENT CHANGES

The 1974-75 edition of the Texas Election Code does not reflect the latest order of the Federal Court issued in the case of *Whitley v. Clark, et al.*, which enjoins the enforcement of durational residency requirements in excess of 30 days.

This means that persons who have resided in the State and locality for 30 days and have been registered for 30 days prior to the election in which they wish to vote are eligible to vote in State and local elections. Persons entering the State may register to vote immediately upon their arrival. The cutoff deadline for registration for

those who wish to vote in the May 4 Primary Election is the close of business on April 3, 1974.

On another topic, if you should have any "change of residency" questions concerning moving within the precinct, from precinct to precinct, or from county to county, then you should read Article 5.18(a) sub-division 1, 2, and 3: You will find this Article on page 80 of the new 1974-75 Texas Election Code.

### SOIL CONSERVATION

The planting date for cool season grasses such as Tall Fescue or Tall Wheat Grass is getting near. The best planting date for the cool season grasses is from August 15 until March 15, under irrigation. All cool season grasses that are used in area are not recommended for dryland planting.

The best seedbed for grass seeding is for the soil to be as firm as possible with a dead litter cover of some kind, such as Sudan grass that did not head, sorghum stubble or a mulch litter of cotton burs spread on the soil's surface. Where a dead litter cover is not used the seedbed should be prepared and settled good before the grass is drilled, and irrigated every few days until the grass is well established. If this is not done the seed will germinate, and the soil will dry out within the seedlings root zone before the roots get deep enough to survive. The first two or three weeks after the seed sprouts is critical period for the grass.

Where a dead litter cover is used, it is much easier to get a stand of grass established because there is less evaporation of the soil moisture and protection from wind and dust damage.

Anyone that plans to plant any grass can come by, call, or contact any of the personnel at the Soil Conservation Service Office at the courthouse in Littlefield and they will furnish you with the needed informa-


