

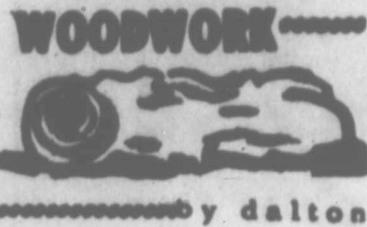

PEOPLE who keep track of such things tell us that now we Texans are approaching the season when tornadoes are most likely to occur, although they hasten to add that tornadoes can occur any time.

The most likely times for tornadoes in Texas are during the months of April, May and June, and they are most frequent during the warmer hours of the day. CAMPAIGN SIGNS SUBJECT TO REGULATIONS

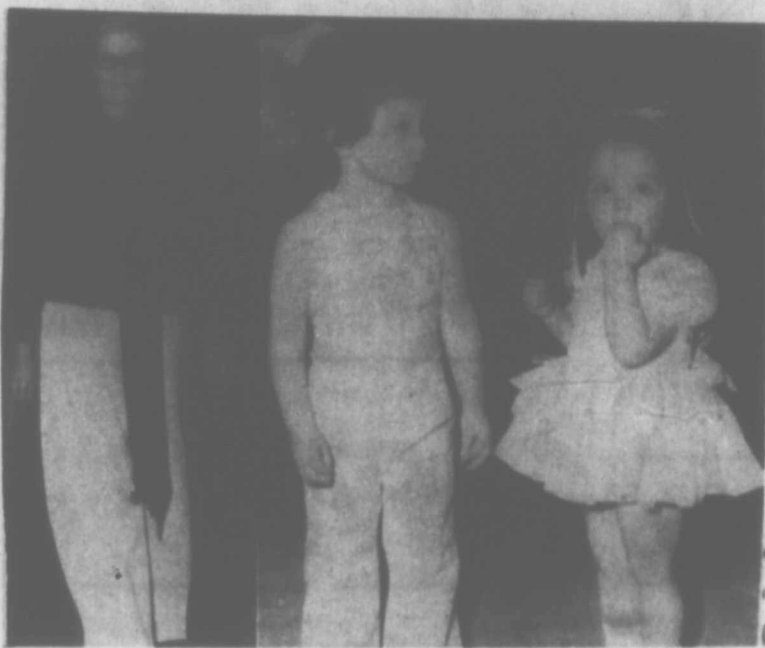

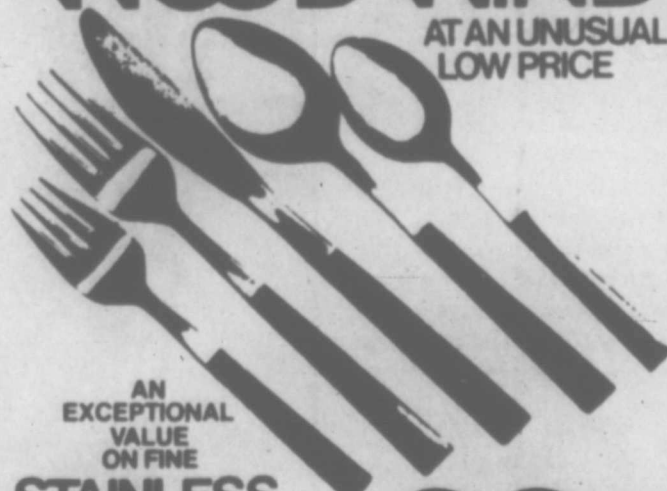
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
