## COLLEGE GUIDANCE PROGRAM FOR STUDENTS SET NOVEMBER 6

A major change has occurred in the college admissions scene. In the past, students were competing for colleges; in contrast, colleges are now competing for students. This puts students in the unique position of selecting a college that will best fit their needs. In order to assist the students of Sudan High School to find the colleges that will best meet these needs, the COLLEGE GUIDANCE PROGRAM has been adopted.

It was announced today by Billie McClellan, director of guidance.

At the heart of the program is a systematic process of exploring, through the use of a **College Planning Notebook**, what the student wants from a college and which college offers him the most. In addition to providing college-selection guidelines for the student, the **Notebook** contains vital information for parents on how to meet rising college costs. Many parents are unaware of the many sources of financial aid available today.

The COLLEGE GUIDANCE PROGRAM includes a 2 1/4 hour test that will yield predictive scores on the two major college entrance exams--ACT and SAT--and the Kuder Interest Survey, which will highlight student interests. Students will greatly benefit from this program. The information given by this one instrument is invaluable to parents and students. It is planned that all eleventh-graders will participate in the program which the school is providing for them.

The test will be administered Wednesday morning, November 6.

### GOVERNOR BRISCOE APPROVES GRANT

Governor Dolph Briscoe has announced his approval of a criminal justice grant of \$35,185 to the Lubbock-based South Plains Association of Governments.

The grant provides continuation funding of the regional law enforcement training project. SPAG will offer area officers two basic and nine advanced courses for a total of 22 weeks of training.

To decoupage, strip the piece of furniture of old finish and sand until smooth. Stain and seal with a wood finish in a natural shade or use a dramatic red, green, blue or white finish.

After the finish dries, cut out the design to be applied. Glue to surface and let dry (at least 24 hours). Finish by applying several light coats of satin or gloss polyurethane until the surface is smooth as glass. Allow to cure; then buff surface with a clean cloth.

### Halloween Safety Tips

Halloween has become a time to take special care that accidents do not mar the trick or treat fun.

Safety tips include being sure to light walkways and doorways both front and back; keeping pets, even benign ones, indoors and keeping candle-lit pumpkins out of reach of small children.

For safety in costumes, be certain purchased costumes are marked "flame resistant." Home made costumes can be temporarily flame-proofed by soaking them in a mixture of three ounces of boric acid, seven ounces of borax and two quarts of water.

Costumes should be light

and brightly colored to make youngsters as visible as possible at dusk and in the dark.

Cosmetics make a safe alternative to masks or hoods and do not obscure the child's vision. Make certain children stay in neighborhoods where they are known and to avoid dimly lit homes. Have an adult accompany them on their rounds.

Children should be cautioned not to eat any of their booty until they get home. Then everything should be examined and items with torn wrappers should be discarded. Fruit should be washed and cut into small pieces before eating.

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**SPC HOMECOMING PARENTS DAY SET**

A Mexican fiesta, homecoming queen coronation and basketball game are just a few of the activities planned for this year's Homecoming Parents' Day festivities at South Plains College, Levelland.

The Homecoming celebration is slated for Nov. 6, 8, and 9.

Homecoming and Parents' Day activities are open to faculty, staff, students, parents, alumni, and their guests, said Ken Hare, director of the SPC Office of Student Activities.

First on the three-day agenda will be a Mexican buffet, fiesta and dance, on Wednesday, Nov. 6. Serving time for the Mexican buffet, sponsored by Saga Foods, will be from 5:30 to 6:30 p. m. in Texan Hall. Cost is \$2.00 per person.

Booths featuring foods of the Mexican-American culture will open at 7:30 p. m., Hare said. Several student organizations will operate the booths, including Forest Hall, selling tacos; Tex-Anns, hot tamales; Methodist Student Organization, nachos; and South Sue Spencer dorm, chalupas.

The activities for Friday, Nov. 8, will include a pep rally and Homecoming Queen Coronation at 10:30 a. m. in the Women's Gym, a bonfire pep rally at 6:30 p. m. on campus and the Mr. SPC Beauty Pageant spoof at 7:30 p. m. in the SPC Auditorium. An "old-fashioned wintertime evening" scheduled at 9:45 p. m. in the Student Center will polish off the day's events.

Parents of SPC students and alumni will be honored with a variety of activities on Saturday, Nov. 9. Registration will be from 11 a. m. to 1 p. m. in the Student Center.

A Parents' Day luncheon is scheduled from 11:30 a. m. to 1 p. m. in Texan Hall. Price of the meal will be \$1.25 a person.
