You see, we have this glass mailbox at our house which says "visible mail" on it, only no mail is ever visible. The box is an antique, I think; it looks kinda like a fruit jar shaped like a Kleenex box.

Of course, the guys at the postoffice are doing us a favor when they put all of our mail in the box, no matter where it is addressed, because we get it quicker. But I wish they'd put the second class stuff which is addressed to the house in the box at the house. At least every now and then.

And the mailman would get to look at our pretty, old-fashioned mailbox more often.
