# MATADORS DEFEAT HORNETS, 38-27

The Hornets finished the 1974 football season Friday night with their only district defeat to the Motley County Matadors by a score of 38-27. The Matadors were the only other team in the north zone of Class 2-B undefeated. They now will meet Sundown at Motley County this week for the district title.

Sudan and Motley County were just about equal in yards rushing when Sudan had 326 and Motley 314. Sudan had a total of 411 to Motley's 439, which was a "lot" of yardage in any one game, for any one team. Sudan racked up 24 first downs to 18 for Motley County. The Hornets trailed all the way but never gave up, and time after time, frustrated the Matadors with continuous grinding yardage on the ground.

The Sudan varsity basketball girls won their second game of the season Tuesday by defeating Bledsoe 57-38. Phyllis Ray netted 22 for the locals for high. The Sudan varsity boys were edged by Bledsoe 69-60 with Danny Williams high for 16 pts., then Richard Tamplin with 14, Craig Pickett 12, Luther Robinson 10, and Jerry Williams 8. All 14 boys saw action. The Hornets shot 58 times, had 2 free throws and 9 fouls. Gary Young scored 13 points to lead Bledsoe.

In the second quarter, QB Mitch Chester directed a 93 yard drive in 18 plays with everybody doing their job in a determined effort, and Danny Williams scored a Hornet touchdown on a two yard run. The kick by Kyle Martin was good and Sudan was on the scoreboard. With only 20 seconds left in the half, Campbell fired a pass to Frank Welling and a 30 yard touchdown. Again the Hornets foiled their attempt for two extras. The halftime score was Motley County 24, Sudan 7.

The Hornets went to work early in the first half trying to make a comeback, and scored the only touchdown in the third quarter. They went to work and amassed 67 yards from the opening kickoff in 16 tries (controlling the football over seven minutes) with Richard Tamplin again scoring for Sudan from the three. Martin's kick for the extra point was no good. The score was now 24-13 with the Matadors ahead.

In the fourth quarter, the Matadors scored two more times when the Hornets defense broke down. Their Steve Stephens ran 24 yards and a touchdown, and Castulo Gonzales' run for two extras was good, their first extra points of the night. With 4:30 on the clock, Campbell connected with Stephens for a 35 yard gain and another TD. The kick was blocked by Sudan. With 56 seconds of time remaining, Martin scored for Sudan on a six-yard run, and QB Chester passed to Richard Tamplin for two extras. This score was made following a 65 yard drive in 11 plays and the score now was 38-21, Motley County. With both teams sending in reserves, Sudan again scored with 12 seconds remaining on a pass from Craig Pickett to Jerry Williams for 27 yards. The run for two failed. The play began at the 27 when Hornet Carroll Legg recovered a Matador fumble at the 42 and they were also penalized 15 yards on the play. Final score was Motley County 38, Sudan 27.

The final game of the year was also the final game for Seniors Craig Harper, David Aills, Mitch Chester, Carroll Legg, Mart Davison, Richard Tamplin, Tracy Bowling, Bobby Phillips and Coach Stewart expressed his appreciation to these boys for leading their team during the season, and commended each boy on the team for never letting up in any game. He stated that he felt like they had a good year and hoped to make next year even better and already had some plays for them in mind.
