AS I HAVE mentioned here on one or two other occasions, the magazine, Grain Producers News, is a readable, attractive and well-edited publication, even for those like myself who know next to nothing about the cattle business or the grain business.

## Two Sudan Men Killed By Electrical Shock

A fatal mishap occurred here about 3:30 p. m. Thursday, Jan. 23, killing two employees of the City of Sudan at the city dump grounds.

Joel Lee Williams and Daniel Gonzales, both of Sudan, suffered electrical shock when a section of irrigation pipe they were holding came into contact with power lines, according to investigators.

Sudan Justice of the Peace W. T. Vereen ruled both deaths due to electrical shock and pronounced them dead at the scene. Vereen also stated that both Williams and Gonzales were badly burned when a patch of grass caught fire where they were lying.

Vereen said another city employee found the two men and reported it to police.

Investigators said the two men were chasing a rabbit. The rabbit ran into the pipe and the two men lifted it in an attempt to flush out the

rabbit. Gonzales' body was taken to Hammons Funeral Home in Littlefield. Williams' body was taken to McCarty Funeral Home, also in Littlefield.

Funeral services for Daniel Gonzales, 30, were held Saturday afternoon at St. Mary's Catholic Church, Sudan, with Rev. Joe James of Littlefield officiating.

Burial was in Sudan Cemetery with Hammons Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Gonzales was born July 22, 1944 at Hondo and had lived at Sudan 18 years.

Surviving are his wife, Elena; three sons, Daniel Gonzales Jr., Marcello Gonzales and Julian Gonzales; two daughters, Laura Gonzales and Mary Gonzales, all of the home; his father, Marcello Gonzales of Sudan; a sister, Maria Vela of Round Lake Beach, Ill.; and a brother, Jesse Gonzales of Ogden, Utah.

Pallbearers were Roy Trevino, Raymon Garza, Mike Salas, Jesse Jasso, Ramon Romero, and Gilbert Faulkner.

Services for Joel Lee Williams, 36, were held Monday, Jan. 27, 1975, at 1 p. m. in the Mt. Olive Baptist Church, Sudan, with Rev. A. K. Thomas, pastor, officiating.

Burial was in the Sudan Cemetery under the direction of McCarty Funeral Home, Littlefield.

Williams was born January 23, 1939 at Mexia and died on his 36th birthday.

He married Miss Celia Mae Miles August 22, 1959 in McLennan County and moved to Sudan in 1965.

Surviving are his wife, Celia Mae; seven daughters, Kathy, Carolyn, Jacqueline, Sherry, Stacie, Tracie and Teresa; five sons, Joel Williams, Jr., Johnny, Ronald, Donald, and Anthony, all of the home; two sisters, Mrs. Alma Jewel Compton of Los Angeles, Calif., and Mrs. Annie Lee Ogg of Sudan; a brother, Walter Lee Douglas Jr. of Ft. Hood; and several aunts, uncles, nieces and nephews.

Allen is the son of Mrs. Marie Allen and is a 1964 graduate of Sudan High School. He and his wife, Ann, are presently residing in Dallas.



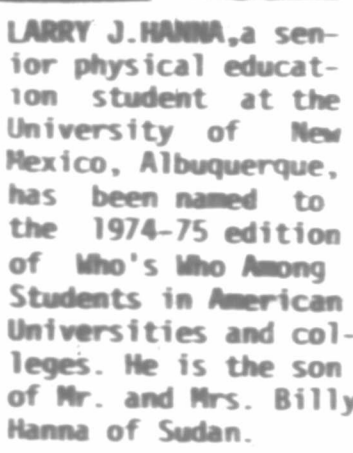
### M.F. MCKNIGHT BIBLE CLASSES TO BE TAUGHT FEB. 10-12

Sudan teams upped their winning streak another notch Friday night here by winning four out of four games with Cotton Center.

The varsity girls got off to a good start and scored 10 points to 4 for the visitors. However, Cotton Center came back strong in the second quarter scoring 14 to 6 for the locals and led 18-16 at halftime. Sudan led by one point at the end of the third quarter and outscored C. C. in the final period 16-12 for a 41-36 win. Sharon Burton led Sudan with 15 points and Mary Ann Bellar scored 14; Phyllis Ray had 8 and Kay Tamplin 4. Sudan had 18 fouls to 9 for C. C. and hit 5 out of 7 at the free throw line to 10 of 15 for the visitors.

The Hornets tromped C. C. 76-38 and were led by C. Pickett who hit the nets for 31 points with only one at the free throw line. Sudan outscored C. C. in every frame: 9-6, 28-11, 21-12 and 18-9. Sudan hit 8 of 18 free throw attempts to 12 of 16 for the visitors. R. Tamplin had 17 points; Kyle Martin 14; C. Harper, D. Williams and L. Bellar 4 each, and D. Flowers 2.

In the JV games, Sudan girls won 53-19 with a big third quarter and 21 points. Kelli Hargrove scored high for Sudan having 11 points. She was followed by Betty James and Pam Davison who had 10 each; Rita Robinson 8, Bernadette May 6, Terry Chester 4 and Lori Harper 2. Cotton Center made only 4 baskets.

Sudan JV boys won 54-36 with Rick Hill having 18

points, Edgar Tamplin 17, Haldon Messmore 8, Brad Pierce 7, Harvey Donahue and Lonnie Simpson 2 each. They now have a 6-8 season record, and stand 5-0 in district.

The high school teams were idle Tuesday night but will host Nazareth Friday night. Following Friday games, there will be three remaining games of the season. They will host Spade on Feb. 4, and will travel to Happy Feb. 7 and to Lazbuddie Feb. 11.

### STORE LICENSE REQUIREMENT ABOLISHED

Comptroller Bob Bullock reminded Texas business operators Saturday that the state store license requirement was repealed as of Dec. 31, 1974.

"Obviously, the past administration didn't get the message out," Bullock said. "I consider it good news that we've been able to do away with the store license."


The store license, which started at \$5 for a single store, was a minor revenue source. Its repeal by phases was ordered by the Legislature in 1971.

Bullock said that some 240,000 stores in Texas had previously been covered by the license act.

He said his office is returning license money still being sent in by businesses unaware of the repeal.

"It's gratifying to see businesses voluntarily trying to do right and pay their taxes, but in this case we are saying 'thanks, but no thanks,'" Bullock said.
