Bond Sales

According to Mrs. James T. Lee, Chairman of the Lamb County Savings Bonds Committee, the 1975 Savings Bond goal for the County is \$130,000. January sales of E and H United States Savings Bonds totaled \$29,280 for 23 per cent of the sales goal.

The 1975 sales goal for Texas is \$234.3 million. During the month sales were \$23,290,606 compared to January 1974 sales of \$21,189,711.

Home Health Care Now Available

A new health service has recently been instituted in the Sudan-Amherst communities. Nursing services are being offered through the West Texas Home Health Agency, an independent agency based in Lubbock, Texas.

Some of the services available to homebound Medicare patients upon orders of an attending physician are surgical dressings, catheterizations, catheter irrigations, insertion of stomach tubes, injections, intravenous, vena puncture for blood analysis, monitoring blood pressure and other vital signs, exercises, training in ambulation, physical therapy, speech therapy, enemas, sitz baths, and teaching of family members to care for the patient.

Equipment such as hospital beds, wheelchairs, oral electric suction, bedside commodes, crutches, oxygen, intermittent positive pressure breathing machines, etc. can be furnished the patient on order of the attending physician.

No drugs are furnished but surgical dressings, syringes, catheters, solutions and other such supplies are provided as needed.

It should be emphasized that this nursing service is not a continuous service but an intermittent service offered once a day, two or three times a week or whatever the physician feels is necessary. Health services on a part-time basis may be needed when people are confined to their homes because of an illness or injury, after treatment in a hospital or skilled nursing facility, or care can be provided at home to help avoid an inpatient stay.

Reimbursement for home health care can be made not only by Medicare insurance but also by Medicaid, VA, Private Insurance, Champus and Private Pay.

West Texas Home Health Agency has been expanding its services on consumer demand since it was organized in Lubbock in 1968. It now has services in the entire West Texas area to the New Mexico border West, South to Big Spring, North to the Canyon area, East to Jacksboro.

For the Sudan-Amherst area, LVN Mrs. Chester R. R. 2, Earth, Phone 965-2982, is the nurse to call when health services are needed.

NEW POST OFFICE SITE SELECTED HERE

A site has been selected for the new post office in Sudan, C. B. Bolar, manager, Oklahoma City Postal

District, announced today. In Sudan, the site is located on the east side of Commerce St., between First St.

and Railroad Ave. and will be 125 ft. by 140 ft., for a total land area of 17,500 sq. ft., and is owned by Mr. and Mrs. E. O. Chandler of Littlefield, Tx. The building will contain 2,320 sq. ft. of floor space.

The Postal Service holds assignable options on the site which would be transferred to the successful bidders whenever bids are called for and construction contracts are awarded. The building will be leased by the Postal Service for basic periods of 10 years with options of 20 additional years.
